




To all of the people, club officials, supporters, and others who helped in any way to produce this Yearbook, my gracious thanks.

f the bookies were to be believed we should not have bothered with a senior championship this year at all! Ballyhale Shamrocks were so hot favourites that it seemed to have the effect of many opponents surrendering meekly when the going got tough in league and championship. Credit must go to the southerners that they never allowed the advance publicity to distract them from their marvellous quest of a third county title in a row, to equal the feat of their predecessors from 1978-80.

County Final

The madness continued to the county final when they were quoted at 1/8 favourites against the second most successful team of the noughties, James Stephens.

Could the Ballyhale men be so good? Yes they did capture their third successive title.

Yes they did encounter very little difficulty on the way. Yes they did demonstrate that they are an exceedingly talented side, bursting with skill, strength and savvy.

They were handed a tremendous attacking opportunity when James Stephens surrendered much of the field to them be withdrawing Peter Barry into defence though playing with a strong wind. The Shamrocks defenders and midfield had the luxury of being able to pick out telling passes, that resulted in two first half goals to Eoin and Patrick Reid. Their seven point interval lead of 2-7 to 0-6 did scant justice to the opportunities they might have converted.


The semi-finals were games of contrasting style and quality. Shamrocks annihilated near neighbours Carrickshock by 1-21 to 0-11, a surprising result to many who had watched them earlier in the best league game of the year. Then the champions had snatched a winning goal in added time. They made no mistake when it mattered as they simply ran away from the increasingly weak challenge of 'Shock in a truly one sided second half. Carrickshock failed to defend from the front and they were ruthlessly swept aside.

The city derby was a quality and close affair. For the past seven years little has divided these sides but an Eoin Larking goal midway through the second half gave Stephens the momentum to survive a furious

O'Loughlins rally and wing by 1-13 to 0-12. O'Loughlins introduced several young players to senior ranks this year and would seem to have a bright future despite this disappointment.

What of the challengers of 2008?

The St. Canice's Credit Union league did not produce many memorable games. It was won in a canter by Shamrocks who hammered James Stephens in a lop sided final while O'Loughlins captured the Shield. Early promise by Fenians and Tullaroan failed to spur either of them to championship fury. Fenians remain competitive, all the more praiseworthy because of their very small pool of players. Tullaroan have similar qualities and issues.



Newly promoted Clara performed creditably with a very young team and they have the capacity to join the upper echelons of senior hurling. St. Martins were the disappointment of the season after their annus mirabilis of 2007. Perhaps expectations were too high but they will surely improve next year and become forceful challengers.

The only bright light of the year for Graig-Ballycallan was the series of wonderful performances by James Ryall who, at times, single-handedly defied the opposition. Their early season form was miserable and demonstrated that league form is a fair indicator of championship performance.

Dunnamaggin too, seem to be receding from their pervious heights of excellence. Though they have very good defenders, scoring freely has become a significant problem for them. Yet they remain formidable opponents.

Just as Ballyhale were hot favourite sot win, Young Irelands were expected to return to Intermediate ranks. But through the League they battled manfully in all their games, showing great spirit. They survived the relegation final against Dicksboro thanks to a truly outstanding performance by veteran Charlie Carter

The old adage 'forwards win matches' was very much in evidence in Dicksboro's displays

this year. However with a thriving underage structure we may expect them to return to senior ranks before long.

This year the final league game was played in August, thus giving more meaningful impetus to midsummer club training. The experiment seems effective particularly since issues of first round byes and relegation worries were decided on that weekend. It may not always be as successful.

There is a growing concern that there is an increasing number of weaker teams competing at senior level and that intermediate team standards have fallen. Too many clubs are relying on veterans to keep them afloat in both grades. For many years strong well populated clubs have been plying their trade at 'B' level in underage ranks. The disturbing trend may be the principal factor in many clubs being unable to bring their young players to the highest adult level.

Kilkenny's greatest strength has been its underage structure, but it beggars belief when only three or four teams compete at 'A' level in some age groups. Let us be warned, there may be serious consequences down the road for excellence at adult level.

08 will be remembered as the 'year of the shamrock', whither 09?

NATIONAL LEAGUE


Kilkenny V Dublin Nowlan Park February 17.

Kilkenny opened their League account against Dublin in Parnell Park on a sunny, but cold end of February Sunday, seven days before the Walsh Cup Final. Kilkenny shot 2-13, but the Dubs shot 0-19. They (the Dubs) were deliriously happy, Kilkenny less – much less- so.

Eddie Brennan was the brightest star on view, scoring 0-6. Eoin Larkin got 0-6, five from frees; Willie O'Dwyer bagged 0-3, while Eoin Mc Cormack, (0-2), Martin Comerford (0-1), and Aidan Fogarty (0-1), completed the Kilkenny scoring. Tipperary were first visitors to Nowlan Park to test the reigning League Champions.

After nineteen games undefeated, stretching back to the All Ireland semi-final of 2005, Kilkenny came up short against the This was a very productive seven-day period for Kilkenny. They collected their first League points by beating Dublin in Nowlan Park, and later in the week, the CCCC awarded them two more points because of the postponement of the Cork game.

Kilkenny beat Dublin rather more easily than the 1-21 to 2-10 would suggest. There was much to please the Kilkenny support and Management about this initial win. The form of first-time out captain, James "Cha" Fitzpatrick was astonishing. This man's instincts are phenomenal. His new midfield partner, Michael Fennelly was very impressive, as were Richie Hogan and TJ Reid. They laid down their personal





markers, which would have been noted for future reference. Kilkenny lead at the break by 1-12 to 0-7, the goal coming from the stick of young Hogan five minutes before the break. It would contribute to a nice card of 1-2 in toto for the Danesfort youngster.

This League outing did not give Kilkenny any cause for delirious celebration. Wexford were woefully poor, so poor in fact that their supporters turned on them in their own back yard. It was not a pretty sight, as Kilkenny sauntered to another brace of League points at their ease. Kilkenny were in cruise mode from an early part of this game. Five of their starting forwards for instance had scored before the 13th minute had passed.

At half time, Kilkenny led by 0-17 to Wexford's 0-5. Hundreds of the Wexford support were streaming towards the gates in disgust. They were all gone well before the game ended.





s with previous years, it proved to be an open and even affair once more in the intermediate championship in Kilkenny. The opinions of all the experts in the county varied throughout the year as different teams showed their best form at various stages of the season. But in the end, experience won out over youthful exuberance, as Erin's Own (Castlecomer) rose their heads above the surface and regained their senior status after a two year stint in the lower grade. It wasn't without drama, however, as it so easily could have been one of at least five competing teams who came close to getting their hands on glory.

The early rounds of the league were symptomatic of the even level that existed among the majority of the teams. Results varied throughout with newly promoted Conahy Shamrocks and the Rower-Inistioge leading the way in Group A, while in Group B, Emeralds and Erin's Own held the top two positions respectively, despite Mullinavat and Mooncoin coming close.

The league finals saw Emeralds showing the intent for the rest of the year by disposing of Conahy Shamrocks on a score line of 3-16 to 0-14. The junior champions of last year were just not able to physically compete with the Urlingford men, who used their strength to good effect around the field. Unfortunately for the Emeralds, this good form did not carry them to a championship title, as we will see later. The shield final saw Erin's Own secure a narrow victory over the Rower-Inistioge, winning 1-14 to 2-9.

And so the stage was set for what was an intriguing championship. Even in the opening round, the outcomes of the pairings provided some surprises. The first was the near escape that last year's county finalists, St. Lachtain's (Freshford), had against John Lockes (Callan), who were serious underdogs coming into the game. The Freshford men had only a goal to spare in the end, having been made fight all the way by their opponents, winning 3-12 to 2-12. The other minor surprise came when Danesfort accounted for Mullinavat. Adrian Ronan's men proved to be far hungrier than the Southerners, who had shown very inconsistent form in their return to the intermediate grade. Danesfort had two points at the final whistle and qualified for the quarter-finals on a 1-13 to 1-9 score line.

The final two first round matches were southern derbies with

Glenmore taking on Graignamanagh and Mooncoin facing Thomastown. Both tussles were similarly tight and tense. The first saw Graignamanagh put Glenmore into a relegation battle as they had a goal to spare in their victory (1-12 to 0-12). Mooncoin also advanced to the quarter-finals with a hard-fought win over Thomastown, winning 3-11 to 2-10. The results saw John Lockes and Glenmore face into a relegation dogfight to see who would play junior hurling in 2009. In what was a dramatic, tense and nerve-wracking affair, it was the Callan men who lost their intermediate by the narrowest of margins, with Glenmore winning 2-10 to 1-12.

The quarter-finals were seen as the crucial time in the championship as the teams who were vying for supremacy were all lined up to face each other. An interesting tussle was the clash of the two All-Ireland junior club champions, namely Danesfort and Conahy Shamrocks. It was the 2007 champions who held the edge over the 2008 champions, as the Danesfort men were superior throughout the majority of the game. However, it was not until late in the game that they were assured of victory thanks to a goal from fullforward Frank Manogue. From there, they soldiered on to win by 1-13 to 1-9. It was equally tight and tense in Ballyragget between Erin's Own and St. Lachtain's as both sides fought tooth and nail. It appeared that the Freshford men held the advantage as the game went into the closing stages, but Castlecomer recovered and Damien Fogarty shot an equalising free to level the scores and force a replay (1-10 to 0-13). In the replay in Nowlan Park, St. Lachtain's again looked to have put themselves into the driving seat as they lead by five points with seven minutes remaining. But the Comer men, led by the supreme David Buggy, made an emphatic recovery to score six consecutive points to snatch victory on a 0-11 to 0-10 score line.

Many people's favourites for the title at this stage, the Emeralds, had less trouble in disposing of the challenge of Graignamanagh. Having just captured the league title, the Urlingford men again displayed their physical strength in powering their way forward and to which the Graig men had simply no answer to. The game concluded with a handsome nine point margin in favour of Emeralds, with them winning 0-16 to 1-5. The gap between southern rivals Mooncoin and the Rower-Inistioge was far smaller, as had been anticipated in the build-up to the game. It was never a classic, but there was literally nothing between the sides all through as both sides went score for score. However, Mooncoin got the crucial scores when it happened and opened a three point lead as the game neared its conclusion. The Rower responded with two points of their own, but time ran out on them as Mooncoin booked a semi-final place with a single point to spare (1-13 to 1-12).

The semi-draw pitted Danesfort against Emeralds and Erin's Own with Mooncoin. Danesfort were appearing at the semi-final stage for the first time in their history but the favourites tag rested with the Urlingford men. And it appeared that this did not sit well with them, as they failed to produce the form they showed in previous outings. Their opponents were far hungrier and the Emeralds looked tense and nervous in their play. But it was all to play for as the game entered the final stages and with little between the sides. But the result went the way of the underdog as Danesfort held on for a one point victory, winning 0-11 to 0-10.

The second semi-final was an opportunity for Mooncoin to finally step beyond the shadows and finally clinch a place in the top level. They had met heartbreak at such moments in previous years having promised so much. Their opponents, Erin's Own, had a different kind of emphasis of approach, hoping their blend of youth and experience to get them through. They played this game to perfection, and the southerners could not respond. The Comer men always seemed to have enough in reserve and so it proved. When Mooncoin scored the opening goal of the game in the second half, Erin's Own were able to respond with a goal from Eddie Brennan. Mooncoin couldn't force their way back, and thus Erin's Own qualified for the county final (1-13 to 1-7).

It was hardly the final pairing that anyone had been anticipating, but such was the nature of the games in the intermediate grade this year, it was hardly surprising. It was equally difficult to predict the winner of this final. It played out in that fashion also, with little between the sides all through. It was going to take a minor difference to separate the sides, and it came from a likely and reliable source for Erin's Own. They possessed a great attack leader in David

oin Larkin's 2008. In intercounty terms it ended d not on the first Sunday of September but on a dmid-October Friday night at the Citywest Hotel in Dublin, where he received an All Star and the Hurler of the Year award to add to his third All Ireland medal. But where the season began for Larkin? Well, you could go back to Portlaoise on 15 June, when he hit four points against Offaly in the Leinster semi-final and went home happy that the ball was running for him and hopeful that it just might continue to. You could go back to 1 April, when Private E Larkin of the 3rd Battalion returned from a six-month stint on UN peacekeeping duty in Kosovo feeling fresher than he'd felt in years. Or you could go way back to 2004 and to the evening James Stephens, casting around for a centreforward and not exactly inundated with options, decided to take a punt on the young lad from Upper Patrick Street in the heart of the Village. Little though any of them could have suspected it at the time, it was the night the journey to Citywest began.

Larkin, then in the process of turning 20, was no obvious choice as an attack leader. As a teenager he'd been a corner-forward, skilful but small and, largely because he and his contemporaries didn't constitute one of those all-conquering teenage outfits James Stephens churn out with monotonous regularity, not a name that went down in many notebooks as a potential star of the future. As a minor he'd been a sub when Kilkenny won the All Ireland in 2002. As an under-21 he wouldn't make the county team until his final year. But Tommy Lanigan, the James Stephens manager, reckoned there might be more to Larkin than met the eye. Lanigan turned out to be right.

Not that he's claiming any credit for his powers of insight. "Look, it's a simple story," he says. "At club level there's no such thing as a readymade centre-forward. You put somebody in there and either he works or not, and if he doesn't you try somebody else. We put Eoin in there, gave him responsibility and he took it on. If there was any luck attached it was that he came into a team where Peter Barry, Brian McEvoy and Philly Larkin were powerful leaders. That helped bring him on immensely.'

How radically different a path Larkin's career might have taken had DJ Carey not put a last-gasp close-range free to win the 2004 county final a couple of inches over the James Stephens crossbar, we don't know and never can. Certainly it would have been easy for him in



view of his skimpy under-age CV to disappear off the radar altogether. But little nails hold the hinge of history, and instead of being denied their first county triumph in 23 years on the finishing line, the Larchfield club went on to win successive Kilkenny titles, successive Leinster titles and an All Ireland title. In the process, no boat was lifted higher by the rising tide than Larkin's. "Things could have worked out a lot differently had DJ put that ball under the crossbar alright," he agrees. "There was a big stroke of luck involved."


In the 14 games 'Stephens played en route to Croke Park glory in 2005, beginning against Tullaroan the previous May, continuing through Leinster and culminating against Athenry on St Patrick's Day, Larkin hit an aggregate of 5-105. That this was bulked out with a total of 0-78 from placed balls troubled neither the headline writers nor the people selecting the TG4 man of the match; scorers are always sexier than nonscorers. Brian McEvoy was by some distance the winners' standout performer in the All Ireland final, for instance, but beauty being in the eye of the beholder it was Larkin who walked off with the glassware. "I'll take them if they're going," he says drily. Quite.

The hard part, however, had yet to come. A couple of stats will indicate precisely how hard it would be.

Larkin, who made his provincial bow against Offaly in 2005, has started each of Kilkenny's 18 championship outings over the past four seasons but was substituted in five of his first six. In the nine fixtures in which he featured in 2005-06, he scored 10 points. In the nine fixtures in which he featured in 2007-08, he scored 3-23. He is the same Eoin Larkin and he's a very different Eoin Larkin.

It was difficult, he admits. It was even more difficult because every time he was substituted he promised himself he'd do better next time – and mostly when next time came, he didn't do better. "I don't know what it was. Psychological, maybe. But I definitely wasn't going to sulk. The aim always was to get back and show that I was worthy of a place." A couple of points approaching half-time against Wexford in the 2007 Leinster final and a couple more points approaching half-time against Galway in the All Ireland quarter-final showed – to himself as much as to anyone else – that he was getting the hang of it at last.

If nothing else, the length of Larkin's learning curve demonstrates the dues that have to be paid by modern intercounty aspirants in Kilkenny. For every Henry Shefflin there's a Cha Fitzpatrick, for every Tommy Walsh a JJ Delaney. The Shefflins and the Walshes belong to the tiny minority, the Chas and the JJs – irrespective of how gifted they may be - to the majority. It's less a question of talent than an issue of adjustment. The process is usually slow. It is almost invariably painful. It is never easy.

The difference with Larkin now? "I honestly don't know. I always put in the work. Maybe in my head things are different." Experience? "Could be." Physique? "I'm probably in better shape alright."

After two seasons of hurling right through to the following spring with James Stephens and two more of hurling into September with Kilkenny, Kosovo gave him a change of scenery he didn't at the time realise he needed. Half a year living in another country was, predictably, an eyeopener wrapped in a culture shock. The Irish compound was a couple of miles outside a large town. The poverty that surrounded them was striking; "like Ireland 50 years ago", a couple of the older soldiers asserted. Each day began with a 7.30am parade. Afterwards they'd go out on patrol in jeeps with their Steyr rifles. Mercifully things were generally quiet, which left plenty of time for gym work and an amount of scope for 10km runs provided there was an army car out patrolling. Six nights a week Larkin heaved and hauled weights in the gym and every couple of days he checked in with Mick Dempsey, letting Dempsey know how he was getting on and hearing in turn how the lads were getting on in his absence.

He arrived home on a Tuesday and was back training with Kilkenny on the Friday night. It wasn't as if he'd never been away, mind you; it was as if he'd never been there in the first place. This wasn't an ash plant he was holding, he quickly discovered, it was an iron bar. His hand-eye coordination was all over the place, his reaction time snail-slow, his touch a mile off, the sliotar "jumping away" from him the whole time. He knew there was only one cure. Get to the ball alley in Larchfield and get there fast. "Nearly every night after work. Fifteen or 20 minutes a night. It got me used to holding a hurl again, got my touch back, got my eye in. All the basics."

The quo with the quid was that he returned from Kosovo a stronger man physically. A much stronger man physically. "I didn't feel it at first, but once I got back into the hurling I realised it. I felt fitter. And fresher. My mind was fresh after being away from hurling. My body was fresh."

A sub for the National League semi-final defeat by Tipperary, he'd regained his place for the championship opener against Offaly at O'Moore Park. Being a Cody-era Kilkenny hurler, what he says next will strike a familiar note. Offaly were "serious

opposition"; Martin
Comerford's goal on the blow
of half-time opened up the
game; in the end the
McCarthy Cup holders were
"just delighted" to come out
of there with the win. After
all, as Larkin reflects, "those
are the days when you can be
caught, you know. But the
ball ran for me that day in
Portlaoise and kept running.
As the year went on I was getting more confident. The rest
is history, I suppose."

How do the champions continue, double-digit victory after double-digit victory, to keep their eye on the ball? He grins. "It's not very difficult with Brian Cody over you. If you get carried away he's fairly quick to bring you back down to earth. And if you're not doing the job, he'll get someone else to do it." Not that Cody is, despite a popular perception, hurling's answer to the Queen of Hearts, ever screaming for

heads to be chopped off all over the place. Not that he could possibly have been remotely as successful as he has been if he were. "It's not like that at all. Brian is always doing everything he can to help you. He's very good to encourage you, and if you want to talk to him he always has an ear open. But he wants to bring Kilkenny forward, and if you throw it back in his face that's not the way forward."

Larkin doesn't usually do nerves. For the All Ireland semifinal with Cork he made an exception. "The nerves were neverending. I thought they'd never go away. I think we were all nervous in training, but at the same time we were all looking forward to it. We knew we'd have to pull out a massive performance to win." Just how massive was brought home to him during the first half when he found himself going down on his hunkers to catch his breath. "There was I, supposed to be in peak condition, and I thought my lungs were going to explode. I don't think anything on the training field can prepare you for Croke Park on days like that. Obviously it helps. But." It must have helped for his goal. "Ah, the ball just came out at my feet after Derek Lyng's solo run. There was a lot of lads in the ruck, everything opened up for me and I had only one defender to beat."

And the All Ireland final? "The 15 of us clicked, yeah. Every one of us was delighted with our own performance. That was great. But you can't make All Irelands any sweeter than they are. Every one of them is sweet when you win it."

Ask Larkin if there's one department of his game in which he's improved and he'll cite fielding. He used to find it difficult under the dropping ball, especially when he was contesting it with Peter Barry and Barry was throwing his backside around. "It's hard to be steady in that situation. The same with Tommy Walsh. He throws himself around too. But you learn to take it and get yourself steady again so you can make the catch." The most important lesson he's learned along the way, he adds, is to take what you can get when you can. Seeing Shefflin, John Tennyson and Richie O'Neill all do their cruciates last year taught him that. "Because it can all be whipped away very quickly."

Minors Pull

There was luck attached to the success, no question about that, but on the majority of occasions Kilkenny showed some impressive form and indeed some fine tactical awareness along the way.

ESB All-Ireland Minor Championship 2008

t was perceived, with good reason, that Kilkenny minor hurlers would face an uphill challenge in retrieving an All-Ireland title that has eluded the county for five years. However, Kilkenny manager Richie Mulrooney and his squad faced into the task with great enthusiasm and defied the predictions to secure the Irish Press cup once again. There was luck attached to the success, no question about that, but on the majority of occasions Kilkenny showed some impressive form and indeed some fine tactical awareness along the way. This astuteness would prove vital in the All-Ireland final against Galway, and ultimately decided the game in Kilkenny's favour.

It was a long road to travel to this eventual destination, and it all started for Kilkenny back in the league round-robin section in April. Successive wins over Wexford (3-12 to 0-15) and Laois (6-18 to 1-8) signalled a hunger to achieve more than certain experts had expected them to. The first test on the championship route was to face Carlow in Freshford on June 21st. It was by no means a vintage performance. Kilkenny led 1-7 to 0-6 at the half-time break, with the goal coming from Mark O'Dwyer. But it wasn't until the second period that Kilkenny showed something like their true form as they scored numerous points, the majority coming from the accurate Joe Brennan. They had nine points to spare over a dogged Carlow side, advancing 1-16 to 0-7.

The Leinster final against Wexford was expected to be a true reflection of the potential of Kilkenny, based on two major reasons- that both sides fought a very even battle in their round robin league match-up, and that Wexford had shown great improvement in defeating Dublin in their semi-final. It was a challenge that Kilkenny certainly had to respond to, and they did so in emphatic fashion. A tenth minute goal from corner-forward Martin Gaffney was a great settling factor for Kilkenny and it encouraged a solid first half performance. Joe Brennan and Thomas Breen were crucially making an impact in the forward line also which Wexford were finding difficult to cope with. Kilkenny justifiably led by five points at the half-time interval, 1-9 to 0-7.

The second half held the same pattern as the first with Kilkenny in the ascendancy, despite Wexford's best efforts at a recovery. One felt Kilkenny's greater composure was the major factor and the fact that they outscored their opponents by ten points to five in the




second half emphasises that. And so it concluded with a Kilkenny victory by 1-19 to 0-12. A first major test had been overcome.

The big psychological test was to come, however. Kilkenny's stumbling block of the previous two years, Tipperary, stood in their way in another All-Ireland semi-final. The incentive was there for Kilkenny, as was needed was the performance. One sensed in Kilkenny's preparation that that was the prevailing mood in the team also. The performance was needed, as it was provided in no uncertain terms. A major contributing factor was the inclusion of Walter Walsh at centre-forward for Kilkenny, as the Tullogher man proved a serious attacking threat for Kilkenny. He scored two goals in a blistering first-half performance, ably supported by Joe Brennan, who scored eight points in all during the game, with four from play. Kilkenny enjoyed some good fortune too, when Tipperary's main scorer-in-chief, Noel McGrath, saw his penalty saved. With this advantage, Kilkenny held a four point lead at half-time (2-6 to 0-8).

The second half was without question the best 30 minutes Kilkenny produced throughout the whole year. In anticipating a possible Tipperary fightback, Kilkenny showed a ruthless conviction to totally nullify their opponents and create an eleven point lead with ten minutes remaining. The final nail in the coffin for Tipperary came when Martin Gaffney scored Kilkenny's third goal. Though Tipperary managed a consolation goal before the end, Kilkenny deservedly advanced on a 3-17 to 1-14 victory.

The fear now for Kilkenny as they faced into their final clash with Galway was that they had reached their peak performance level in that semi-final. The opening quarter of the game suggested this theory was well founded. Galway were slicker and settled quicker in establishing a four point lead. But Kilkenny had the hurling gods in their favour and got their first stroke of luck when a speculative shot by Joe Brennan managed to find its way to the net. It ensured Kilkenny eventually settled and managed to secure some more possession. They received a further boost later when a defensive blunder allowed Thomas Breen to score Kilkenny's second goal. Whether it was deserved or not is up for debate, but the reality was Kilkenny had two crucial goals to their advantage. That was vital at the half time interval, with them leading 2-5 to 0-6.

Kilkenny enjoyed a third piece of good fortune immediately at the



Showing great calmness, he managed to flick the ball to the net and give Kilkenny a winning lead, 3-6 to 0-13. It was hard to believe that such grand larceny had occurred, but Kilkenny had pulled it off. Another minor title was managed to find its way back to Kilkenny.

What it says on the tin.....

tremendous Gael, a football man in Coolagh, Philly Shea – the bed of Heaven to him- would always pref-

A ace his statements re great football contests with the expression, "that was the time me man when ya kept yer shirt well out from you're a**e, drove every kick to the goal, and when small birds built their nests in ould men's beards"

For as long as I remember, Danny Lynch sported, maybe sported is the wrong word, a beard. You associated, or at least you did in my youth, the wearing of a beard with longevity, maturity, knowledge, dignity, academic ability, experience, guile, statesmanship, and sagacity He was a man you went to, to sort out a problem. You knew, instinctively, that here was a man who could dig you out of a hole; your agony aunt if you like. Little did he know that his life

was scheduled to be one vacu-packed episode after another when first he walked through the door of the Ceann Aras over twenty years ago.

But the Kerry man brought a whiff of good fresh air into an Association still being driven by the relics of ould decency, political intrigue, and a misleading conception that it was hyper-democratic.

He attempted change.

Many times he stood alone, and the damning thing about that was that he was allowed to. Sometimes his journeys through the night were lonely roads.

This son of Kerry was afforded a three-year secondment, or something similar, to the GAA.

Danny Lynch was fast-tracked into his first Pandora's box of problems on his very first day at the office. But then he had cut his eye teeth on sorting out situations not of his making. He had nineteen years of putting out fires that someone else had started, and he was good at it. Subsequently his acumen would serve him well. He was Private Secretary to four different Dail Ministers during his nineteen years, often crossing all Party divides during his tenure.

"Private Secretaries to Ministers are in a very privileged position. They know everything that is going on in their own Ministerial office. They know everything that is going on in every other office, and consequently being able to think on one's feet is important. Being able to keep one's mouth shut is mandatory. But being able to make judgements within an acceptable time frame is also hugely important", he told me.

As a civil Servant, he had served with Jack Lynch, Charlie Haughey, George Colley, Paddy Hillary et al. Exciting, informative, dramatic times, gan dabht

The Croke Park involvement with the GAA was just what the Doctor ordered.

Danny Lynch was bred in the purple to be a GAA man. His love of Gaelic Football whetted his appetite for the Association. His earliest, and fondest memory would involve being brought six miles along the road to a neighbour's house, on the bar of a bad bike, to listen to the great O'Hehir, on a wet battery radio, tell of Cronin, O'Shea, Murphy and Sheehy of Kerry failing to beat McKeever, Niblock, McGribben and Sean O'Connell of Derry in the All Ireland semi-final of 1958.

He cried that day.

They say that success has many Godfathers, but failure is an

orphan.

He remembered many orphans crying in Kerry that day. He would never forget. His first major challenge was the publication of an All Ireland programme. At that time, words like alt, shift, ctrl were the vocabulary of someone trying to recreate the English language. Letter wizards and auto summarize were Cape Kennedy speak, and windows were parts of houses. No pictures, no formats, no info were his production tools, but he did the job. That's how it was for the Croke Park frontline PR trooper. Rather like being

thrown into a raging river with one arm tied to your leg, and told to swim for your life.

But Lynch learned to cope.

His training as a Civil Servant had taught him many such lessons.

Over the twenty odd years of his tenure, Danny Lynch faced, often single handed, an enormously varied raft of issues from Croke Park concerts, to the staging of the Special Olympics, from the opening of Croke Park to other sports, to the abolition of Rule 21. There were many more, some stellar moments, others not so glorious.

When the phones were melting in Croke Park on the weekend of Princess Diana's death, demanding that the All Ireland semi-finals should be postponed as a mark of respect, DL, thought heavily criticised by certain members of the Press, diplomatically stated that as our organisation, as a matter of policy, principal and rule (there's thinking on your feet) there are no postponements of games except for the death of a National Head of State, and that the only time that policy was parked was when President John F Kennedy was assassinated.

"I knew when I said that, I could not have been accused of a double standard, because when Kennedy died, it was in the month of October, and there were no matches played anyway".

He was publicly called an Urban Terrorist by an inner city Dublin TD, when the planning processes of Croke Park were being discussed by residents.

It was not by accident that the entire planning processes for the new Croke Park as you now see it were expedited without one objection being lodged.

Hard to credit that in this modern world of rejected planning, and litigation. Danny Lynch was at the forefront of all of these negotiations with the Dublin Corpo.

Where's the proof?

At a meeting of the Dublin City Council two weeks ago, when it was muted that Danny Lynch was retiring, Sinn Fein TD, Christy Burke rose to pay regard to Lynch's contribution to the GAA, and to the development of Croke Park. "I can honestly state, Chairman, without fear of contradiction, that the magnificent edifice we now see as Croke Park, would never have been constructed were it not for the dedication, professionalism, and co-operation of Danny Lynch".

High praise indeed for the Kerryman. He takes personal pride from having directed and cajoled the elder statesmen, finally convincing all concerned that TV exposure would serve the Association well. With Tim O'Connor, Bill Lalor, Michael Lyster from RTE, he embarked on a crusade to convince the traditionalists that a greater expo-



sure would be the propellant needed to raise the games to a higher elevation. Contrary to opinion in the halls of staid traditionalism, it would not be anathema.

"We met all the Secretaries of the Provincial Councils", said Danny, "in places like Knock in the month of November where we were the only people in the Hotel, in the Hazel Hotel in Emo where we were again on our own. But we eventually convinced them that what we were planning would ultimately set our association apart", he said. How right he was.

Television led to an amazing culture change for the GAA. For the first time, it became noticeable that numbers of young people were going to matches wearing their County jerseys. The gender balance was seriously distorted in a most beneficial way. It was sexy to be seen at games, sexier still to be picked up in the eye of the camera. The age profile of the audiences dropped enormously. Family involvement became commonplace.

Lynches crusade was worth the cold nights in cold beds in places like Knock, Emo and Limavaddy.

Again his judgement proved platinum rich. He saw the value in publicity. He was aware that there was a whole new era in communication dawning. He brought the networking of the games from a single camera, a single radio line into the realm of the fast developing phenomenon called Local Radio ("I remember yourself and Pat Treacy with Radio Kilkenny, side by side with Joe McDonagh from Galway Bay FM, sitting cheek by jowl on a single bench on the top deck of the old Hogan Stand"), internetting, web sites, Ipod broadcasting, overseas transmissions, and other forms of communication. He was hugely influential in the planning of what is now, probably one of the best Media nests anywhere in the World.

The re-building of Croke Park was the single most rewarding, and ambitious exercise that Danny Lynch was ever

" The re-development to what we now have, was so influential, that it lifted all boats within the Association. There were tough times. It had it's own history of conflict and controversy. The demolition stages were traumatic to say the least, but we faced them, and with a mixture of common sense on both sides, a little diversification when needed, and a little kidology, we got it finished, and I for one am very proud that I was so much a part of the process from start to finish", he smiled with a roguish smile. We spoke of issues like the Games Development and the

directed; the muted pay-forplay issue; the opening of Croke Park; the hybrid football game with the AFL. "Whilst I have always been a staunch supporter of the Provincial Championships, nevertheless, one must be practical. When you look at both codes, some of the Provincial Championships are close to being non-events, or at best a one-game programme. In hurling, the situation is nearly

worse, and judging by the way that you people down in Kilkenny have advanced the game, hurling now is nearly a one game Championship. I do not say that by way of criticism of Kilkenny. No way! I have been an ardent supporter, and admirer of the Kilkenny style both on and off the field. They win with a terrific style. They lose with a greater style. But somehow I feel that we will have to re-visit the set ups again, and re-assess the values of the Provincial Championships, because, at present, they are still very lobsided, and non competitive".

Danny was very much aware of the huge importance of the issue of care and protection of children in the Association. "I always worked from a premise of duty and care of our young people, and we had a number of cases to address on those issues. I found it a difficult time, but we handled it very honestly, sincerely, and with due sympathy and integrity, but they were hard times for us as a national Association".

What always struck me about Danny Lynch was his courage in the eye of a storm, and there were many. It seemed to me, and I would not have been alone amongst my peers, that when there was a bad GAA story, Lynch stood alone, but when the news or the story was good, you would have to physically prevent the upper echelon of the Croke Park glitterati from taking the mike.

He has had tough assignments, often been called upon to defend the indefensible. I think of the Joe Higgins (Laois) debacle and his twin boys in a Parade; I think of Sean Boylan, Tommy Dowd, and the Sam Maguire being refused entry to Croke Park by a silly little man in a uniform; I think of the pay-for-play scenario, to which Lynch is diametrically opposed; I think of the hybrid game in Australia, of which again Lynch is not a fan; I think of the Offaly/Clare game when a dangerous situation was cooled by Lynch marching into the middle of the seated Offaly supporters, and leading them like the Pied Piper out of Croke Park.

There were many more.

The legend of Lynch is indelibly inscribed into the commemoration stone of the modern, evolving Cumann Lúthchleas Gael. He is only gone a few wet days from the place, and he is already missed. He will never be forgotten by an enormous army of us who loved and hated him, who admired and admonished him, but always respected him. Danny Lynch, he was never less than what it said on the

The second half went as anticipated, with the Kilkenny lads growing in stature.





a very long time. Dublin came with justified confidence, and they were somewhat unfortunate that they didn't return as Leinster Champions.

Fortune favoured both sides at varying intervals. Kilkenny led by 3-14 to 2-14 in the 61st minute. Dublin's David Sweeney tore through the Kilkenny defence and his blistering shot was saved. However it squirmed into the air, and half forward, Shane Martin pounced to slam home the equaliser.

If the Dublin lads thought that the power was with them during the extra time, they were jolted into realism very swiftly and clinically. Dublin were restricted to a single point during the extra time, whereas Kilkenny bagged a terrific 1-12. Of such determination are Championships won.

One would have to credit the abilities of the men on the sideline. Every one of their alterations, be it positional or substitutional was excellently managed. The All Ireland Final beckoned, with Limerick the opposition.

All Ireland Final

There was added pressure on Kilkenny in this Final, as they were the first of the four adult teams going into the Final arena. Kilkenny had not won the Intermediate title since 1973, and even at Junior level, the last title won dated back to 1995. To add an extra difficulty to the situation, Limerick were allowed, within rule, to use their second best team. Hence, the appearance of Ciarán Carey at full back, Pat O'Reilly and Alan O'Connor figuring among the forwards.

Limerick showed plenty of determination and no little skill in this encounter. Kilkenny were careful, if not spectacular. They were nervous too, and the fluidity of their natural game suffered. There was still much careful shadow boxing in the second half, but then Kilkenny exploded into life inside the last ten minutes with that seminal Hogan goal. That totally deflated the Limerick sail, and it was all over within a clinical few moments when Hogan added a brace of points.



new year brings with it new hopes expectations and aspirations. 2008 was to bring with it fulfilled expectations, and dashed hopes and a surprise. At the start of the year Kilkenny where contesting in 10 competitions between Leinster, League and All Ireland Championship. By November Kilkenny will have competed in and won 6 of those finals with two still to be played.

Kilkenny's U14s started the Inter-county season off, with a new management team at the helm lead by Paddy Kelly and Imelda Kennedy. Although the personnel had changed, Kilkenny continued their dominance of Leinster in this age group. The final was played in Thomastown, and Kilkenny won with an impressive score line of 4-12 to Dublin's 1-8. Not only did they win Kilkenny's first trophy of the season but also set the first of Kilkenny's new records this year, six consecutive Leinster u14 titles.

Kilkenny's U16's added their fourth All Ireland Title to their Leinster win against Dublin. Beating Cork in the final in Semple Stadium by 3-7 to 2-4 after trailing 1-4 to 1-2 at half time. Kilkenny have now contested the last five Al Ireland Finals and won the last four All under Liam Dunne and Stephen Dormer. Four titles in a row had never been achieved at this age group since the competition's inauguration in 1974. To put the icing on the cake the management team have been nominated as manager of the year a second nomination and hopefully this time they will leave City West with the plaudits.

The Kilkenny Minors so far have been the only winners of the Minor All Ireland since the competition

began in 2006 and they were not about to relinquish their crown easily. They met Clare in the All Ireland final and the cats were to prove too strong and show why they are defending champions out scoring Clare in the last quarter 1-5 to 0-2 eventually winning by 3-15 to 1-5. Edwina Keane (St. Martins) was named player of the match, and has also been nominated for Young Player of the Year.

Changes to the structures for the adult Inter-county grades meant that Kilkenny were competing at Senior and Intermediate grades. This was Kilkenny's first outing in the Intermediate grade and they struggled in the League, beating Cork but suffering defeats to Clare and Waterford. The team did show plenty of fighting spirit through the league and this was to be an important factor for the All Ireland. A place in the semi final was secured and the draw handed Kilkenny a match against Galway. It took two games to dispose of Galway, Kilkenny having to come back from a half time deficit each time. Cork where to provide their opposition in the final as they defeated a highly rated Derry. Kilkenny raced to a good half time lead getting goals when they needed them and finished the half leading by 4-3 to 1-5. The second half was to prove to be a testing time for the team, management and its supporters. Cork clawed back Kilkenny's lead and with seconds to go and the game hung in the balance when Collette Dormer caught a free and fired it to the back of the net. Cork had no time to respond as the puck out was taken and the whistle blew and Kilkenny where Intermediate All Ireland Champions for the first time on a score of 5-5 to 1The seniors where handed a tough draw in the League with both the All Ireland Finalists from 2007 in their group, but Kilkenny qualified for the final with wins against Dublin, Cork and Wexford. The final was played in Nowlan Park against Galway who had previously won the league two seasons before. It was to prove a tense affair with Kilkenny starting nervously but eventually securing the counties first league title since 1993 on a score of 3-11 to 0-17. Hopes were high in the county that a semifinal place could be secured in the championship but it did not work out for Kilkenny and they failed to Qualify for the Semi Finals despite beating All Ireland finalists Galway.

Kilkenny secured three All Star Nominations in 2008, Elaine Aylward (Mullinavat), Sinead Millea (Cashel) and Aoife Neary (James Stephens). On the night James Stephen's Aoife Neary won her first All Star Award and Liam Dunne and Steven Dormer secured the Manager of the Year Award. Edwina Keane (St. Martins) won the Leinster Young Player of the Year Award.

As 2008 draws to a close, it is time to reflect. This year has probably been the most successful year for Kilkenny in Camogie with three out of four All Irelands won, a national league title and a clean sweep in Leinster so far with two finals to play. Looking forward Kilkenny will challenge strongly at Minor next year probably starting as favourites. It will be difficult for Kilkenny to defend their Intermediate title as the vagaries of the grading system makes the players who won ineligible, but that team showed this year a never say die attitude and not many people would have put them on the top

12s unlucky to lose out in the final against Wexford. The GAA may be an amateur organisation, and the players may be amateurs, but making financial ends meet can be difficult.

This season, Kilkenny won four All-Ireland hurling finals at senior, intermediate, under-21, and minor level. In addition, teams were fielded in the senior football league, junior, under-21, and minor football championships and also in under-17, under-16, and under-14 hurling tournaments. The Kilkenny GAA Supporters Club currently plays a bigger and bigger role in helping the County Board finance all its operations. Since it was founded in 1991, the Kilkenny GAA Supporters Club has contributed over a million euro to the various boards and clubs within the county. The money has been spent in a variety of ways in providing better gear, facilities and back-up support for county teams while also supporting the official coaches employed by the board.

This year, for example the club has contributed €50,000 to the players' holiday fund, €19,000 towards the expenses of the four teams that won All-Irelands and €10,000 towards the various coaching schemes.

On top of that, the club gave financial assistance to the clubs who represented the county in the Leinster and All-Ireland club championships, in football as well as hurling. Clubs who represented Kilkenny in the Féile na nGael competition also received a contribution towards their expenses.

The other sections of Gaelic games - handball, camogie, schools, and ladies football, including the boards that supervise these games, also received a contribution towards their expenses.

The Supporters Club committee members also worked hard to make both the corporate and the banquet dinners a huge success, and they spearheaded the drive to sell €20,000 worth of raffle tickets for the fund-raising draw that was held on county final day.

All this was done by volunteers in the background who give their time freely and willingly because they want Kilkenny to be as successful as possible. The club's main fund raising ventures are membership subscriptions, an annual Golf Classic, a Race Day in Leopardstown and the sale of Kilkenny merchandise. The money raised through membership could be a real money spinner if Kilkenny people took the idea on board. In 1991 the membership of the club was less than 100. This year the figure has grown to nearly a 1000 but, in a county with a population in excess of 85.000, people there is still huge room for expansion,

Kilkenny teams enjoyed unprecedented success during 2008, and they gave us all great enjoyment during the year. All the victories came at a price, but, in all cases, the price was met, thanks in part to the members of the club.

By joining the club, you can play your part in insuring that the funds required to secure the future are available when required. The membership fee of €20 per year is a very small price to pay when you are rewarded with the success of the Kilkenny teams over the last ten years.

The membership is made up of people of all ages, our oldest member is Martin White who won an All-Ireland SH medals in 1932, '33 and '35 and the youngest member is Jack Buggy who was born on 2nd September 2008.

Tommy O'Brien

One of Kilkenny's best known and best loved sons......

On March 7th 2008, Kilkenny lost one of its best known and best loved sons. This was evidenced by the huge turn out at the removal on Saturday evening and the burial in Foulkstown on Sunday of Tommy O'Brien of Michael

Street.

Tommy was born in June 1944,

the oldest of nine children, to

the late Dan and Maureen O'Brien (née Waldron). He received his primary education at Kilkenny C.B.S. from where he won a scholarship that led to his second level education in St. Enda's Preparatory College. Having received a call to St. Patrick's Training College, Drumcondra in 1962 he qualified as a National Teacher there in 1964, winning the Gold Medal for Mathematics. Tommy's entire teaching career was spent in Kilkenny C.B.S. He joined the staff as an assistant teacher and later he was to become the first Lay

1984. For fifteen years he served as Principal up to the time of his early retirement in 1999. As a teacher, Tommy O'Brien was out of the top drawer. His insight into and his understanding of the pupils in his care was wonderful. A fair man, he had a unique way of combining firmness with great kindness and compassion and consequently brought out the best in all under his care. This too was easily witnessed by the huge numbers of past pupils and parents who attended on both days.

Principal of the famous city school in

Tommy's contribution to sport was immense. A good hurler himself, he was associated with various city teams in his young days and in latter years with Dicksboro. He steered many C.B.S. teams to famous victories in both hurling and football. He was an opponent to be respected, a man who was humble in victory and generous in defeat. He led C.B.S. to the Féile na nGael final in Cork in 1975 and when Féile came to Kilkenny in 1978 and 1979, Tommy, as an excellent Chairman, steered Cumann na mBunscoileanna through those two demanding years. On the administration front too he was Secretary of the County Football Board in 1968 and served as P.R.O. with Kilkenny County Camogie Board.

Handball, of course, was Tommy's big love. He was a skilful player in the alley, but he devoted much of his adult life to promoting and coaching young players and to the administration side of the game. His skill in fostering the game among the youth can be gauged by the names that came to the fore under his guidance. Little wonder then that his mortal remains were carried to St. John's Church on the shoulders of such greats as Michael 'Ducksie' Walsh, D.J. Carey, Eugene Downey, Paddy O'Reilly, Ollie Harold and Billy Bourke - All-Ireland champions all. Fair testimony to any man!

On the administration side of the game, Tommy was very involved with his local club, Talbot's Inch. He served as County Secretary of the Handball Board from 1968 to 1972 and was Chairman of the same board from 1973 to 1976. He was Leinster Secretary for over 30 years, although his late mother, Maureen, claimed that was her job! Tommy was honoured in the Handball world when in the Centenary Year for the G.A.A. in 1984 he was elected Uachtarán Comhairle Liathróid Láimhe na hÉireann, a post he held until 1987.

He had many links with local radio and was well known as a match commentator and sports pundit. He was a much sought after referee in his day in both G.A.A. and Handball circles and he was also a keen golfer. Tommy was a founder member of the Kilkenny Supporters' Club and was its P.R.O. He served as P.R.O. of the annual Kilkenny Sportstars' Awards and was their genial M.C. over many years.

Outside sport, Tommy, as a teacher, took a great interest in I.N.T.O. affairs. He was a member of the Kilkenny City Branch and attended Congress on many occasions. He had a beautiful voice and was a member for many years of the Unity Singers. He was also a member of the Kilkenny Musical Society and played leading roles in some of its productions. A man of many talents!




Development



Great work is being done at under age in the club and long may it continue. Every evening during the summer months Grennan is the hype of activity with teams from U-6 up to our




intermediates training and playing matches.


The U8's, U-10's and u-12's took part in a number of blitz's during the year and represented the club very well.

Developments





ARE YOU HERE?





Best to be upfront from the beginning...

The above headline is the very same one that appeared on the corresponding article in the 2003 Kilkenny GAA Yearbook and was followed by this intro: "From a Kilkenny point of view, how could it be? Without getting too parochial about it, there's little point in hiding light under a bushel, so here goes. All Ireland hurling titles in senior, minor, under-21, under-14, colleges' A, colleges' B and Féile na nGael. National League success. The senior title to go joint-top of the roll of honour with Cork. The minor title to do likewise. The county's second All Ireland senior, minor and under-21 treble, only the third time the feat has been achieved. The first back-to-back McCarthy Cups since Kilkenny themselves did the trick in 1992-93. The All Ireland senior and minor double in successive seasons, a unique achievement. And so on and on. To repeat, it doesn't get better than this. Frankly, it cannot. So eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die.'

It cannot get better than this? Well, such sentiments seemed fair enough at the time. The Cody period had, it appeared, reached its apogee. In reality, as it turned out, the man was only clearing his throat and the Cody period would eventually become the Cody era, the most successful age in the history of Kilkenny hurling. On the basis that you can read elsewhere in this publication about three-in-arows and grand slams and suchlike, it's no harm to point up not just the county's achievements in 2008 but their manner, specifically the style in which the three-in-a-row was completed and the elan with which the minors and under-21s hurled for the majority of their respective campaigns, if not quite on All Ireland final day itself. And even if both under-age teams had been pipped at the post, as might well have been the case, it wouldn't have mattered a jot in bigpicture terms. Unlike their 2007 counterparts, the Kilkenny minors and under-21s of 2008 comprehensively punched their weight, which is all that anyone could have asked of them in the first place but which wasn't the case that had invariably obtained in recent years. Credit to the players. Abundant credit to the team managements. Anyway, here's

how the remainder of the year went.



April: Kilkenny's interest in the National League ends at the semi-final stage on an afternoon when Tipperary come to Nowlan Park and record a splendid five-point win. Brian Cody doesn't appear unduly concerned afterwards and has every right not to; this is

the second Sunday of April, after all. Tipp are overjoyed and have every right to be; give or take last summer's upset of Cork in the All Ireland qualifiers, this is the county's first victory of genuine substance in years. Logic says that a McCarthy Cup triumph at the first attempt under the guidance of Liam Sheedy may be beyond them and that one or two hard lessons may have to be learned before a man wearing blue and gold ascends the steps of the Hogan Stand again. But make no mistake, Tipperary are a coming team, a point proved when they proceeded to see off Galway in the league final a fortnight later. The next time Tipp win an All Ireland, will we look back on 13 April 2008 as the day the road turned for them? It's a thought, nothing more.



May: Waterford are beaten out the gate by Mike McNamara's well prepared Clare in the opening round in Munster. A few days later Justin McCarthy has been unseated. A shocking display of ingratitude by players all too happy to forget about their three provincial

titles, not to mention last year's National League success, under McCarthy.? A lot of people take this view. But don't forget that it's the players who are putting their lives on hold for the promise of success on the hurling field. Are we seriously expected to believe that they should continue to play on under a manager who, rightly or wrongly, no longer has their confidence? Don't forget too that, irrespective of the fate that would befall them at Croke Park in September, Waterford ended up going farther in the championship under Davy Fitz than they did under Justin, immense as the latter's contribution to the fortunes of the

Déise unquestionably was. To put it another way, there are no grounds for asserting – as so many did and with such glee – that the Waterford players' rebellion blew up in their faces. It didn't.



June: To Portlaoise to see Offaly produce a manful effort in attempting to cope with the All Ireland champions' infinitely superior firepower. They're doing fine coming up to halftime until Martin Comerford breaks open the

game with the opening goal and the favourites go on to win as they like. If you wanted to carp you might

hold that Kilkenny had been making heavy weather of it thereto and that it shouldn't have taken a burst from Henry Shefflin, a man returning from injury, to set up the goal. There's rather more carping to be done about their first-half performance in the Leinster final a few weeks later when they spend 35 minutes trying to barrel their way through Wexford instead of playing their way around them. It is an unwelcome, albeit

brief, return to their 2002-04 approach – brief because the champions revert to playing hurling after the interval, create space up front, employ the angles and slap in five goals. For the first time in a number of meetings between the counties Wexford have managed to keep the game alive for more than half of the trip. For the first time since last year's All Ireland

last year's All Ireland quarter-final Kilkenny haven't a game wrapped up after 20 minutes. But that's about the height of it.

In the curtainraiser, against a fancied Wexford, the Kilkenny minors are a breath of fresh air. There is a welcome structure and pattern to their play. The team members know what they're doing, have clearly been well coached and demonstrate a neat appreciation of the use of space. It is a red-letter day for Richie

Mulrooney, the team manager, who's

had the good sense to bring in that wise old owl Brendan O'Sullivan, one of Kilkenny hurling's truly great men, as a selector. With the garrulous Thomas Breen banging over the points, this looks a side that will go a long way.



July: After Tipp dispose of Clare with aplomb in the Munster final, summer turns to high on successive magical weekends at Semple Stadium. First off, on a sunny Saturday evening, Waterford defeat a resurgent Offaly before 14man Cork come from behind to beat Joe

Canning – sorry, I mean Galway – in improbable circumstances. Eight days later in the All Ireland quarter-finals, Waterford touch Wexford off in a cracking encounter and Cork mount another stirring comeback to catch Clare on the finishing line. Cork will now enter the semi-final with momentum behind them, having had two hard matches in

September: Wow. That's not the only word for it but it's quite possibly the most suitable. Thirty-seven shots,

two wides, one save, one back off the upright, 33 scores. There has never been anything like it before and there will never be anything like it again in our lifetime – and that's a prediction I'm pretty sure I won't have to revise in five years' time.

For all the pace and poise of Kilkenny's hurling, the rigour that informed it was not the least impressive of the innumerable virtues displayed. There was no preening, no

freewheeling, no self-indulgence, no sitting on laurels, no mocking of labouring opponents. Far from disrespecting Waterford, the

winners paid them the compliment of busting a gut to beat them by as much as was humanly possible. Nothing personal, just business. Moments after hitting his second goal, Eddie Brennan was to be found out in the middle of the field wiring into Waterford players. TJ Reid announced his entry by hooking Jack Kennedy before he got around to landing the first of his four points. Brian Cody's men alright. And even in the flickering embers of a long-dead contest the winners still had the pedal to the metal, replying to Eoin Kelly's goal with the game's three closing points.

A few years ago Cody announced that he "didn't do tactics". He does them now, a development which demands plaudits to his selectors Martin Fogarty and Mick Dempsey. Martin Comerford's duty in the All Ireland final was obvious: prevent Ken McGrath getting the sliotar into his hand, a task Comerford carried out with both diligence and success. Declan Prendergast's weakness in the air at full-back had been clearly identified also; everything that was slung

in to Richie Power was slung in at head height and Power duly had a field day in terms of winning possession. As was the case against Cork, opposition puckouts found the Kilkenny wing-forwards dropping back almost on top of their own half-back line, meaning not only that there was an extra layer of protection for the defence but also that there was more space up front for the full-forwards to run into – witness Aidan Fogarty in the first half of the semifinal or Eddie Brennan ghosting from the right-hand corner into the unmanned acreage of the left for one of his points against Waterford - once their colleagues gained possession out the field.

Does the magnitude of their victory render Kilkenny the greatest hurling team ever? There existing no foolproof touchstone for comparing teams of different eras, it is a question that cannot be answered satisfactorily. All that can be said for sure is that, with six All Ireland titles in nine seasons, Cody's Kilkenny are the most successful team in the annals of the sport, with any possible quibbles that remained after 2007 firmly banished. The defeat of Cork left them with a positive percentage record against every Munster county they've met during the Cody era. (Played

16 Won 13 Drew 1 Lost 2, Average Winning Margin 7.15 points.) Kilkenny even had – at long last and quite rightly – a team in the National Football League this year, leaving one chestnut fewer to be raised. That diehard Gaelic football man Liam Hayes declared the Sunday after the hurling final that he was "still exhilarated" at the memory of the winners' display.

'oel Hickey very nearly didn't make it into the heat of Championship hurling in 2008. Even after the team returned from an exhausting trip to Australia and New Zealand, the talk was all about injury problems, and the headlines ran riot with amateur prognoses. Martin Comerford, James "Cha" Fitzpatrick, Richie O'Neill, John Tennyson all featured on back pages from Gweedore to Ballylickey. But another name was slowly creeping into the frame with little mention, and speculation.

The Dunnamaggin farmer, Noel Hickey, having survived an earlier setback in the middle of 2005, took no part whatsoever in the National League campaign. His first active hurling was the opening round of the St.Canices Credit

Union League game against Young Irelands from Gowran.

There was more speculation about Hickey's injury, and its importance to the overall hurling context, than there was to the " will he or won't he play" talk about the great DJ.

Noel's injuries did not improve as a result of his assisting his beloved Dunna. He continued to play with the green and gold, but his thigh was conspicuously encased in an enormous wrapping of bandage.

Cork hammered their way through to the All Ireland semifinals, having unexpectedly taken care of the Joe Canning-fired Galway along the route.

Kilkenny support gave a tremendous sigh of relief when they saw the number three geansai on the broad back of Noel Hickey. The Kilkenny defence was now restored to its proper order as the punters saw it.

In the Kilkenny People, John Knox was bubbling in admiration of the returning full back.

"Noel Hickey. Wow! He returned to the Championship arena with a bang, and cleaned out the rich talent that is Joe Deane". Cork were put to the sword. Kilkenny were on their way to a possible three-timer, and they were very happy that the Dunnamaggin full back was back minding the family silver on the front doorstep.

He has had such a stellar career as a club hurler and most certainly as a Kilkenny county hurler at every grade. But he was not born a county hurler. He is the youngest of all the Hickey family down in Danganmore, the home of Ann and the dearly departed, Andy, a fierce hurling man.

He first played the game competitively in the National School in Dunnamaggin. He certainly looked the least likely of all of the Hickey brothers to make it onto the big time hurling stage. He looked very slight, and he was forced to wear glasses, even to play hurling.


"I had to wear glasses playing as I had difficulty in picking up the flight of the ball. But all of the lads had some problems with their eyes. I eventually wore contact lenses, and then in 2006, I was advised to go to Jim O'Reilly down in Waterford, and he performed this well-publicised laser treatment. It was terrific, and now I have no problems whatsoever with picking up the flight of the ball. Mr.Costello, our teacher in Dunnamaggin, was a great man to all us young lads at the time. He put us into all of the under-age competitions, and I will always remember going into Nowlan Park for the Primary Schools Finals. That was a great thrill for us", said Noel. Like all of my brothers, I went to Callan CBS where the big men were Br.Damien Brennan and Tom (Walsh). I owe a lot to them too", he said.

You notice that he refers to Tom Walsh as Tom, not out of disrespect, but out of a friendship that was cultivated between the iconic Callan teacher, and every one of the students that chanced to come in contact with him.

"You remember we beat St.Kierans College in a memorable Leinster Colleges Final in Nowlan Park, and we felt that nothing could surpass that. I mean, to beat Kierans for Callan, was like Wicklow winning the Leinster hurling final", said he with a freshening smile at the returning memory.

His next greatest memory is as a minor hurler with Dunnamaggin, when in 1998, they managed to get to the Roinn A County Final.

since they first came together. I mean, never!

Dunnamaggin, with top class underage hurlers being supplemented by a galaxy of honest foot soldiers, beat the famed Village. Noel Hickey had played the entire campaign as a centre forward- they had no forwards of note. On Final day, Fennelly packed his defence to thwart the high-powered Village attack. It worked like a dream. After frustrating the efforts of the excellent Village forwards, Dunnamaggin threw caution to the breeze and moved Noel to centre back. Still holding the Village forwards, Hickey, with his brother Canice behind him, Kenny Moore at midfield with Colin Herity, and Liam Heffernan as a lethal forward went on to win.

'I will never forget that win as long as I live", beamed Noel. Noel Hickey met Brian Cody for the first time.

Noel was on the Kilkenny minor team in 1998, thus completing the Hickey dynasty on Kilkenny minor teams, as all of his brothers, Jim, Tom, Canice, and John had all figured.

He was deliriously happy with the under-21 All Ireland win over Galway in '99 – he was captain.

He made his Senior Inter County debut against Dublin in the Leinster semi-final in 2000 at corner back. He was moved to full back against Offaly in the Final, a win that was more pleasing to the likes of Willie O'Connor, DJ Carey, Charlie Carter, and John Power than himself, as they had failed to the Faithful on the two previous occasions in '98, and '99.

From there it has been an unimaginable roller coaster of highs for the great Dunnamaggin man.

He has great memories of every game, every player, every mentor,

and every opponent.

He was told on the morning of the Kilkenny Senior County Final against Gowran by Brendan Fennelly that he was going in against Dick Carroll. He was 17 years of age. Brendan Fennelly knew what he was doing. Noel had played a bit of a challenge with the senior lads the week before the Final.

What a baptism!


He will tell you that his greatest All Ireland memory involved the 2006 All Ireland win over Cork.

"That was a great match, and there was a great sense of relief when the final whistle went", he remarked.

Noel Hickey is just a very ordinary young Irish country lad, with no pretensions of grandeur, no illusions about what he has achieved, nor is he in any shape or form self-opinionated.

He respectfully pays due regard to all of the people that have helped him get where he is at present, but he is also well aware that now is only temporary.

However, even though he would be rather shy to admit it, one person above all others was a real gem in the long line of people who helped him along the road to greatness, who was his confidante when he was down, who listened and comforted when the blight of injury was most evident, who directed him with valuable advice, who was never less than encouraging, who walked every step beside him during the dark days of 2007------his Mother, Ann.

The outsider of the County's four starters in the Leinster and All Ireland championship series, Kilkenny's under Twenty One hurlers', path would be marked "Progress" with a first round win over Provincial champions Dublin in late June. A defeat by the championship favourites would confirm that Kilkenny had remained static since their meeting at minor level in Carlow three years previously.

As it was, newly appointed manager Michael Walsh and his backroom team of Pat Walsh, Pat McCormack and James Meagher had other ideas and met the challenge head on. Dublin in First Round





Galway in Thurles Semi-final

Led by hurling sensation Joe Canning, who had recently bagged 2-12 in Galway's senior battle with Cork, hopes rested on another fine performance by the Paddy Hogan, Kieran Joyce Paul Murphy axis. Almost injury-free and coming off the back of a recent round of club championship games, hope and confidence was growing for our chances.

Kilkenny opened well and were 0-7 to 0-2 ahead after twenty minutes. Having had the greater portion of the play and having been off target on a number of occasions, they were stunned to be going in level at the break after a late Galway goal. In a blistering start to the second half, Galway led three times by the minimum amount but Colin Fennelly and John Mulhall points kept tabs on them. Kilkenny stepped up the pace after ten minutes and went on to lead by five points when Richie Hogan goaled following a Matthew Ruth pass. Unable to stretch away as John Greene and Conor Kavangh points and two Joe Canning line balls kept on the pressure, the score stood at a shaky 1-14 to 1-12 for Kilkenny as the tie entered its final five minutes. In the end, it took a second Ritchie Hogan goal set up by TJ Reid to give the side a five point lead and Galway could only reduce it by one as they saw their title go on a score of 2-14 to 1-13.

The Noresiders, showing great character, rallied with a Ritchie Hogan free and a great effort by John Mullhall. This was crucially followed by a fine save in a one-to-one situation by keeper Colin McGrath that surely helped to stem the tide. Two further Tipp points had the lead down to the dreaded two point margin when Niall Walsh added a monster effort and Tipp quickly replied. All were on tenterhooks as the blue-and-gold-clad Patrick Maher foraged through the defence with the ball and hit the deck in the square. The relief was palpable as a free out resulted and Kilkenny went downfield to tack on two further points to take the title on a 2-13 to 0-15 scoreline. For the stewards manning the sidelines as the rains bucketed down at the final whistle, there was no need for Plan B as hurling supporters present stood back and admired the achievement while others nationwide were in awe of the county's fourth All Ireland success in three

As the side celebrated in victory deep under the Cusack Stand, County secretary Ned Quinn sang the County Anthem in honour of the occasion – the victory, the drawing level with Cork's eleven titles, the part they played in Kilkenny's Hurling Grand slam and the season that delivered an all Ireland medal to most clubs in the county to nurture the game for the years ahead.

As each stepping stone was reached the ultimate goal of being the best in the country was finally achieved in Kilkenny's most memorable hurling year.



Sad Loss For Kilkenny Handball

Death of Tommy O'Brien overshadows court successes

While Kilkenny Handball can look back on a very eventful year, the death of Tommy O'Brien early in the year overshadows all the on court successes.

As President of the Irish Handball Council from 1984 to1987, Tommy also served as Leinster secretary for over 30 years, and on many provincial and national committees during this time.

Renowned for his quick wit and tremendous organisational skills, Tommy was known the length and breadth of Ireland.


At local level, he made a huge contribution to Kilkenny GAA in various ways. He served as PRO to the County Camogie Board, was a regular commentator at hurling and camogie matches on local radio and over the years had been involved in the development of two of the city clubs, O'Loughlins and Dicksboro. He also hosted a very popular weekly GAA show on Kilkenny/ Carlow radio and was known to many people as 'Mr Handball'.

In his profession as a school teacher, Tommy received the ultimate honour when he became the first Lay Principal of Kilkenny CBS primary school. His popularity at the school was evident when over 600 people attended his retirement party a number of years ago. His ability to remember and recall statistics regards Handball and GAA matches was almost legendary, and this same remarkable trait applied to his professional career where he knew the name of every boy in his school. On the Handball court, the Talbots Inch club man was a very competitive Doubles player, and won honours at local and provincial level, along with National League titles.

His loss to Handball has left a huge void which will be very difficult to fill, and at his removal, large crowds attended on both days, with supporters of the Handball community travelling from all over Ireland to pay their last respects to a true gentleman of the game.

Champions

On the court, Kilkenny achieved a number of notable successes during 2008. In 60 x 30 Junior B Singles, Ger Anthony (Mullinavat)



won his first All Ireland title, while at Juvenile level, Eoghan Hennessy (Clogh) capped a remarkable year for him when winning the All Ireland 60 x 30 U16 Singles crown. Since Eoghan started competing at Leinster level in the U11 age group he has remained undefeated in the province, a fantastic achievement.

Maria Walsh (Kells) also had a brilliant 2008 as she won 40 x 20 Girls U15 Doubles with Rachel Hogan (Kilfane) and then, in the same grade, took the 60 x 30 title with Demi Donovan (St.Canices).

Others points of note during the year were the two U14 Doubles titles won by Ciára Mahon and Mary Phelan (Clogh), while in 40 x 20, Kilkenny produced All Ireland winners in Boys U15 Singles, Peter Funchion (Kells) and Boys U17 Doubles, Keith Burke and Jason Delaney (O'Loughlins).

At Adult level, Ducksie Walsh, as expected, dominated in Masters when taking all four titles, again partnered by Pat Maher (Clogh), while in 40 x 20, Philly Parsons (O'Loughlins) and Martin Lalor (Talbots Inch) were winners in Silver Masters A Doubles.

In the 60 x 30 championships, the Golden Masters B Singles title went to former Kilkenny hurler, Joe Hennessy (O'Loughlins) as he picked up his first All Ireland Handball crown.

Kilkenny also scored All Ireland wins in Junior B Doubles with Stephen Barcoe (Goresbridge) and Eamon Holohan (Kilfane) taking the honours, and in the Silver Masters A championship, Billy Burke (O'Loughlins) was a winner in Singles and Doubles, partnered by Johnny Brennan (Mothel).

Near Misses

During 2008, Kilkenny players won Leinster titles but failed to add All Ireland honours.

Ducksie Walsh contested another 60 x 30 Senior Singles final against Eoin Kennedy (Dublin), losing 21-5, 21-12, while in the Intermediate Singles decider, Nicholas Anthony (Mullinavat) went down to Ger Coonan (Tipperary), 21-1, 21-8.

Kells duo, Ger McGrath and Patrick Funchion lost their 40 x 20 semi final to Tyrone and in the 60 x 30 championships, were beaten finalists against Limerick.

Ulster opposition proved the stumbling block for local players in the 40 x 20 championships, defeating Kilkenny in a number of grades at the All Ireland semi final stage. 
Nationals Championships, coming home as winner of the 40+ Singles and Doubles events, partnered by Egin Jensen (Dublin).



Rock-Solid PJ Hoping for More Gold



PJ Ryan, Kilkenny Goalkeeper By Richard Holden

Goalkeeping has always been in P.J. Ryan's blood and the Fenians clubman has performed with distinction for the Kilkenny seniors since taking over as first choice from James McGarry last year. P.J.'s father, P.J. Snr., won five county senior titles with the Fenians and also three All-Ireland senior medals in 1974, 1975 and 1979 as sub-keeper to Noel Skehan.

P.J. has not always played in goal. He won a Leinster Under-21 medal at centre-back while for his club, Fenians, he played in two County Finals: at right-half-back against Glenmore in 1995 and centre-back against Graigue-Ballycallan in 1998. 'I didn't mind playing in the backs but I was always interested in playing on goal. My mother wasn't too keen on me playing there – she'd be afraid I'd make a mistake and we wouldn't win – that's why I went in late to the goals!'

Which goalies did he admire? 'Mickey Walsh, Ger Cunningham and Davy Fitzgerald are three that stand out. I learned a lot too from James McGarry, particularly in the way to train. James always went in early to training working on his touch. Everything was done at a hundred miles an hour and he trained as if it was like playing in a match. I've never seen anyone with a better attitude.'

P.J. joined the county senior panel in 2002, though he was sub-keeper for the 1999 All-Ireland Final when called up to replace the injured Martin Carey a few days before the match. He got his chance during the 2003 National League when James McGarry broke his ankle, and played in the Final against Tipperary, bringing off a memorable save from John Carroll as Kilkenny won a brilliant match by a point. A month later, the Johnstown man made his Championship debut against Dublin in the Leinster semi-final but James McGarry took over in goal for the remainder of the

Championship.

How did he find the role of sub-keeper? 'You knew you'd be brought on if anything happened to James - some of the other subs mightn't come on if one of the outfield players got injured or was replaced. I always enjoyed going in training. P.J. made the position his own last season after playing well in the League. He suffered a major scare during the All-Ireland semi-final against Wexford when breaking a bone in his left arm but made a miraculous recovery to line out in the Final.

The 31-year-old continued his good form during 2008, and kept a clean sheet in Kilkenny's Championship wins over Offaly, Wexford, Cork and Waterford. In that respect, was he disappointed not to receive an All-Star? 'No, the lads who got them

'We have a new manager for next season, Mick O'Flynn – formerly the physical trainer with the Kilkenny seniors. There are a few good young lads coming through so hopefully we'll keep progressing.'

During his spare time, P.J. likes playing and watching soccer – he supports Manchester United and Celtic - and watching American Football. We wish the Johnstown man all the best for the new season – one which promises more exciting challenges.

Trying to remember it all

PM O'Sullivan

Hugh: To remember everything is a form of madness. Brian Friel, "Translations" (1980).

There is nothing unusual, all across Ireland, about an interest in the past. History comes in every shape and size. True, there are the versions of history studied first at school and thereafter, by some, at university. This sense of history is the term's most briskly recognized sense: academic history, narratives written from above by professional historians. Truthfully, this sphere leaves quite a few people cold. They find such work daunting to read and far too dry

Still, history books sell unusually well in Ireland. There is no question but that the Irish public is notably devoted to reading about the world inhabited by its forebears. That 20th-century history has a particular grip comes as no surprise. The lives of many families' grandparents and great-grandparents intersected with the broad currents of Ireland's progress in fascinating ways. Perhaps this dynamic is at its most compelling as it bears on the War of Independence and the Civil War. Most families have a tale to tell in this regard.

Which or whether, the general preoccupation prompts many conversations, whether at kitchen table or pub counter. 'Tracing' the term many people give to knowledge about the seed, breed and generation of families, is still a popular pursuit, if one more associated with older folk. All the same, at around 30 years of age, nearly everyone starts to take more of an interest in their own background, the influences that made them what they are. Often enough, this gravitation goes hand in hand with having a nephew or a niece or a child of your own. Only then does the complex nature of any background strike fully home, only then when the power of the influences a child undergoes in its earliest years are plain to see.

Hurling, especially in Kilkenny, is a large part of these conversations about the past. We value former hurlers no less than those of present summers. There can be few Kilkenny natives, of whatever age, for whom names such as Lory Meagher and Paddy Phelan do not strike a sweet chord. Yet the number of people who actually saw them hurl are very few now and are growing scarcer by the day. This point in time, it is oral tradition and word of mouth that keeps those names ashine.

again, I imagine that I will, even if I reach a venerable age myself, never forget some of Ger Fennelly's play against Glenmore in the 1985 County Final.

So-called oral tradition is also history, then, but in a special fashion. Much of value is preserved in this medium as well as through paper and ink. It is therefore all the more welcome that the GAA has embarked on a new initiative focused on the organization's contours, an initiative that places said forms of remembrance right at the centre of the undertaking. This work has been named ' GAA Oral History project ' and it is worth quoting from the official press release of November 12th last. President

Nickey Brennan, a keen advocate of the scheme, is quoted on its ambition: "This is a project about the GAA: our games, our people, our history, our place in Irish life. No sporting organisation anywhere in the world has attempted to do what this project will do."

The release continued: "A questionnaire will be made available to every club, club historian, local history society and Junior Cert teacher, in hard copy and via the Web, to be filled out by or used been involved with the GAA. This will history at the most personal and local level. In its entirety the project will create a series of books, websites, radio and television programmes, as well as a searchable

digital archive which will be permanently housed in the GAA museum." Very obviously, this project is about as laudable as a cul-

All that said, there should be a note of caution. Conor Denieffe, author of The Continent Abú (1999), a tremendous history of gaelic games in St John's Parish, noted how the historical record in print often diverged from individual recollection. The very fact that someone remembers a particular game or a specific incident in a certain way does not mean the memory, in and of itself, is entirely correct as

Personally, as someone born in 1967, I have no knowledge whatsoever of Paddy Phelan's gifts as a hurler. Yet I somehow feel convinced he was the greatest of them all because of the strange note that comes into elderly voices when I ask them about the Sart native. These observers invariably speak of how they cannot do justice to his extraordinary gifts. Martin White, who hurled intercounty with Paddy Phelan for seven dramatic seasons in the 1930s, as well as club with Tullaroan, once described to me a particular clearance that Phelan made in a league tie against Limerick. Martin said no other player, then or since, has had such pure skill. That a stroke of the sliotar in a nigh forgotten match lived on vividly in someone's memory for over 70 years is truly remarkable. Then

Of course, the very phenomenon of recalling events in this partially correct manner is itself of interest. A recent example of this truth came in Michael Moynihan's Blood Brothers: The Inside Story of the Cork Hurlers 1996-2008 (2008). Therein Sean Óg Ó hAilpín recounts how a Kilkenny mentor allegedly threw a hurl at his brother Setanta during the second half of the 2003 All-Ireland Final, thereby impeding him from taking a score. As the recording of this game clearly shows, no such incident happened. It is very telling that emotion and fact's entanglement can still happen in an era where visual coverage of GAA matches is a commonplace. How much more might this credo be made of pre-television era? With memories of winning and losing, with so many shades of feeling


attendant, there is always room for what might be termed "therapeutic error". Emotion always plays a large part where sport is concerned.

Not that print sources are blemish-free on this front. Far from it, of which more below. I have been thinking a lot about these issues because I was fortunate enough to be commissioned by Gill & Macmillan, last August, to write a history of Kilkenny hurling. This work's emphasis will be on social history, the texture of participants' lives, an emphasis for which oral modes will be a prereq-

uisite. It is not just players and ex-players that will have to be interviewed since the GAA

club. However, achieving this end will be a very difficult task.

An example from print sources: press for the Minor sides of 1950, a season when Kilkenny, most unexpectedly, ultimately beat Tipperary in the All-Ireland Final. For the Leinster Final, I noticed in the account of the Kilkenny People that a D. Flynn (Knocktopher) was listed among the subs. The same man did not

feature thereafter, which was not unusual, since Minor panels were subject to quite a lot of flux over the course of a season until quite recent times. Being from just outside Knocktopher, this detail naturally caught my eye. I knew of no such person and so rang the father. I am the eldest of the fifth generation of us in the parish and a good bit of 'tracing' has accrued in family circles. It turned out the hurler in question was a Jim Flynn from Castlecolumb, who emigrated to England in the 1950's.

Given my origins, I would not be au fait with the north of the county. Accordingly, if the player in question had hailed from Ballyraggett, I would have let the error go. Only very specific local knowledge came to my aid. Hence the vertigo. A final example: a granduncle of mine, Joe Lannon from Thomastown, hurled Junior for Kilkenny in 1952. He is both 'Joe Shannon' and 'Joe Lennon' in the Kilkenny People. Again, it is only chance that I am able to amend this kind of error. Names count and count an awful lot. I will have to find strategies to sift these errors from areas outside my own domain.

The history I am writing for Gill & Macmillan will not be a " facts and figures "-type publication. Yet trying to remember all that happened, however impossible the aspiration, is still a form of holy madness. It is a way of paying tribute to those passed and gone, those who gave the same sort of pleasure in their day as granted us today by the present vintage's successes.

Gratitude, end of day, is all.



The Leinster semi-final was played on 17th







The Happy Wanderer

The Man who played championship hurling in four different counties....

This is the story of a brilliant wing forward who played senior club championship hurling in four different counties and played senior inter- county hurling with three of them. He also figured prominently with the American team who toured Ireland in 1911.

Pierce Purcell was born at Bawnmore, Johnstown in the late nineteenth century. After a short period at St. Kieran's College he was apprenticed to the drapery business of J.K. Molony in Thurles.

Pierce got a place on the Thurles Blues (Sarsfields) side at 18 and played beside many hurlers of All Ireland fame including Tom Semple and Hawk O'Brien.

Better prospects were then offered to Pierce by friends in America. During his short time there he played many star matches with Tipperary N.Y. team. In the summer of 1911, Pierce was requested to come home and help on the family farm. In June 1911 Pierce got a telegram to say he was selected on the American representative side to play Wexford. The Irish American side also played Tipperary, Kilkenny, Dublin, Boherlahan, Limerick and Cork.

Back in business in Thurles, Pierce captained a Tipperary Junior Team to win the Munster and All Ireland championship. His most important game of all was the postponed and substitute All Ireland final Tipp v Kilkenny at Dungarvan. Kilkenny won by 5 points (1911 championship).

After a short spell in

After a short spell in Killenaule, Pierce moved to the Monster House, Kilkenny City. He won two county senior champi-

onships with Johnstown and Tullaroan. He played with Kilkenny against Laois in the Leinster final of 1915, the year of Laois's only All Ireland to date.

Pierce then transferred to Young Ireland's Waterford having taken up employment in Waterford City. He won two County Championships and played in all Waterford's inter county games until 1921. Pierce got involved in the Irish Freedom Struggle and was imprisoned on Spike Island, Cobh. After escaping and participating in the civil war, Pierce moved to Dublin.

He played his last match with the Draper's Team (C.J. Kickham's). They lost to Garda in the Dublin County championship. Pierce Purcell at 32 years hung up his boots. Thus ended a remarkable career, having played inter-county hurling for Kilkenny, Tipperary, Waterford and in the American-Ireland internationals.

He bounced the ball 3 times on his hurley during the pre-match puck around.

The centre-fielders "covered every blade of grass".

Yes but only between the 2 halfback lines and usually in a horizontal position.

The half-forwards "were unlucky in their shooting".

They put the fear of God in those who were seated near the corner flag.

The corner-forwards "foraged for every ball".

They rooted for the ball so often that they could have competed in the World Ploughing Championship.

The full-forward "needed early ball". He was a half an hour behind the full-back in the chase for every delivery.

The centre-back

"completely dominated his patch".

Totally unfit he managed to bat a few balls on the 45 metre line.

The left-half-back "showed some deft touches".

The referee "was unobtrusive and contributed to a free-flowing game". His mind being on the post-match reception, he decided that only capital offences should be punished.

Pat Molloy

News of the sudden death of Pat Molloy in September 2008 was met with great sadness in the parish of Tullaroan and the greater FAA community in Kilkenny and further afield.

While a promising hurler in his early years, Pat like many others of the time emigrated to England in the late 1950's in search of employment and hurled with Eire Og in Salisbury, Wiltshire with great success. Returning to Tullaroan in 1969 he built a successful business career and continued his playing career until his late thirties. He quickly immersed himself again in local parish and GAA affairs and served the Tullaroan club with distinction in many other roles, including secretary, treasurer, chairman and selector and was the trainer of the 1983 Junior championship winning team.

Pat was a proud Tullaroan man, and delighted with the 1994 senior championship victory after such a long wait, and he was especially moved when the youngsters of Tullaroan were crowned All Ireland Feile na nGael champions in 1997. Off the field Pat was heavily involved with the arrangements to celebrate the club's centenary in 1984, and worked with many others on the publication of the 'Famous Tullaroan' book, which allowed him to combine two of his greatest interest, GAA and Irish history. He was deeply involved with the development of the Lory Meagher Heritage Centre and GAA museum, where he worked tirelessly with the Hogan family and many others to preserve and restore this wonderful historical building, and was in his element collating the rich GAA history for future generations, from all corners of the country.

Ever the fundraiser, Pat took on the role as chairman and organiser of the Kilkenny GAA Board Lotto since it's inception in 1995, which contributed significantly to the funding of the County Board and many individual clubs during this period. Pat was also the chairman of the local Building Development committee and was eagerly awaiting the official opening of this fine complex in the local sports grounds. This

brand new complex will be a lasting testament to his tireless efforts for the community.

For the huge numbers who attended his funeral mass, Pat will be remembered whenever "The Rose of Moocoin" is heard, and he will forever remain in the hearts of his family and friends in the parish of Tullaroan.

Thomas Meehan 1948 - 2008

The news of the sudden death of Thomas Meehan aged 59 a native of Cussane and London deeply saddened all who new him. In recent years he returned to Butlerswood and had only travelled back to London. Thomas was a prominent hurler and with brothers Patsy, Eamon and Seamus were on the Windgap side that made the historic breakthrough from junior ranks in 1970 and later qualified for the senior quarter finals in 71, 73 and the semi in 74. In 1974 he emigrated to work in construction and joined the Brian Borus club. In defence he won four London Senior Hurling Championships in 1975, 79, 80 and 1982 qualifying for All Ireland Club Championship appearances against Ardrahan, Ballycastle, Blackrock and Moycarkey Borris.

Having captained the Brian's he played

Senior with London in the All Ireland "B" Final's of 81 and 82 and collected awards with Windgap, Factory League medals with Grannagh Board and Paper Mills in 68 and 70, London Senior Hurling League, Ryan Cup and a seven a side championship of Britain in 1977.

Having retired playing he continued in the Pub Business and was known as a hard worker with great character and wit. As a tribute past players and members of the now defunct Brian Borus Club gathered from far and wide to hold a guard of honour at his funeral in Greenford North London.

Thomas is survived by his wife Mary his daughter Laura sons Colin and Thomas, brothers Patsy, Eamon, Seamus, sisters Mary, Ellie and Pauline.

Denis Philpott 1943-2008

Many people were shocked to hear of the death of Denis on 8 November. Only a few weeks earlier he was on the sideline in Nowlan Park, guiding Dicksboro in the county minor hurling final. While Denis had been ill for some time, characteristically, he had continued his deep involvement as a GAA coach, and mentor of young hurlers.

Born in the Lough, Cork, Denis attended Coláiste Críost Rí and was one of seven pupils of that school who brought Cork their first All Ireland minor football title in 1961.

He represented Cork in junior and senior football in 1963-64. But his greatest contribution in the sixties was his inspiration as manager, coach, and captain of UCC as they won two Sigerson Cups, two Fitzgibbon Cups and four Cork senior championships in a glorious phase for 'College'. His playing career ended prematurely due to injuries.

After a spell teaching in Gorey, Denis moved to St. Kierans College as a teacher of geography and history in 1970. He re-introduced football to the school (despite opposition) and for the next seven years St. Kieran's became very serious Leinster senior A football contenders, reaching three semi-

finals, a remarkable feat.

He joined Dicksboro when he came to Kilkenny and coached a multitude of teams over many years to county success. He was a selector when Kilkenny captured the 1991 All Ireland minor hurling title. He coached St. Kieran's College to All Ireland senior hurling titles in 1993 and 1996. Later he coached Young Irelands. At all times he was the wise head and the shrewd judge of hurling talent.

Denis was acknowledged widely as an extraordinary motivator, who loved a challenge, who taught his players never to back down. Generations of Kilkenny hurlers knew they were privileged to be coached by Denis because his tremendous enthusiasm and his pithy sayings generated a great sense of fun and positive spirit in every training session.

He knew and coached hurlers in most counties, he was a wonderful raconteur and entertainer, a much loved teacher, a proud republican and a devoted family man. To his wife Catherine, children Una, Joseph, Niamh, Emer and Kieran we offer our deepest sympathy.

The community of Danesfort and the GAA world in Kilkenny mourned the sad loss and death of one of its most promising young stars, Shane O'Neill, on 31st March

Shane had an immense passion for the game of hurling from his earliest days. As a primary school student he played in the Kilkenny City Class Leagues with Gaelscoil Osraí, who had the distinction of never losing a match from 2nd to 6th class. He continued his hurling prowess in St. Kieran's College where in 5th year he became a member of the senior panel and in 6th year played wing forward on the St. Kieran's team in the Leinster Final 2006. Shane played club hurling with James Stephen's where he won an U-16 Roinn A Championship in 2002. In 2003 he returned to play with Danesfort and was a vital part of the Danesfort team that won the U-16 Roinn B hurling final thus having the unique distinction of winning a Roinn A and a Roinn B hurling title with two different clubs. This was followed by a Division 2 U-16 Football title in the same year. He won U-21 Roinn B Hurling and football Championships in 2005 and a

Junior Championship medal in 2006. Shane studied Civil Engineering at UCD and played at midfield in the 2007 All-Ireland Freshers Final against UCC. Shane's character was hallmarked by dedication and hard work and it pervaded into everything he did, be that work, study or sport. Jimmy Bergin, long serving and loyal caretaker of Nowlan Park died in January of this year. A minutes silence was observed for him at the opening County Board meeting of the new year at which newly-elected Chairman, Paul Kinsella paid tribte to the well-loved groundsmansaid ""He was a part of Nowlan Park," suggested Paul, "He was there longer than any of us. He could be seen, but he was never heard." He said that everyone and every club in Kilkenny was delighted when Jimmy won the top prize of a car in the players' holidayfund raffle on county final day. "The GAA has lost a true friend," he added.

The following is taken from an article by Barry Hickey, piblished in the 2006 Kilkenny GAA Yearbook.

Jimmy was born in 1922 just outside Kilkenny City. He was the son of a farmer and he always had a great love of the land. He worked on the small farm with his father prior to taking up the position as 'grass cutter' in Nowlan Park in 1952.

In April of 1952 Jimmy was approached by the Secretary of the County Board, Paddy Grace and the famous Jim Langton and he was asked if he would help out with the cutting of the grass in Nowlan Park. Jimmy stated that it didn't take him very long to make up his mind as Paddy Grace and Jim Langton were heroes in Kilkenny that time and he felt honoured to be asked to get involved by them.

As the years rolled on Jimmy became more involved and it meant that he had to be in Nowlan Park up to seven days a week as the demands on the pitch became great. His work had him cutting grass, lining the pitch, putting up goal nets, putting out flags, and cleaning out dressing rooms and toilets. He also operated the scoreboard in the early days for the important games and he stated that this was a difficult task when the weather was wet and cold as the scoreboard was out in the open. Jimmy has great memories from Nowlan Park of great games and meeting some of the top players in the Country. He spoke especially about former players like Eddie Keher, Christy Ring, Mick Mackey, Frank Cummins and Ollie Walsh. He stated that it always gave him great pleasure getting the pitch ready for players of this calibre. As against that, he stated that the excitement attached to an under 10 game in Nowlan Park is also something which stands out in his mind.

Jimmy Bergin has given his life to the GAA in Kilkenny. He is in his eighty third year this year and if you go along to Nowlan Park you will most likely meet with up with Jimmy as he drops in to see if the 'Park' is being well maintained. Both Timmy Grogan and Mick O'Neill now look after the 'upkeep' in Nowlan Park and they are always very aware that Jimmy still likes to keep 'an eye' on them. Jimmy states that he looks forward to going to Nowlan Park as much now as he did the first day he got the call from Paddy Grace and Jim Langton. Jimmy always speaks very highly of the officers of the County Board who held the positions of responsibility down through the years. He stated that they all deserve great credit for the great work that they do on a voluntary basis for the GAA. He also stated that things have changed for the better along the way and he is happy about that.

In March of 2006, Jimmy and his family, along with some officers of the County Board, attended a function in Croke Park when Sean Kelly the then President of the GAA presented Jimmy with his award. Jimmy was nominated for this

award by Kilkenny County Board and the honour bestowed on Jimmy was very well deserved. Ar dheis Dé go raibh sé.

CON O'Shea of Vicar Street, Kilkenny and formerly Listry, Beaufort, Co Kerry, died on Sunday morning, hours before his beloved Kerry football team took on Monaghan in the All-Ireland qualifier. He was 88. You can be sure that he was cheering them on from heaven as they won by a goal. He was one of the best known people in the city and county, as a sand and gravel man. Con was deeply involved in Gaelic games, and established a city Gaelic football club, Clanna Gael, which won the senior championship and led in no small way to the formation of O'Loughlin GAA Club. Con was a former president of the Kerry Association in Kilkenny, and representatives from the Kerry Association along with members of the former Clanna Gael team formed a guard of honour at the removal of his remains on Tuesday. Paying tribute to Mr Shea, John Keane, president of the Kerry Association in Kilkenny, said "They broke the mould when they made Con O 'Shea . We will certainly never again see anyone like him. He has given us a host of memories and we will never forget the joy he felt when his granddaughter, Orla O 'Shea was crowned Rose of Tralee, " his long-time friend recalled . "He had been also delighted that the Kerry Association was her sponsor. "Con came to Kilkenny in the mid-1940s and distinguished himself in the great flood of 1947 when his prowess as a boatman on the lakes of Killarney came to great use when many of the houses in the city centre were twelve feet under water. "Con was a legend- a Kerry man to his fingertips- but fell in love with Kilkenny and anyone that met him in Kilkenny fell in love with him, "said Minister John McGuinness, whose father had also been a friend and admirer of the Kerryman. "He was a character larger than life who had strong associations with business in Kilkenny, family in Kilkenny and the Kilkenny beer festival and he will be sadly missed. My thoughts and prayers are with his family, "Minister McGuinness said. The words of Fr Jim Murphy at Con's removal, that Kerry people in Kilkenny had lost their King were absolutely true and reflected the loss felt by Kerry and Kilkenny people alike, added Cllr Seán Ó hArgáin. "Con was the essence of Kerry but loved his adopted city

also", his fellow-Kerry man said.
"Everywhere you met a Kerry person in Ireland and you said you lived in Kilkenny, the first question you were asked was 'Do you know Con?' "He had an infectious sense of humour and you never left his company without a smile on your face. He was immensely proud of his family and their achievements in business, sporting life and the arts in Kilkenny. It is with a heavy heart that we bid farewell to one of Kerry's greatest supporters and one of Kilkenny's greatest characters.


