Mullinavat travelled over night to London by boat, and paid a dear price against St. Gabriels of London in Ruislip.

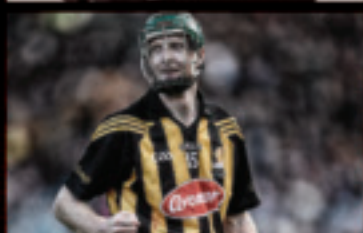

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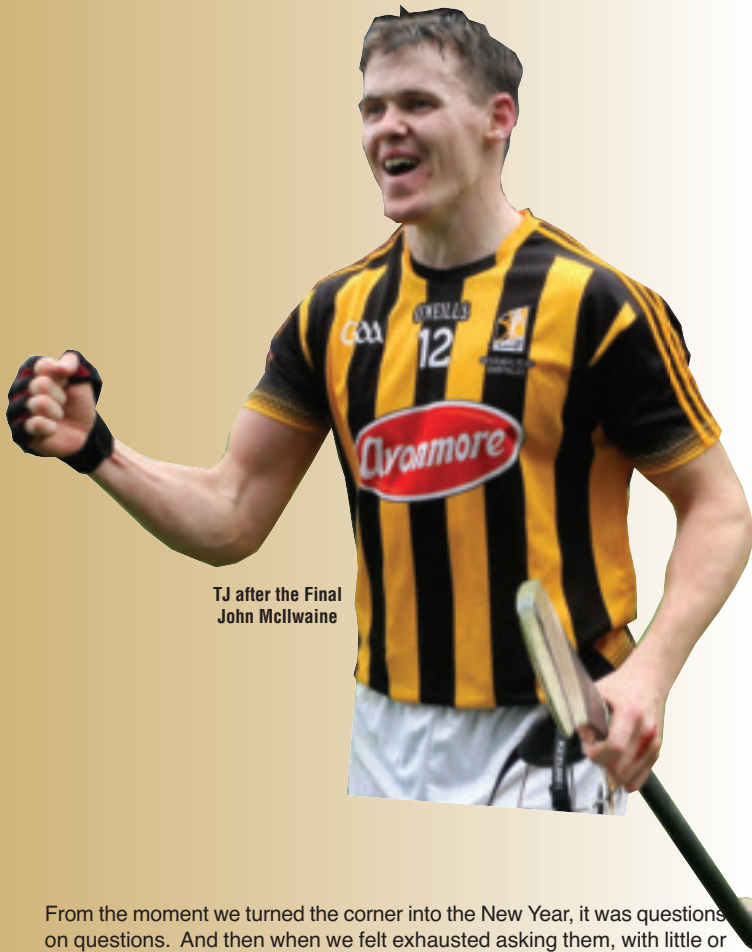

And then when we felt exhausted asking them, with little or no conclusive answers forthcoming from any source, we had a few more questions. JJ, Henry, Tommy, Taggy, David, or Brian were loath to "come clean". Were they or weren't they flew the questions?

If yeah, what then? went in search of answers.

The first question reached conclusion when over a period, all five warriors were definitely calling it a day.

They were handing in the keys to the day. It was all over.

Henry had the book written; JJ had a grand night among his own in Johnstown; end of the road. Where would adequate replacements be found? The answers were not too far away. Kilkenny prepared for their National League, arriving after a relegation scare fighting fit for "the rale Alley Daly".

Kilkenny V Wexford, Nowlan Park Sunday 21 June.

Kilkenny 5-25 Wexford 0-16

No finer setting could have been envisaged for this first round of the Leinster Championship that a balmy Summer evening in June. A tremendous crowd arrived in anticipation of a titanic contest. Wexford came with hordes -19,134 - of support in anticipation of taking out the champions now bereft of their legendary figureheads. It promised much - -- it did not come remotely close to satisfying expectations. Wexford were whitewashed.

Making his Championship debut, Glenmore's Ger Aylward scored 3-5 and laid down a marker that he could be the find of the season. Expectations were realised subsequently as won an All Star. The Jack Guiney affair didn't help the Wexford cause. Kilkenny, with TJ Reid, Richie Hogan, Eoin Larkin and Cillian Buckley playing well, led at the break by 3-7 to 0-10. They would have the assistance of a slight breeze in the second half.

Kilkenny's newest full back, under clinical scrutiny, Joey Holden passed the test with flying colours. He would get even better.

In time Kilkenny people will have very little to enthuse about when discussing 2015 other than the fact that the 36th All Ireland Final was captured. They might gild that lily with remarks about it putting Kilkenny so many ahead of Tipperary, Cork and the rest, not that the rest will ever threaten the superiority of the leading trio. They will gild that lily still further with admiration for the lads that achieved the 36th after the retirement of some of the greatest hurlers ever to tread the hallowed turf of Croke Park on All Ireland Final day. Quite simply there was very little Champaign hurling available to imbibe, or recall during the dark Winter nights.

In the words of maestro Cody, Kilkenny were travelling to Cork on Saturday evening shorn of 13 of their All Ireland panel. In a fast and furious game in front of 8773 patrons, the new kids on the Kilkenny block put on a serious display of very good hurling, leading at one stage by seven points late in the closing half. At half time the visitors were in front by 1-11 to 0-12. The Kilkenny goal had been scooped over the goal line by Jonjo Farrell in the 9th minute. Entering the final quarter Kilkenny were comfortably in front by seven aforementioned points. The Rebels came hunting in droves, and in the end while the better team won a terrific contest, they were reasonably fortunate to get over the line in front after that late Cork onslaught. Richie Hogan was man-of-the-match belting seven frees, and one '65 in his eleven-point take. Mark Kelly grabbed a goal, while Jonjo Farrell got his goal.

The headlines after this game in Parnell Park screamed "Dublin outgun 13-man Kilkenny" Of the thirty players which started this game, three of them failed to last the requisite sixty odd minutes. Kilkenny lost full forward,

Johnjo Farrell after 24 minutes for a straight red card misdemeanour while Joe Lyng got another straight red for his misjudgement 12 minutes after coming on as a sub for Brian Kennedy in the 43rd minute.

The Dubs were cock-a-hoop after their initial win over Tipperary, and wind assisted in the opening half, they led by 0-7 to 0-1 after eleven minutes. David Treacy was in sparkling form for the Dubs. Matthew Ruth devalued the lead somewhat with a goal in the 16th minute, but at the break, Dublin still led by 0-15 to 1-5. Points by Mark Schutte, and Danny Sutcliffe gave the visitors plenty of hope early in the second half. In fact after 17 minutes of the new half, Dublin had outscored Kilkenny by 0-8 to 0-1 even though they were now playing against the wind. Playing against the breeze in the first half, Kilkenny set an early template with three points from Richie Hogan (2 frees) and William Phelan. The game marked the surprising return to action of Joe Canning. The Galway attack were content to work far out the field and delivered some terrific long-range points. At 13 minutes they led by 0-4 to 0-3. The Kilkenny defence were dogged and spirited. Mark Kelly and Lester Ryan grabbed a brace of points by the 16th minute but three points from Dean Higgins and Jonathan Flynn (2 frees) kept the home side to the fore. At half time Galway led by 0-11 to 0-8. With the wind at their backs it was considered scarcely enough to get the locals over the line in front at the finish. In a rip-roaring second half, Hogan and Canning went toe to toe with their shooting craft. Inside the final seven minutes Kilkenny were still adrift by two points. They exerted tremendous pressure on the Galway goal, but the all important goal never materialised. As it turned out, Kilkenny were faced with their final game against Clare being touted as a dress rehearsal for the relegation drop into Division 1B. Cody's team had never been in such a hazardous situation ever. In a terrific first half played out in front of 10,421 Tipp were good value for their half time lead of 1-16 to Kilkenny's 1-9. It was a half of 27 scores. The rate dropped in the second half, with the home side eventually taking their foot off the throttle (surprise, surprise) for the final run in. Clare awaited down in Clare. It promised pain, hardship, and little relief.

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THAT WAS THE YEAR THAT SHOULDN'T HAVE BEEN..... (BUT WAS)

It was the week before the All Ireland final, it was outside one of the many coffeehouses in Kieran Street and the gentleman passing by had been involved with Kilkenny at underage level in the past, so he wasn't simply your common or garden man in the street. "I know we seem to say it every year," he mused, "but if Cody wins this one with this team it'll be his greatest achievement ever."

A very good way of putting it and one with which there can be no arguing. No Shefflin, no Walsh, no Delaney, no Hogan, no Herity, no Fogarty. A wealth of corporate knowledge gone from the panel in a swoop. Yet Kilkenny didn't just retain the All Ireland without it and then, they sauntered to victory. That they did so without having a glove laid on them isn't good in big-picture terms and cannot be. But that's another story.

Was there a moment, apart from a brief spell after the restart in the Leinster final and perhaps ten minutes approaching the interval in the All Ireland final, when they looked remotely flustered? Scarcely. Was there an even vaguely dangerous shot Eoin Murphy had to save, the goals that beat him apart? It is difficult to recall one. To hold that this was the least impressive looking outfit in stripes to make it to Croke Park in September since the 2004 iteration did so is no insult; it is merely to articulate and agree with the general consensus. In turn it is what makes 2015's achievement all the more worthy. And all of this was enacted not only with the fitness of Michael Fennelly, the county's most important player since 2011, a moveable feast from match to match but also with Richie Hogan, the incumbent Hurler of the Year, off the pace for the All Ireland series due to injury and Richie Power, the man who'd done more than any other to drag the Noresiders over the finishing line in 2014, not seeing a second of intercounty action all year until ten minutes from the end of the final.

Kilkenny did the four in a row with what few people will disagree to be the greatest hurling team ever. To have followed it up by winning four All Irelands in five years is inarguably a greater achievement. Had they disappeared for half a decade – or even longer – after 2009 it wouldn't have been a total surprise (after the greatest football team ever reached the end of the road, Kerry went from 1986 to 1997 without an All Ireland) and it certainly couldn't have been a cause for complaint on the part of the supporters in view of the wonders to which they'd been treated. But Brian Cody doesn't do fallow periods, does he?

It may come as a jolt to realise that for Kilkenny this decade is already as successful as the first decade of the 20th century and the 1930s and the 1970s – those storied, starry eras – were, and more successful than

the 1910s, '20s, '40s, '50s, '60s, '80s and '90s. We do not live in interesting times; we live in ludicrously successful ones.

Granted, Kilkenny don't blow teams away the way they once did. The armoury isn't as lavishly stocked as it used to be. Again, that makes their success over the past two seasons all the more impressive. What they do now is asphyxiate opponents. Hands on the throat from midway through the first half and a long, slow throttle into insensibility. It isn't

spectacular – the corpses don't end up shredded with bullets any more – but it is highly effective.

What the MacCarthy Cup holders also possess is balance. A goal a game is the staple now but it's invariably leavened with a fusillade of white flags that, crucially, breaks the 20-point barrier: 5-25 against Wexford, 1-27 versus Galway in the Leinster final, 1-21 against Waterford and 1-22 versus Galway second time around. They even scored the same in the last game of the season as they did in the first game of the league: 1-22 on Valentine's Night in Páirc Uí Rinn. More balance. In the 2014 championship, the shellacking of Offaly first time out excepted, Kilkenny's average was 2-20 per outing. In 2015, the shellacking of Wexford first time out excepted, their average was a fraction short of 1-23 per outing. On the face of it, then, they were as good in 2015 as they had been in 2014. They were certainly more settled, and after all the excitement and hairpin turns of 2013 and '14 they were probably due a low-key summer.

EVEN FLOW

Balance. That word again. Kilkenny demonstrated it in spades in the All Ireland final. If nobody bar Michael Fennelly put in a 9 out of 10 performance, although I'd suggest Eoin Larkin came as close as makes no difference, then nobody was a 6 either. And All Ireland finals are won by a mass of 7s and 8s, not by one or two 9s in isolation. Cillian Buckley had a tough time of it from Jason Flynn in the first half but over on the opposite wing Padraig Walsh produced his best afternoon of the summer. Walter Walsh, who created the goal for TJ Reid and chipped in with a brace of points for good measure, will always have 2012 but is no longer a one-hit wonder. Colin Fennelly's stroke will never be a thing of beauty yet, almost paradoxically for a player with such a lazy swing, he works a double shift every time he takes the field and on the first Sunday of September he drew the foul that should have resulted in a red card for Johnny Coen before coming up with two important points just when Kilkenny's pressure demanded them. Conor Fogarty is another workaholic if a less obvious one. He may never end up winning an All Star, at least not any time soon, but one suspects he's the first name on Cody's teamsheet and that, after all, is what matters more.

As for Eoin Larkin, we sang his praises here last year. All that remains to be said is that he may if anything be improving with age and it's those filigree touches of his – the dropping, spinning ball he caught under the Hogan Stand in the second half of the All Ireland final, the give and go with Reid for his point at the Davin End – that constitute the sprinkles on the icing on the cake. Larkin does it all so cleanly, so clinically and

so unflashily that his insouciant brilliance is easily overlooked. He thinks slow and executes fast.

Apropos of Reid and Richie Hogan, it is a long time since Kilkenny were blessed with two such gifted forwards at the absolute peak of their powers simultaneously. While Henry Shefflin and DJ Carey soldiered together for years, Shefflin was on the up escalator at the time whereas DJ was descending. Reid's Hurler of the Year trophy was richly merited; a goal in each championship outing and never a game in which one didn't look

like coming. In all four matches he'd found the net by half-time. Re Hogan, against Wexford at Nowlan Park he did most of his work during the first half on the Old Stand side. Watching him up close was an education. He was thinking, and prosecuting, a different game to everyone else on the field.

Mick Dempsey remains a cornerstone of the operation. He came from Laois, he had a thirst for knowledge. One of these days the full extent of his influence since 2006 may emerge. Then again, it may not; you'd imagine he'd prefer it the latter way. Derek Lyng and James McGarry were visibly learning their trade as selectors in 2014; 2015 appeared an altogether smoother ride for them. Smart and motivated and ambitious, the pair have much to give to Kilkenny hurling yet. In adding them to the setup Cody demonstrated, yet again, his flexibility and his recognition of the imperative to move with the times. Kilkenny could not have won as much as they have in the past five years had the boss man remained wedded – and welded – to the formula that had served him so well in the past.

One vignette will serve to illustrate the length of the road he's come. Japanese soldiers from World War Two still hiding out on small islands in the Pacific knew that Waterford would play seven defenders in the All Ireland semi-final. Ten years ago such a configuration would have either confused Kilkenny or been a matter of complete indifference to them. In either case they'd still have tried to boot down the front door, the defenders skying the sliotar forward for Shefflin et al to win in the air and the team trying to overcome Waterford by sheer blunt-force trauma. All has changed, utterly. Last August the reigning champions, aware they had an intellectual puzzle to solve, went about solving it via cold logic. Cillian Buckley was appointed the spare man and sallied forward down the left in the second half, but instead of going long with the sliotar he went laterally, picking out Reid and Hogan with short passes, playing the percentaged ball to a colleague rather than lamping a long, fifty-fifty ball into a ruck of friends and enemies. Thus was the Waterford defence opened up, not with a hammer but with a stiletto.

A BIG DISAPPOINTMENT

Plaudits directed to where plaudits are due, it was a horribly disappointing summer. There is no other way of putting it. At the outset the playing field looked more level than it had at any time since 1998-99. Eight counties seemed to harbour realistic hopes of September glory, or at the very least realistic hopes of making the last four. That most of them failed so dismally to get the trip was the real reason the hurling public felt shortchanged by Championship 2015.

An exception can be made for Galway, who punched their weight for the first time in three years. But no more of this nonsense about their second-half fadeout in the All Ireland final and what may or may not have happened in the dressing room at the interval. Nothing happened in the dressing room at the interval and all that happened in the second half was that, having hurled above themselves in the first period, the Westerners ran out of puff and, Kilkenny's hands closing ever tighter on their throat, regressed to the mean. Galway hit 2-15 in the Leinster final and 1-18 in the All Ireland final. They lost the Leinster final by seven points and as Joe Canning stood over that injury-time free in the All Ireland final they were trailing by... seven points. Thus the formline of the provincial decider was replicated almost exactly. Move along there now, nothing to see. On the up side, Galway reached the final with an inordinately young forward line. One cannot say with assurance that better days lie ahead for the county. This is Galway, after all. But the potential for better days surely does.

The real breath of fresh air was Waterford. Much was made of their allegedly defensive ways. Again, utter poppycock. Waterford weren't a defensive team, particularly not for the first half of the season. They couldn't have won the National League final by hitting 1-24 if they had

been. What they were was a counter-attacking team. Kilkenny are frequently a counter-attacking team too, especially when they're defending a lead. They get bodies into the middle of the field and the one or two forwards who remain up front hold up the ball till the runners arrive. Think of Michael Fennelly's late point in the All Ireland final and the latticework of short passes that preceded it, Larkin and Power retaining possession until such time as Fennelly got himself up the field and into a shooting position. While it goes without saying that Derek McGrath will have to commit more players to attack in 2016 if the Deise are to maintain their momentum, the De La Salle man deserves some sort of award for services to hurling in 2015. He brought a team composed largely of novices from Division 1B to win the league in great style and to reach an All Ireland semi-final. In doing so he made us all think – and talk – about the game that little bit more. Good for him.

Elsewhere the world continued to spin. Bennettsbridge captured the All Ireland junior title as to the manner and heritage born, then followed it up with the county intermediate silverware. An inordinately impressive St Kieran's retained their colleges crown, though not before being made work for it by Thurles CBS in the final. Ballyhale Shamrocks had altogether too much for a stage-struck Kilmallock at Croke Park on St Patrick's Day. Of the Kilkenny under-21 team, annihilated in Wexford Park, all that can be said is that they were of a piece with the corresponding minor outfit of three years earlier. Occasionally these things happen. Even in Kilkenny. Especially in Kilkenny.

We concluded here last year with the suggestion that Kilkenny were in danger of being perceived as serial moaners and unnecessarily defensive when they had nothing much to get worked up about. Lo and behold, 2015 did provide them with something to get justifiably worked up about. Although it was their lack of goalscoring power that ultimately prevented Pat Hoban's minors retaining the Irish Press Cup - basically, Galway won the All Ireland because of their ability to find the net at critical junctures – it is nothing more than a simple statement of fact that Kilkenny were reamed by the referee in the drawn All Ireland semi-final and they were reamed by the referee in the replay.

Again, occasionally these things happen. They shouldn't. They do. Thankfully this time the toys remained within the pram, Hoban accepted his misfortune with good grace and the county board wisely eschewed the temptation to take it any further. The sight of Kilkenny stamping their foot and whinging – however legitimately – about being deprived of reaching yet another All Ireland final would not have been an edifying one. Ghastly old imperialist though he may have been, Kipling was correct to this extent: the only way to handle those two impostors, triumph and disaster, is to treat 'em just the same.

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Well Done Kilkenny's Heroes of 2015!

Their Greatest Win of All?

Seventeen summers....eleven All-Irelands.....six minutes.....four questions.

Maybe it's the law of diminishing returns. Perhaps if you keep on rocking an audience, in time they'll turn a little sheepish, a little introverted on you. Brian Cody's post-All-Ireland final press conference this year was surely one of the shortest on record. It was briefer than the Gettysburg Address. Why?

Well it wasn't down to the remarkable James Stephens man being in any kind of hurry. He was, as ever, respectful and courteous towards anyone with a question. Trouble was, the media's curiosity seemed to have reached a point of exhaustion here.

After question number four, that dinky auditorium under the Hogan Stand fell eerily quiet. Cody dwelt momentarily in case someone's throat might be clearing or hands may have been struggling with some notes. But, no, this gig had already run its course.

"Okay lads?" he asked, getting to his feet.

Journalists get beaten down by many things but maybe nothing brings on a collective torpor quite like having to colour in the same story-line over and over and over again. What is there left to say about a team that just keeps on winning, no matter the discouragements?

By any mortal standards, they had no business holding onto Liam McCarthy in 2015. But what's that got to do with anything? Under Cody, Kilkenny apply their own rules. They don't understand the condition of panic or recognise the concept of crisis.

I was gabbing away to Newstalk when the champions took the field on September 6. First man I looked for was Richie Hogan, given rumours that he'd prepared for the game in Lourdes. Sure enough, quite apart from that back of his which has the status of a listed building now, Hogan's quad was heavily strapped.

Then I sought out the silhouette of big, old Michael Fennelly, another who is advised by his GP these days not to be lifting anything heavier than a coffee mug. Observing his warm-up, I managed to convince myself that here was someone just shaking a hapless fist at the march of Father Time.

And I cast a glance at Shane Prendergast, a Championship debutant at 29, now filling the shoes of Hurricane Jackie against a forward line packed with gunpowder.

I thought of Joey Holden still learning the ropes as an inter-county full-back and of Kieran Joyce holding the fort at number six, 28-years-old but only now having won the trust of a reluctant Mr Cody.

Seemed to me that Kilkenny were pretty much held together by masking tape here.

So I did what every fool with a microphone in his hand has the capacity to do. I bunjee jumped from the seventh floor. "All great teams eventually hit a stone wall" I declared. "And I believe that this will be the day that time finally catches up with Kilkenny."

Seasoned companions looked at me as if I'd just tossed the mortgage on a Willie Mullins horse that Ruby has overlooked. Their chorused expressions blared "have you been drinking?" You know, having collaborated with Henry Shefflin on his book, I like to think I've a reasonable grasp of the Kilkenny hurling psyche now. Their relentlessness comes from an absolute acceptance that struggle will be part of any journey. That setback is as inevitable as nightfall. Seems to me that the definition of a Kilkenny hurler, on Cody's watch at least, will always be how he responds to trouble.

Yet, here I was predicting the looming flutter of a white flag. I

might as well have taken to declaring the All Blacks docile and effeminate.

Now it must be said that, half an hour in, my prediction still had some wind in its sails. Galway had scored twelve times to Kilkenny's six. But for TJ's opportunist goal, it would have been fair to say that this final was drifting away from the Cats. But that always tends to be the rub with Kilkenny.

They just work to different co-ordinates in the mind.

Galway had hurled with extraordinary coherence and intensity,

yet the half-time margin would be three points. A single score. For Anthony Cunningham, there must - even then - have been a sense that they were just trying to rope down the wind here. Within seven minutes of the resumption, Kilkenny were level and - let's be honest - the remainder was sport's equivalent of watching a python slowly swallow a porcupine whole. The sense of inevitability was palpable as a realisation dawned on Galway that banjaxed, decrepit old Kilkenny were simply not for turning.

Joe Canning's injury-time goal offered the illusion of a game with a pulse right to the last shriek of James Owens's whistle. But the 2015 final didn't have that. Kilkenny won almost as they chose in the end. They weathered the maroon storm, then galloped over the horizon.

And that was extraordinary. In a post-Henry world, they were also dealing with the straitening realities of being in a post-Tommy, post-JJ, post-Taggy, post-Brian Hogan, post-David Herity world.

By any stretch, Cody's resources had to be close to breaking point.

You look at the turmoil that has visited Galway since, the effective sacking of Cunningham as manager by his own players, and you can't but marvel at the Kilkenny ecosystem. The sense of ever-changing personnel working to one absolute, non-negotiable culture.

Henry speaks in the book of how he struggled with his reduced dressing-room status during the Championship of 2014. There was no special treatment for arguably the greatest player the game has ever seen. There were no concessions to sentiment.

Cody's mantra has always been that everyone is equal behind that dressing-room door. That one Constitution must, by necessity, apply to all. He doesn't just throw that out as a soundbyte.

He applies it as a core principle.

Brian O'Driscoll once told me how, as his Leinster rugby career tapered to a close, he found Joe Schmidt frustratingly distant. Only hindsight allowed him understand the necessity for that distance. Great coaches, great managers just move relentlessly forward. There are no free-passes to making that journey with them.

I happen to believe that Kilkenny's All-Ireland win in 2015 may, in the context of running repairs needed and the number of mature voices lost to the group, have been their greatest of all under Cody. Because it flew in the face of awkward circumstance.

The key was that at no point did they even countenance that old vitamin deficiency of self-pity.

Kilkenny just drove relentlessly forward. And, in doing so, I believe they posed a pretty unflattering question for the rest of hurling. It is what have we learned from their seventeen-year stretch of dominance? Where is the evidence of understanding?

Tipperary, perhaps, came closest between '09 and '11 and again last year but, on the cusp of 2016, who would your money be on to out-flank Mr. Cody? Have a good think about that. Then look elsewhere for investment.

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DETERMINED WALTER MAKES 2015 A YEAR TO REMEMBER

For Walter Walsh, 2015 could be seen as his breakthrough year fully capitalising on the promise shown in 2012 when he made a spectacular senior debut in the All-Ireland Final replay victory over Galway scoring 1-3 and gaining the Man of the Match accolade.

The last two years had proved challenging for the big man from Tullogher-Rosbercon, with injuries ruling him out for most of the 2013 National League, though he did return for the Championship and some good displays, while last year he found it hard to keep his place in the team. I asked him about the All-Ireland replay against Tipperary and if that renewed his determination for this season. 'Last year was the reverse of 2012, and in fairness John Power came in and had an excellent game. I would always try to better myself each year anyway working on the different skills like hooking and blocking'.

Wally, as he is affectionately known, followed in the footsteps of his parents and uncles, who played hurling/camogie with Tullogher, by lining out for the club but had to bide his time in getting the chance to wear the same colours for the county. Having missed out on selection for the South Kilkenny Under-16 team, he was drafted into the minor panel for the 2008 Leinster championship where he came on as sub in the provincial Final win before starting the semi-final, where he netted two goals in the win over Tipperary, and the Final against Galway. Walter then featured for the minors again in 2009 but the Tribesmen exacted their revenge in the Final.

In 2012, Walter added a Leinster Under-21 medal to his collection and had shown good form in that campaign but still he must have been surprised to receive a call up to the senior squad – how did this come about? 'Brian had a few of us in training with the seniors, and said that any player who performed well in training had a chance to make the panel. I was first

included in the twenty-six for the quarter-final against Limerick. I was just hoping that I might get a chance to feature at some stage during the Championship.' How then did he deal with starting the All-Ireland replay? 'Some of the lads like David Herity, Henry and Tommy said to continue what I'm doing in training and to try to treat it as another game. That helped me a lot.'

Does Walter feel there is too much analysis of players' performances now? 'I try to avoid social media during the season, and tend to avoid the Sunday Game, definitely the analysis of it anyway. I might watch the match back during the week. I get my feedback from talking with management and my team-mates.'

The issue of whether the game should go professional is an ongoing issue, would he like to see it go down this route? 'We are



well looked after, the success is a help as it generates more money. The work the Kilkenny Supporters Club do is appreciated by the players. I don't think there is enough money for the game to go professional.'

In his sixteen championship appearances with the seniors, Walter has amassed an impressive haul of 2-21 and already has three McCarthy Cup winners' medals. What does he attribute Kilkenny's phenomenal run of success down to? 'A lot of our success is down to Brian Cody and his management team. We have a top-notch backroom team and that would include our four physios, nutritionists and team doctor.'

When asked for players he most admired growing up, Walter picks out Tullaroan's Tommy Walsh. 'It was brilliant watching Tommy, for a player small in stature he was so tigerish on the field. Like a lot of youngsters, I also loved seeing DJ in action.'

Going back to where it all started, and the club – what are his ambitions there? 'This year, we lost to the eventual champions, Bennettsbridge in the intermediate quarter-final by six points. I think we can definitely win the intermediate, we have a very good underage set-up for a rural club.'

Away from the hurling field, Walter is a big fan of rugby and played for New Ross, where one of his team-mates was Tadhg Furlong, a member of Ireland's World Cup squad this season.

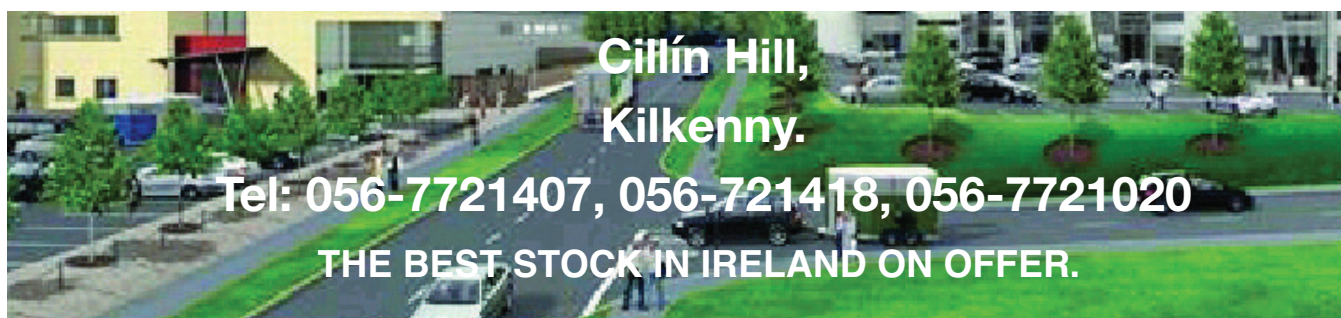

Towards the end of the last decade, Ballyhale Shamrocks dominated Club Hurling winning four consecutive County Senior Championships from 2006-2009 as well as three Leinster Senior Club titles and All-Ireland Senior Club titles in 2007 and 2010.

However, over the past 4 years they only had a Senior title in 2012 to display for their efforts, and they would have considered that an underachievement with the depth of talent that they possessed.

The club turned to Tipperary men Andy Moloney and Colm Bonnar to restore them to previous glory, and they duly obliged.

With the delay of the Club Championship due to the All-Ireland Final replay, Shamrocks didn't get their County Championship underway until the October Bank Holiday weekend when they played Danesfort in the County Senior Quarter-Final.

Shamrocks easily brushed aside their neighbours winning 5-23 to 2-13 to set-up a semi-final clash with St. Martins a week later.

St. Martins cause wasn't helped when they had a player dismissed, and Shamrocks eventually prevailed 1-19 to 0-14 to set-up a County Final showdown with 2013 Champions Clara who easily destroyed Carrickshock in a repeat of the 2013 County decider.

Shamrocks were a team on a mission, and they regained the County title in emphatic style.

Inspired by captain fantastic and birthday boy TJ Reid who scored 0-10, Shamrocks won 1-20 to 1-13 with Mark Aylward scoring a superb goal to finish off a superb movement involving Michael Fennelly and Henry Shefflin.

TJ continued his superb form in the Leinster Semi-Final when he scored 1-8, as they easily defeated Kilmacud Crokes 2-15 to 0-12 to set-up a provincial final showdown with 2013 All-Ireland Finalists Kilcormac-Cillogey.

However, things weren't as straightforward

in the Leinster Final, where they required extra-time to eventually overcome the Offaly men.

A handful of missed frees from Ciaran Slevin proved costly, although he landed a monster free from inside his own-half to force extra-time.

Shamrocks experience prevailed in extra-time with Ronan Corcoran, James "Cha" Fitzpatrick, TJ Reid and Henry all pointing as they won out after a ferocious battle 0-21 to 1-14.

Their Leinster Final victory set-up an All-Ireland Semi-Final showdown with Galway Senior Champions Gort who defeated last years All-Ireland Club Champions Portumna in the County Final which was played in mid-December.

Having trailed early on to a Richie Cummins goal, Shamrocks recovered to lead 2-9 to 1-8 at the interval with the Reid brothers TJ and Eoin grabbing a goal each.

The duo combined in the 11th minute for Shamrocks opening goal, when a brilliant flick from Eoin set-up TJ who blasted home an unstoppable shot that gave the Gort goalkeeper Gavin Lally no chance.

Eoin squeezed home Shamrocks 2nd goal amidst a goalmouth scramble as Shamrocks took control.

Shamrocks maintained that lead throughout the second-half, with the midfield duo of Bob Aylward and Conor Walsh immense scoring 0-3 each.

Having just turned 36, and yet to make a

decision on his Inter-County future, Henry gave a sublime display scoring 0-5 from play, and collecting the man of the match award afterwards.

It was onto Croke Park for St. Patricks Day and an All-Ireland Club Final showdown against Killmallock of Limerick.

Killmallock under the guidance of twice former All-Ireland Senior medal winner Ger "Sparrow" O'Loughlin came to Croke Park the hard way.

They defeated the previous years Munster Club Champions Na Piersaigh to regain the County decider, before displaying admirable strength of character to win the Munster Club Championship.

They defeated both Sarsfields of Cork and Cratloe of Clare after extra-time, and on both occasions, they achieved victory against the odds.

In the Munster Semi-Final against Sarsfields, Killmallock appeared to have secured victory, but an injury-time goal from former Cork Senior forward Kieran Murphy, and an equalising free from Cian McCarthy drew the sides level as extra-time was required.

Following a pulsating contest, Killmallock eventually emerged 3-22 to 3-20 to set-up a provincial final showdown with Cratloe of Clare.

One of the best club matches in recent times emerged in the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick, as Killmallock overcame their Clare neighbours in a magnificent contest after extra-time 1-32 to 3-18.

The Limerick and Munster Champions displayed admirable strength of character, and they had to draw all that strength when they were reduced to 14 men after Inter-County Senior Gavin O'Mahony was dismissed for an off the ball incident.

Killmallock trailed by two points at one stage during the final quarter following O'Mahony's dismissal, but they fought back heroically to salvage extra-time, before outscoring Cratloe 0-11 win their 3rd Munster title, and set up an All-Ireland Semi-Final showdown with Portaferry of Down.

The Limerick men prevailed as expected 2-19 to 0-12 to set-up an All-Ireland showdown with Shamrocks.

Having overcome Na Piersaigh, Sarsfields and Cratloe the hard way on their way to Croke Park, Killmallock were expected to

provide Shamrocks with a stern test of their credentials, but it didn't materialise like that.

A Colin Fennelly goal before half-time sent Shamrocks on their way as they led 1-7 to 0-4 at the interval, before they ran out resounding 1-18 to 1-6 winners.

Henry played his part scoring 0-2 from play in his last game before announcing his retirement from Inter-County Hurling 8 days later, while Joey Holden was named man of the match afterwards.

Shamrocks had a perfect mixture of youth and experience, and indeed four of the starting 15 were 35 or older this year, Henry and his brother Paul, Aidan Cummins, and Bob Aylward who score an early point.

It was Shamrocks 6th All-Ireland Club Hurling title in history as they pulled two clear of their nearest rivals Portumna and Birr.

Taking Over from a Legend

It was a very good year. He may not have predicted it at the start, well he knew all about it at the end of it.

Of the glut of retirees last winter, if there was one man Kilkenny supporters were really fearing the loss of it was JJ Delaney. Not only was he possibly the finest wing back the game had ever seen, in recent times, he had transformed himself into one of the greatest full backs. So with the memory still fresh from "that" hook against Seamie Callanan in last year's All-Ireland, came the blow that we would never see such finesse at this level again. Into his shoes stepped Joey Holden. A fine player, yes, but in his first full season in such a pivotal position, would he cope with the burden of taking over from a legend? Moreover, would he manage to take on the task of coping with Conor McDonald, Maurice Shanahan and Joe Canning, some of the finest hurlers in the country? Well, he did, and he did it with flying colours.

It wasn't always this way. Some hurlers seem destined for greatness the moment they pick up a hurl. Joey Holden was not one of those. Rather than being a DJ or a Richie Hogan, he's more akin to his county selector Derek Lyng. A worker first, a stylist second. He never played minor or under-21 for the county, indeed he only started playing regularly with his own club team when he was 22. Did he ever feel short changed at his lack of appearances in the county's underage set-up? "No, I knew I wasn't at that level at that time. Growing up, I always loved hurling, I remember getting my first hurl when I was 4. But I was looking at guys like Richie Doyle there at that time. I knew I wasn't up to that level so I had to either step up or improve myself"

When he was growing up he wasn't in one of the elite Ballyhale age groups of Cha Fitzpatrick or his own brother Padraig who scooped all and sundry in front of them. His was a slower and steadier progress. If the weaker age group he played in when he was younger may have hindered him, there was no fear of playing against sub-standard forwards when he got to senior level. "I think that's what you can attribute most of it to (his success). You're up training against the likes of Henry, Colin Fennelly, Mick Fennelly, TJ, Cha Fiz. Either they'll take you

to the cleaners or you can step up. You learn so much from them, every day you go out, you learn so much from them"

It may have been near impossible to get into a forward line of that calibre, but even to get a place in the defence wasn't easy. The likes of Bob Aylward and Aidan Cummins, players he was "in awe of" were blocking his path. When the Shamrocks won the All-Ireland Club final in 2010, he had a bit-part role, coming on for the last 10 minutes of the final. The year after he still struggled to get on to the team. But 2012 was a watershed for him at club level, he could feel himself growing as a player. "It was one of those years when everything I did seemed to come off, whoever I was marking or whatever. Everything went right for me that year"

From establishing himself as a club regular, inter county recognition came a couple of years later. Many new panel members for Kilkenny begin their inter county career numbered in the high twenties, and slowly work their way down. But from his first season in the squad, he became a regular, except, unfortunately, for the final replay. "It was a bit of an up and down year for me. You were happy to be



wasn't of the required level. It would have been a lot better for me if I had been playing (in the replay), but the important thing is that the team win. But the experience in big games, it's something I learned from massively"

Moving onto this year was another matter. Previously, his predecessor at club level, Eamonn Walsh, had tragically been struck down with a heart condition and could no longer play. But out of the darkness of that decision came the light for another man. Full back is not an easy position, knowing a mistake at any moment could prove fatal. But after winning the All-Ireland club championship in March, a victory he regards as his favourite so far, he began on that next challenge.

Not only did he have to nail down a new position he also had the added responsibility of being captain. But it didn't seem to enter his thinking. "Making the team is the main thing for me, I didn't feel any extra pressure" So no extra burden to speak before games? "Not at all, There's lads that tend to speak and lads that stay quiet, I'd be one of the quieter ones. I prepared a small bit (the post All-Ireland speech) after the semi final, and then I put it away and concentrated on the hurling. The way I see it, you can be a leader in the dressing room, or you can be a leader out on the field" I suppose when you have Jackie Tyrrell giving Churchillian-esque speeches, someone has to take a back seat!



around the place, but then you're not happy when you're not starting. I knew the performance in the first game (All-Ireland final)

Now in the off season, he can reflect on a fine year's achievements, and though the semi-final defeat in the club championship to O'Loughlin Gaels was a big disappointment, he is enjoying his time off. A rugby fan, along with his fellow county mates TJ Reid, Walter Walsh and Colin Fennelly, he was kitted out in the New Zealand rugby kit for their most recent Rugby World Cup victory. So is he considering a career change? "No" he laughs "I like all sports but I'd prefer something with a stick I think. I'm happy as I am"

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Glory for the 'Bridge

Bennettsbridge achieved a lot during their golden period from 1952-1971 when they won 11 County Senior titles from 1952-1971 and the club was backboned by a whole host of established names who achieved a magnitude of success with the Kilkenny Seniors.

Legendary figures in Kilkenny hurling like 9-times All-Ireland senior medallist Noel Skehan, Jim Treacy, Paddy Moran, Johnny McGovern, John Kinsella, Seamus and Larry Cleere and others were central to Bennettsbridge's success during that 20 year period.

However, their last Senior Championship success came in 1971, the same year that the All-Ireland Club Championships began.

If the Club Championships had of been introduced during the Bridge's golden period, unquestionably with the calibre that they possessed, All-Ireland success would definitely have come their way.

However, All-Ireland glory came their way last February in Croke Park when they easily dismantled the challenge of Fullen Gaels in the All-Ireland Junior Club Final.

Bennettsbridge's graph had been steadily rising for a few years.

In 2011, they defeated neighbours Thomastown after a replay following two pulsating games in the County Minor decider, in which a number of that successful team were part of their route to glory over the past 12 months including last years Minors Liam Blanchfield, Jason Cleere and Sean Morrissey.

Thomastown easily brushed aside the Bridge challenge in the 2012 Junior decider when a hat-trick of goals from JJ Farrell crucified their prospects.

More heartbreak was endured in 2013 when an injury-time point from Rory Hickey gave Lisdowney their first Junior title since 1960.

However, in 2014, they erased all previous heartache, but not without a scare against Galmoy in the County Junior Semi-Final.

Galmoy led 1-10 to 0-8 at half-time, and they stretched the advantage to 7 points entering the

final quarter.

However, Bennettsbridge turned on the gas during that closing quarter scoring 2-7 without reply to win 2-19 to 1-16.

A County Final beckoned against Mooncoin, and the Bridge encountered no such difficulties winning 1-17 to 1-7 with a Liam Blanchfield goal in first-half injury-time sending the Bridge on their way.

Great celebrations followed all round in Bennettsbridge before they turned their attention to the Leinster Junior Championship.

There was only a 7 day turn around after the County Final victory, but the Bridge easily accounted for the Meath Intermediate Championships in their opening game in Leinster before travelling to Wexford a week later to Crossabeg in the Leinster Semi-Final. Nicky Cleere accounted for 1-6 of their 1-19 total as they strolled to another comprehensive victory.

A Leinster Final showdown was up next against the Offaly Intermediate Champions Shamrocks, and with Lisdowney having suffered a shock defeat against fellow Offaly outfit Ballinamere 12 months previously, Bennettsbridge were well warned of the pitfalls of danger.

In truth though, they never had a moments anxiety as they cruised to a facile victory becoming the 11th Kilkenny Club to win the Leinster Junior Championship in the process.

Their focus was intent from the word go, and the Bridge quickly asserted themselves opening up

a 0-7 to 0-1 lead after 20 minutes.

A Brian Lannon goal confirmed their superior dominance as they led 1-10 to 0-1 at the interval.

The Bridge didn't let up during the second-half outscoring Offaly opponents 0-10 to 0-2 to record a 20 point victory. 3.

Following the Christmas break, attention switched to the All-Ireland series and a Semi-Final match against Annaghdown of Galway in Nenagh Bennettsbridge struggled during the opening-half and they trailed 0-7 to 0-4 at the interval, but they put matters right afterwards.

The Bridge completely overpowered and outplayed the Western men in the second-half as they outscored them 2-15 to 0-2.

Having drawn level early in the second-half, the All-Ireland Junior Champions completely took control and their task was made so much easier when Annaghdown had a player dismissed in the 46th minute.

It was plain sailing for Bennettsbridge during the closing quarter when Liam Blanchfield blasted a goal in the 48th minute, before Cormac Wafer confirmed their overall superior second-half dominance with a second goal late on as they marched on towards Croke Park.

Brian Lannon and Sean Morrissey both scored 0-4 each during their semi-final victory.

Fullen Gaels from Lancashire would provide the opposition for Bennettsbridge in Croke Park on Sunday February 15th.

The Lancashire club easily defeated Castleblayney of Monaghan 2-18 to 1-7 in the other semi-final.

Having run Thomastown to 3 points in the 2013 All-Ireland Junior Final, Bennettsbridge were aware of what Fullen Gaels were capable of.

However, they had no such problems as they strolled to victory having taken control from the outset.

They led 3-11 to 0-6 at the interval as the full-line of Brian Lannon, Hugh O'Neill and Liam Blanchfield bagged a goal each.

Having possessed such a commanding 14-point advantage at the interval, Bennettsbridge were home and hosed.

Fullen Gaels tried hard during the second-half, but any hopes of a comeback were ruined when their Full-Forward was sent-off for a straight

red.

Bennettsbridge didn't score as freely during the second-half, but their goalscoring exploits in the first-half had long set the tone for victory.

Bennettsbridge outscored Fullen Gaels 0-8 to 1-2 during the second-half to run out 3-19 to 1-8 winners to get the All-Ireland celebrations firmly underway.

In the process, they became the 6th Kilkenny Club to win the Junior Club All-Ireland Championship, following in the footsteps of Galmoy (2005), Danesfort (2007), Conahy Shamrocks (2008), St. Patricks Ballyragget (2012), and Thomastown (2013).

It's a very young Bennettsbridge Team and they have the potential to progress even further.

Nine of the starting 15 from their All-Ireland Final victory played in the Minor Final victory of 2011, and that winning mentality in which the young players in particular have gotten used will only stand to them in their progression going forward.

For Jason Cleere, Liam Blanchfield and Sean Morrissey, they have had the perfect past 18 month as they have won 2 All-Ireland Colleges titles with Kierans to Minor All-Irelands with Kilkenny as well as achieving Club success, the trio will certainly have a key role to play in future as they attempt to progress further.

BROTHER TO BROTHER

The first time you see Pádraig Walsh on a hurling field you can't help but be reminded of someone else. "Is that?" you think; perhaps a certain other Tullaroan hurler that starred in Black and amber for many years. Well, the name's similar, the face, the number, that bit of dash. And yet, it's different.

How does it feel to follow in the footsteps of probably the greatest right half back that hurling has known? It's a bit of pressure right? How does it feel when said hurler comes not just from your own county, or club, but family? You could probably add a bit more pressure on top of that couldn't you? Well, maybe. Or maybe pressure is just for tyres.

If there is any weight on Pádraig's shoulders then he certainly doesn't appear to be showing it. In fact if anything strikes you from speaking to him, it's the unbridled joy that he gets from playing hurling for his county. He was born into this, he was bred for it, now the dreams he had are being lived out.

The first time his noted sibling played in an All-Ireland final in Croke Park, he was still in Primary School, and the experience "drove me on" to try and reach that level. Not that he needed that much encouragement. Given his grandfather was Paddy Grace, his sister a star Camogie player and Tommy played a bit, it would have been a bigger surprise if he had shown no inclination towards the game. He had all the inspiration he needed around him.

After winning a minor All-Ireland final in 2010, his first year on the senior panel was in 2013, and while that was a rare fallow summer for the team, all those hours spent practicing in the big garden of the family home paid off in bringing him to his first All-Ireland final against Tipperary on

September 7th, 2014. Or it would have done, except he wasn't selected to start. Like his brother, who won All-Irelands in both backs and forwards, his versatility has been a strength to the panel, but perhaps it could also have been a weakness when the final cut was being made for that game. Was it a disappointment not to start? "At the time I was very disappointed yeah, but you have to get over that very quickly, because you could be coming on, so you have to be tuned in."

Anytime there has been a replay during Brian Cody's tenure, there has always been a desire to freshen things up for the second game. He cites Walter Walsh's introduction in 2012 as a case in point. If the

draw was a blessing in disguise for anyone, then it was for Pádraig. After the whistle blew at the end of the first game, he had three weeks to get himself right. And he certainly did "I was just excited to get the extra three weeks training. When you get to an All-Ireland final it's great, but the sad thing is that it's the end of the year, because all I wanted to do was stay hurling"

He lined out at right half back in the replay and gave his best performance for Kilkenny (thus far), in helping the team to victory. If winning any All-Ireland is special then the first is particularly sweet, but even during the elation of victory, there's still time to think of what lies ahead in future. "The 20 minutes after winning it are just unbelievable, all the hard work you've put in is worth it, all you'd want to do is do it again the following year"

While September 27th 2014 was a high point of his career then November 1st



2014 was most definitely a low. The last time Tullaroan won a Senior Hurling Championship in 1994, his father was playing full back, his brother was acting as a mascot, and Pádraig was barely out of his cot. Now, 20 years on, a proud tradition had ended as defeat in the Relegation final against Fenians ended the club's 20 year tenure in the senior championship. Did said defeat detract anything from his enjoyment of the year?

"It was fierce disappointing yeah, we knew we were good enough to stay up, but we didn't go well during the year and Johnstown were ten times better than us on the day. We're back down intermediate now and it's going to be difficult to get back up, but the girls won this year (the Tullaroan Camogie team were this years Kilkenny and Leinster intermediate champions), they're the stars around the place now, so hopefully that will drive us on next year"

Returning to training in January of this year brought a fresh challenge. Retaining an All-Ireland any year is always a motivation, but there was added incentive in the form of the flock of retirements that had befallen the panel at the end of last year. While not in any way wanting to diminish the achievements of last years retirees, there seemed to be an unspoken command for the remaining members of the dressing room that this was a further chance to prove themselves. Or as Pádraig puts it "We knew we had a panel good enough to win an All-Ireland. The lads were great leaders and they were a massive help but it's like people were telling us we weren't good enough to win without them. We were determined to show we were"

Any hints of Kilkenny's death were grossly exaggerated, and even though two All-Irelands would seem unthinkable for most players, inside the panel, numbers don't

play a factor. Certainly there's no suggestion of fading hunger. "When you get an All-Ireland, it's hard to see how your hunger would go, because all you'd want to do is experience that feeling again"

If Giovanni Trapattoni could describe Padraig Walsh, the word "enthusiasm" would be written all over it. To speak to him, you would never get the impression that there were any negatives attached to playing inter county hurling. Given his success so far, that's probably fully understandable. So, more than just Tommy's brother? Who knows, perhaps one day they'll start calling Tommy "Padraig's brother". Well, Tommy has 9. So 2 down, just another 7 to go!

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“THAT WOULD NEVER HAPPEN IN KERRY!”

It was a few days before Christmas in Kilkenny twenty years ago that I first met Fan Larkin. He landed into the pub in which a group of us students in the University of Limerick were whiling away a few hours after college exams. Fan's son, Philly was in the company as were a few of Philly's James Stephens teammates who were fellow students and friends of ours in UL.

There was an U21 football final the following day and Fan wanted as many fit and eligible twenty year olds as he could muster available to tog out for 'The Village'.

With a light snow falling in Castlecomer the following morning James Stephen's and Erins Own battled it out as current Kerry selector, Diarmuid Murphy, and myself watched curiously from the embankment.

It was a tight enough affair and towards the end Fan Larkin was exhorting his troops to give one last big push to get the team over the line.

At this stage, James Stephens' powerful full forward (who, due to compassion and discretion, shall remain nameless) was presented with a glorious chance of a goal after breaking two fairly reckless tackles on the way in. Just as he was about to pull the trigger, he got another tidy clip into the side of the ear.

Now, I know things like that can be fairly annoying on a cold morning with snow falling in Castlecomer but to a committed full forward, it would be a mere inconvenience as he went on to nail the opportunity of a lifetime and bring glory to the Village.

Not so our man though.

All thoughts of the match-winning score went out the window, the ball was cast aside and the number 14 went about exacting retribution for the few

clips he had gotten on the way in.

Fan Larkin, turned to the two footballers in the crowd and in exasperation said "that would never happen in Kerry!"

While recognising the truth in Larkin's statement, it must also be acknowledged that both Kilkenny and Kerry share many of the same characteristics when it comes to their pursuit of glory. It just so happens that their preferred sports are poles apart- and always were.

Kerry folk love their football and would find it hard to imagine life without it.

But it must be remembered too that Kerry (or rather its foremost club at the time, Ballyduff) won the county's first ever national title under GAA rules, the All Ireland Hurling Final of 1891. What should have been the springboard to launch a great tradition of hurling in the county, became a millstone around their neck and, mainly due to financial considerations, the great Ballyduff team failed to show up for the county final of 1892 and only eight of that team ever again played senior championship hurling in Kerry.

The reasons why hurling failed to develop to the same extent over the next two decades in Kerry are complex. The fact that hurling remained largely a rural pursuit offers some clues as to its lack of growth at this time. The game as a truly popular pursuit remained confined to a very small geographical area and this created its own challenges and tensions. Indeed, to this day, the rivalry in Kerry hurling would probably be more intense than that in football and despite attempts at developing the game in large urban centres, it remains most popular in that rural prairie district between Ballyheigue in the west, Lixnaw in the east, Ballyduff in the north and Ardfert in the southern part of the North Kerry Board district. In all of these areas, and everywhere in between, hurling is king.

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In Kilkenny it was football, not hurling, that was the dominant game in the early days of the GAA. The contrast between the two games was clearly evident in 1887 when the very first club championships attracted just four hurling clubs, while nineteen entered its football equivalent. The championship winners, Kilmacow - a team of 'brawny countrymen' - went on to win the inaugural Leinster football championship. Indeed, Kilkenny clubs won three Leinster football titles in the three decades directly after the foundation of the GAA.

Kilkenny people today appear to have the same passion for hurling as Kerry have for the big ball but to this observer, Kilkenny doesn't seem to have the football equivalent of the North Kerry Amish community, with dedicated groups of coaches trying to promote the minority game in isolated pockets to their children.

Many football people complain that the Cats attitude to the big-ball game is disdainful, that their apathy towards football is a rejection of the game. And perhaps that it is true. But that complaint probably reflects the belief commonly held in Gaelic football culture, that football is a better game because it is more popular. Given the direction that Gaelic football has taken in recent years, that argument has been laid bare and exposed for what it is.

It is a bit rich too, for so-called football counties to single out Kilkenny footballers for not being able to match the standards reached by other county sides in Ireland when very few of those counties could ever hope to get near the bar set by the Kilkenny hurlers.

We don't expect the Tyrone hurlers to compete with their Kilkenny counterparts, why should we expect Kilkenny footballers to compete with any county in Leinster? An argument for another day, perhaps.

Anyway, Kilkenny is a hurling county and Kerry is a football county because that's what people in those counties want and that's the tradition they've created for themselves over one hundred and thirty plus years. One cannot but admire those striving to promote minority games in these counties but there's no point pretending it will ever be anything other than a losing battle.

Despite the apples and oranges nature of the big ball-small ball debate, it is not hard to find common ground when surveying the GAA landscape in both counties.

Both know full well what it means to be up there to be knocked down and I'd like to think that both can handle being there when they get knocked down. In spite of (or perhaps because of) all the titles that they've won over the years, Kerry and Kilkenny people also seem to have a default setting that tunes them in to the things that can go wrong when they get to the top.

That is perhaps what has made them the market leaders when it comes to retaining titles. Of the 34 titles Kilkenny have won, 13 have been successfully defended. Kerry, too have successfully defended their 37 titles, a total of 13 times.

When Kerry were denied the five-in-a-row by Offaly in 1982, they came back within two years to win three on the trot between 1984-1986. Likewise when Kilkenny were beaten by Tipperary five years ago they got so vexed that they won four of the next five and, as Richie Hogan reminded us all after this year's final, he and Eoin Larkin were the only two starters from 2009 to start the 2015 final.

As much as hurling people outside Kilkenny yearn for a return to the so-

called Revolution Years, Kilkenny by dint of their excellence just keep evolving and winning.

We know in Kerry that such success doesn't come easy, nor would I be one to ever take it for granted. The Revolution Years of 1994, 1995 and 1996 in hurling coincided with my first three years playing senior football for Kerry. They were also the last three of the so-called Famine Years in Kerry football. The experience of playing through that period and through the frustration and bile that went with it, made everybody in the game down here, vow to never return to those days.

It's funny how Kerry and Kilkenny players can recall instantly and very explicitly those games that were lost and the hurt that went with them. But the victories and the joy that winning brings is a private and implicit matter that is very quickly put in its place so that the entire process can begin again.

There was a big debate all this year about players enjoying the game or otherwise. A perception was created that players were somehow beholden to training regimes, codes of conduct and overbearing discipline. Some of the debate may well have had its basis in experience and in fact but I didn't hear one Kerry or Kilkenny voice being added to the chorus.

They were far too busy getting on with the business of preparing and playing. The game itself and the next ball is all that matters in Nowlan Park or in Fitzgerald Stadium. Whether it is in green and gold hoops or in the black and amber stripes, the players all want to play their role in the great drama- The Neverending Story.

In Kerry we had some of the greatest players ever to play football. From Dick Fitzgerald to Paddy Kennedy to Mick O'Connell, Mikey Sheehy, Maurice Fitzgerald to Colm Cooper. Kilkenny, too, have had a long line of greats from Dick 'Droog' Walsh, Sim Walton, Lory Meagher, Eddie Keher, Ollie Walsh, DJ Carey to Henry and to the countless number of giants that have graced Brian Cody's teams since the turn of the Millennium.

New heroes seem to emerge all the time because they love and respect the game first and foremost.

Passion sustaining the tradition and vice-versa.

Fan Larkin would know a fair bit about that too!

INTER-COUNTY REPORT

For the 3rd consecutive year, Kilkenny competed in the British Junior Championship and it was a case of third time as they conquered the UK to land the spoils. The campaign began on the June Bank Holiday weekend when Paul Donnelly scored a hat-trick of goals as they easily defeated Gloucestershire 4-14 to 2-5 in Nowlan Park, before enduring a much tougher examination against Lanchashire.

Kilkenny emerged victorious 1-13 to 1-11 to set-up a semi-final showdown with Gloucestershire.

Christy Walsh's charges cruised to a 1-16 to 0-1 success to set-up a British Junior Final showdown with Scotland.

Scotland were attempting to complete a hat-trick of consecutive British Junior Championship's having won the previous two years, and they accounted for Kilkenny 0-17 to 0-8 in the Semi-Final.

The final was played in Granton Road in Edinburgh and buoyed on by a strong first-half breeze; Kilkenny took advantage and made a strong start.

Michael Bolger kicked three pointed frees to settle early nerves, and a fisted goal by Cormac McDonald in the 18th minute after great build up play to open up a 5 point lead. 1-3 to 0-1.

However, the Scots replied, and three consecutive points late in the first-half left just two points between the sides at the interval

following a low scoring half. 1-3 to 0-4.

With Kilkenny have played into a strong-wind for the second-half, the odds were stacked against them.

However, a superb defensive display stifled the threat of the Scotland attack, as they restricted them to just four points after the restart.

As the match entered the final quarter, it was all square at 1-4 to 0-7, and with the Kilkenny attack struggling to make an impact, it appeared victory was running away from them.

However, the introduction of substitutes Michael Malone and Dan McCormack gave Kilkenny a much needed lease of life, and they gained a stranglehold around the middle third.

Michael Bolger pointed a free to regain the Kilkenny lead, before Paul Donnelly pointed shortly afterwards to double the advantage, before the critical score arrive to kill off the Scotland challenge.

Team Captain Celeb Roche picked up possession and created space through the Scotland defence before setting up Michael Malone who blasted home an unstoppable shot for a truly wonder goal.

Fellow substitute Dan McCormack added another point before a Scotland pointed free concluded the scoring.

The celebrations began in earnest, before attention turned to their All-Ireland Semi-Final clash against Connacht Champions Mayo in late July which was played in Tullamore.

Despite a valiant effort, Mayo won 1-12 to 0-8 and in truth, the Connacht men never looked like losing.

Mayo led by 0-5 to 0-0 after just 15 minutes before Kilkenny got on the scoreboard.

Kilkenny continued to trail by 5 points at the interval 1-6 to 0-4

Christy Walsh's charges improved in the second-half, and only trailed by 4 points with 10 minutes left.

However, Mayo closed out the game with three unanswered points to run out 7 point winners.

Despite the obvious disappointment of losing, Kilkenny did show signs of improvement and take a step forward in their attempt to return to the National League in the not too distant future.

Christy Walsh and the rest of the management team did an excellent job in leaving no stone unturned to get the best out of the squad.

The players themselves deserve immense credit for their dedicated commitment, and there were up to 50 involved at training throughout the year.

The football board had a mammoth task in organising flights and accommodation for matches Cross-Channel, but Chairman Tom Brennan, Vice-Chairman Tommy Duggan and Secretary Tom O'Reilly smoothly managed to negotiate that process, and they had all the team gear transported by ferry before the players arriving.

"YOU DON'T KNOW WHAT YOU'VE GOT TILL IT'S GONE..."

Irrespective of whether you enjoyed it or not, irrespective even of whether you've read it or not, one thing about *The Godfather of Modern Hurling* is irrefutable: it came out only just in time.

The book was launched in late June 2012. In the course of the next year and a half no fewer than eight people I'd interviewed during the research process passed to their eternal reward. Among them were Paddy Buggy, Tom Walsh and Mickey Walsh from Kilkenny's 1957 All Ireland-winning team, the first to be coached to MacCarthy Cup glory by Fr Tommy Maher; Frankie Walsh, an opponent of theirs that day and Waterford's victorious captain two years later; Pa Dillon; Paddy Downey, the former gaelic games correspondent of *The Irish Times*; and Kevin Heffernan. Yes, that Kevin Heffernan, who'd hurled for Dublin against Kilkenny in the 1957 Leinster semi-final.

Not all the material that emerged from the conversations was directly relevant to Fr Maher, but all the interviews found their way into the final product in some shape or form. Paddy Buggy admitted that he could never get the hang of handpassing the sliotar, a gambit pioneered by Fr Maher as a handy way of creating space, and preferred to move back a couple of steps or move to the side in order to make room for himself to swing. Tom Walsh was astonished to be advised by the coach – or, rather, 'trainer' as Fr Maher was known; 'coach' carried overtones of foreign codes and professionalism – to go home and work on his left against a gable end or the wall of a ball alley ("there was never anyone to tell you anything, you just went out and hurled"). Kevin Heffernan, who in the course of a brief but intriguing phone interview gave the distinct impression he was delighted to be quizzed on a subject that *wasn't* the Dublin football team of the 1970s – recalled his joust with Walsh in that far-off provincial semi-final. Little bits and pieces, all of them, but the kind of little bits and pieces that contribute to a bigger whole. The kind of little bits and

pieces that would never have seen the light of day had Eddie Keher not – rightly - nagged me into the submission of undertaking *The Godfather of Modern Hurling*. The kind of little bits and pieces that in other GAA contexts have been lost forever.

The story of the GAA isn't only the story of players and games, in much the same way that history isn't only the story of kings and queens. The most purely enjoyable article I read about gaelic games this past year was Daragh Ó Conchuir's interview in the *Irish Examiner* with Wicklow GAA stalwart and journalist Peter Keogh. (Google it. It'll repay your time and attention.) Peter has been attending county convention in Wicklow since 1954. He's been club delegate, district board secretary, county chairman, PRO, the lot. Hale and hearty in his mid-80s, he still covers matches for the Wicklow People. He likes his gaelic football but he loves his hurling, and part of the reason he loves his hurling is Kilkenny and the 1947 All Ireland final. Now read on...



Peter Keogh

In the mid-1940s the young Peter Keogh was a gardener's apprentice and general dogsbody at home in Wicklow. He wasn't choosy about his job title because he was earning a few bob, which in turn meant he could afford his first bicycle. "In that time," he recalled in the interview, "you had to order them and wait. My name was down a couple of years but it finally arrived in the summer of 1947. My brother Jack got one at the same time.

"We had cousins in Dublin who we used to visit and then go to the odd All Ireland football final. So when we got the bicycles, we said we'd book the All Ireland straight away. It was to show the new bicycles to the city cousins as much as anything. Everything was set until somebody told us there was no All Ireland. We couldn't believe

nals ever. The young Keogh's impressions of it all?

"I could not believe what I was looking at. I could see nothing at the beginning until I stopped looking for the ball and looked at the direction lads were running in. And I got into it. I'd never seen anything like it in my life and I was a hurling fanatic from that day until this. I still believe that there is no game like hurling."

Nice one, eh? A very small slice of GAA lore and nothing more, of course, but one well worth recording and one that would never have seen newsprint had it not been for the Irish Examiner interview. Memories have to be recorded for posterity. Too late is not only too late but lost forever.

An example. Paul Fitzpatrick, the sports editor of the Anglo Celt newspaper, wrote a book called *The Fairytale* in New York a couple of years ago. It's an account, mostly from the Cavan angle, of the 1947 All Ireland football final in the Polo Grounds, the one referred to in passing by Peter Keogh. It is an amazing story and Fitzpatrick tells it with energy and style. Thing is, Paul Fitzpatrick is 30 years old and this was a book that should have been written ages ago, when the survivors of the Polo Grounds were still knocking around Cavan with their memories to impart.

Curse those scribes and wannabe – but never-were – scribes of decades past who fell asleep on the job. (Not all of them, of course. Raymond Smith deserves a monument.) Curse the not-Paul Fitzpatricks of the 1970s who didn't think of or didn't bother to research and write *The Fairytale* in New York there and then. Curse the other scribes of the same era who never thought of tracking down the survivors of that most seminal of All Ireland hurling finals, the three-parter of 1931, and preserving their recollections for posterity.

I know I've banged on about this before. Still, once more with feeling. The 1931 hurling decider was a turning point in the history and fortunes of the GAA and the beginning of serious media coverage of gaelic games, the moment hurling found its place in the national consciousness. It was a three-act thriller with a cast of thousands that included the Prince of Hurlers, plenty of stout Blackrock men, High Court judges and swooning lady journalists. There was never anything like it before and there's never been anything like it since. Two draws, two replays, endless drama and an aggregate attendance of 92,000 people who paid nearly £8,000 in gate receipts, both unimaginable figures at the time. What a book that would have been! And exactly who did break Lory Meagher's ribs the second day while we're at it..?

The fault is probably an institutional one. The GAA have been so busy organising and running their games for so long that taking an active hand in recording them was an afterthought. They weren't proactive in that regard, which is why numerous individuals have taken it upon themselves to step into the breach over the years. Locally we've had Dermot Kavanagh with his biography of Ollie Walsh, history of Kilkenny hurling finals and story of the men in the striped number three jersey. Jim Walsh from Slieverue penned a biography of James Nowlan, he of Nowlan Park fame. And longtime city resident and O'Loughlins loyalist Jim Fogarty, a native of Roscrea, has done the Association plenty of service with his history of Tipperary county finals and, latterly, *The Cross of Cashel*, his opus on All Ireland under-21 hurling finals since the establishment of the competition.

Point is, it shouldn't have been left up to Jim et al to undertake such ventures off their own bat. These are the GAA's games, the GAA's records, the GAA's statistics. As such, it's up to the GAA to take ownership of them. For the record, Croke Park does house a library of gaelic games books and the GAA does employ an archivist. One trusts that if and when a Kilkenny GAA museum is eventually established it will include a well stocked reading room.

At a local level there's endless scope for imagination. Has every club in Kilkenny published their own history? If not, why not? The 150th anniversary of the GAA will be celebrated in 19 years' time. The moment to get cracking is now, not in 2032. Just think of all the great club men and women who won't be around then and who will have taken their memories with them. By a not dissimilar token, county titles should be marked with a souvenir booklet. St Patrick's of Ballyragget did this brilliantly a couple of years back to commemorate their Kilkenny, Leinster and All Ireland junior triumphs.

While I'm at it, a word of advice for anyone undertaking a book in the near or distant future. Do not trust former players and their recollections, not when it comes to the details of matches from the long ago. They mean well but they are frequently incorrect. It's only natural. Time rushes by. Memories fade. Matches blur into each other. Check, double-check and check

again, and while you're at it find a knowledgeable fact-checker to proof the manuscript and save you from errors entirely of your own making. I have my own cautionary tale in this regard.

Someone I spoke to for *The Godfather of Modern Hurling* mentioned how Fr Tommy Maher, as a young curate in Crumlin in Dublin, cycled over to Croke Park for the 1950 All Ireland final, arriving just at the end of the minor match, "in which Dublin caused a sensation by beating Tipperary". Now I knew perfectly well when I was writing the book, and I still know, that Kilkenny won the 1950 All Ireland minor title. I even know, and have known for many years because he lived just down the road from the McEvoy's of the Hebron Road, that Paddy Johnston was the hero of the hour. Yet somehow I suspended my critical faculties, took my interviewee at their word, didn't bother to double-check - and ended up with Dublin as 1950 minor champions. Bí curamach.

I'll stop now. But just before I do, what's the next great Kilkenny hurling story to be told? And who's going to tell it

CLAUS DUNNE R.I.P.

Claus Dunne from Mooncoin, who died in March of this year, was one of the outstanding hurlers of the 1960's and 70's. Possessing great speed, skill and a powerful shot, he had that ability to do something out of the ordinary in a match that would excite spectators and turn the game in his team's favour. During his career he won senior championship honours with his club and won National League, Leinster, and All Ireland medals with Kilkenny as well as Railway cup honours with Leinster.

Claus was born in the village of Mooncoin in September 1945. He attended the local boys' national school and it was there that he first displayed the talent that had many predicting that he would eventually become a star. At that time and for many years afterwards, the Primary Schools Board had responsibility for the under fourteen championship in the county, and so it was with the Parish school team that he won back to back championships – the second one as team captain. He was a member of the club's under sixteen for the following two years and played in the 1961 county final in that grade.

At seventeen he turned his attention to soccer and with rule 27, otherwise known as the 'Ban', in vogue at the time he was denied the opportunity to play minor hurling. Unsurprisingly, he also excelled in that sport and was subsequently chosen to play on the Waterford League of Ireland team.

He returned to hurling a couple of years later and played his first senior championship game for Mooncoin against Bennetsbridge in the 1964 championship, and although this game ended in a heart-breaking defeat courtesy of a last minute goal, such was his display that day that he was immediately called into the County panel.

The following year 1965 would prove to be a special one for him with the Club and while still not twenty one years old he played a leading role in all of the team's victories in that championship campaign in which they ended the club's twenty nine year wait for a twelfth senior county title. Adding further lustre to that success was the fact that in the final they defeated the defending champions Bennetsbridge who had knocked them out of the championship the previous year and who were the dominant team in the county at that time.

After the victory in the county final and, with the National League commencing in October back then, he was chosen to play at right half forward on the Kilkenny team that went on to win 1965/66 National League title, defeating Tipperary in the Final. In 1966 also he won the first of his three Leinster championship medals as a member of the Kilkenny team that defeated Wexford in that

year's provincial final. The same year he also played in the first of four All Ireland finals which unfortunately ended in a disappointing defeat by Cork.

In 1967 he was chosen to play on the Leinster team that defeated Munster in the Railway Cup final which was played in Croke Park on Saint Patrick's Day and that victory would prove to be a precursor to greater achievements later that year as he subsequently lined out on the Kilkenny team that defeated Wexford in the Leinster final before going

on to win his first All-Ireland medal as a member of the team that defeated Tipperary in the All-Ireland final. That victory is remembered with special affection by all Kilkenny followers as it ended a forty five year hoodoo against our nearest neighbours.

In 1969 he won a third Leinster medal and collected a second All Ireland medal when he lined out in the half forward line on the Kilkenny team that defeated Cork in that year's All Ireland Final. He made his last appearance for the county in the losing All Ireland final against Limerick in 1973 a game in which he was the team's leading scorer.

Claus excelled at Gaelic football also and won a junior championship medal with Mooncoin and a senior championship medal with Saint Kieran's which was a joint Mooncoin/ Kilmacow combination and he lined out with Kilkenny in both the National Football league and Leinster Junior championship on numerous occasions.

Despite his sporting achievements Claus never sought the limelight for himself and remained the same quiet-spoken and unassuming person that he always was throughout his life. His love of hurling continued in the years after he retired from playing and he regularly attended both club and county games up to the time of his illness. The last game that he attended was the drawn All Ireland Final of 2014 against Tipperary and although forced to watch the replay at home on television he thoroughly enjoyed Kilkenny's victory.

His untimely passing after a relatively brief illness was a cause of great sadness to all who knew him and in particular to Mooncoin and Kilkenny hurling followers. The huge attendance at his removal and funeral Mass, which included many of his former club and county playing colleagues, reflected the level of esteem in which he was held by all.

We extend our deepest sympathy to his wife Lilian, his sons Liam and Paul, his daughters Claire and Laura, his sister Irene, his grandchildren and the extended Dunne family.

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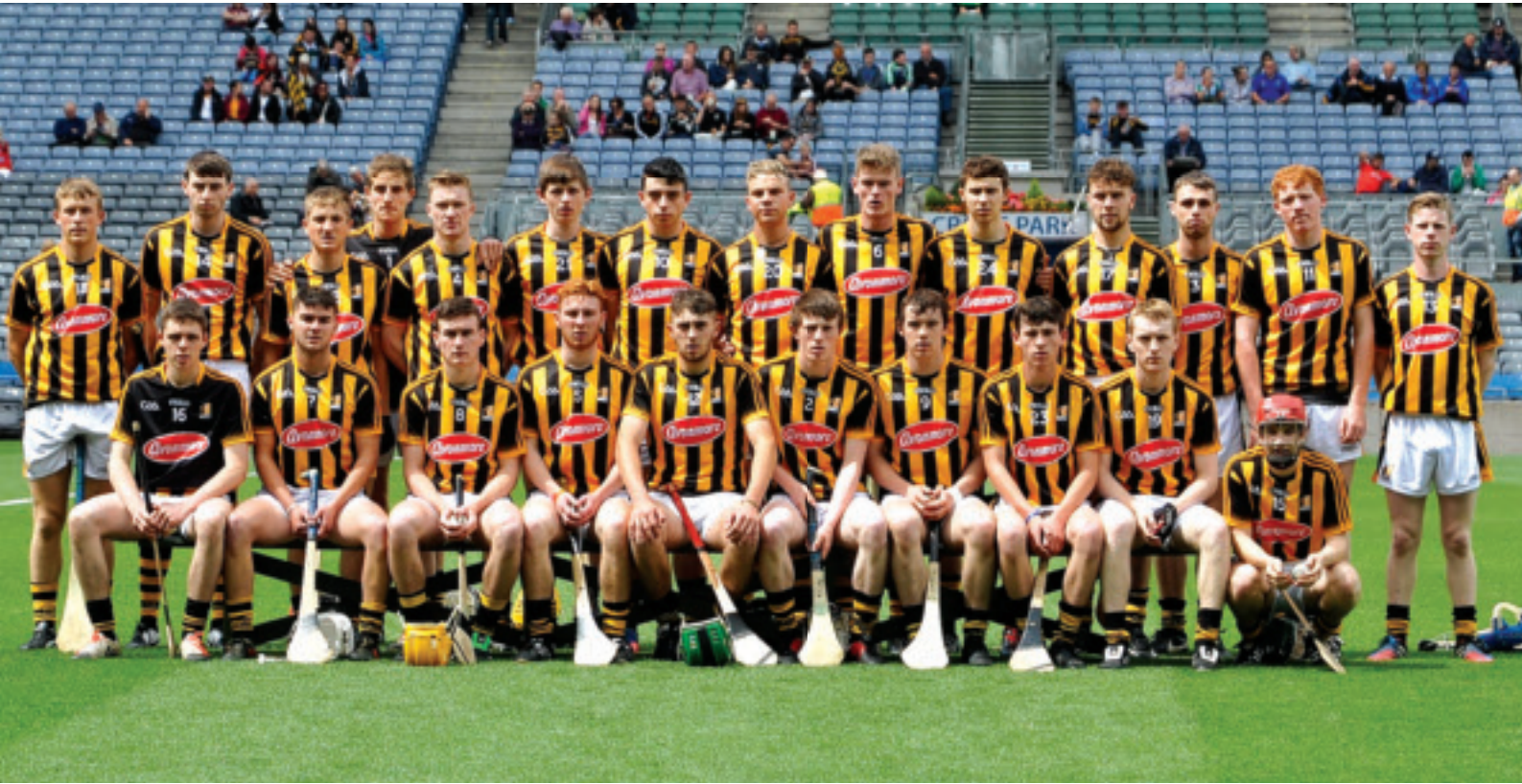
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A Very Fine Line...

"I guess the players learned the hard way that there really is a very fine line between winning and losing". So says Kilkenny minor hurling manager Pat Hoban looking back on 2015. It might have been very different. It so very nearly was.

The campaign to retain the Irish Press Cup began on the 25th of April down in Wexford Park. Cold and wet conditions were always going to make their first outing a tight affair and so it proved to be.

Playing into a strong wind in the first half meant Kilkenny went into the dressing room four points down. However, a goal immediately after the restart for Wexford put seven points between the sides. Consistent free taking from Andrew Gaffney kept Kilkenny in touch but they were still four points in arrears entering the final ten minutes.

Gaffney was proving himself to be the decisive player when a goal with eight minutes to go, followed by a difficult free brought the game to extra time. Three points from play in the extra period from Daniel O'Connor was enough to ensure

victory by the slimmest of margins. Kilkenny 1-18 Wexford 1-17. Victory over Wexford meant an almost two month wait before Kilkenny next played. This time the venue was Nowlan Park with

Laois in opposition.

Goals on either side of half time from Andy Gaffney and John Donnelly meant that Kilkenny were rarely under pressure from the O'Moore county.

Laois actually started off the brighter of the two sides with points from Mark Kavanagh and Aaron Dunphy. However 1-6 without reply from Kilkenny effectively ended the game as a contest.

Despite playing with a strong wind in the second half, Laois never looked like fully closing the gap and Donnelly's 36th minute goal put ten points between the sides.

The final score of 2-18 to 0-11 meant that Kilkenny could look forward to a third Leinster final in a row against Dublin.

That game took place two weeks later in Croke Park. Nine points had been the difference between the teams 12 months previously. This year it would prove to be a much tighter affair.

Matthew Oliver and Andy Gaffney traded frees in the opening minutes before Joey Cuddihy's piercing crossfield ball was collected by Tadgh O'Dwyer, who dispatched it to the Dublin net. However when it looked like Kilkenny might begin to pull clear, Dublin stayed in touch through

the free-taking of Na Fianna's Matthew Oliver. The Cats went in 1-7 to 0-8 in front at the interval. Dublin experienced the dream start to the second half. After only seconds, substitute Alex Considine pounced for a goal. A series of points followed for the Boys in Blue meaning that they led 1-13 to 1-10 going into the final quarter.

Four late points for Kilkenny were to prove the winning of the game. Richie Leahy, Daniel O'Connor, Conor Hennessy and Edmund Delaney each taking turns to divide the uprights.

A scoreline of 1-17 to 1-15 enough to ensure a third Leinster minor hurling crown in a row for Pat Hoban's men.

Standing between them and an appearance in Croke Park on All Ireland final day was Galway.

Twice, Kilkenny looked to have the Tribesmen beaten, but twice Galway came back to score goals and level it.

Galway set up with a seventh defender sweeping in front of their full-back line and for spells during the first half, Kilkenny looked incapable of breaking them down.

However a flurry of points, three from Andy Gaffney frees meant that Galway went in at half time only two points up.

Kilkenny then hit five in a row on the resumption of hostilities but Galway were brought level in the 49th minutes when centre-forward Monaghan drilled home a goal.

Points from Richie Leahy and Conor Hennessy looked to have edged it for the defending All Ireland champions but a late Galway point ensured the game would go to extra time.

Kilkenny could hardly have asked for a better start to the first period. Six points in a row helped give them a four point cushion at the break.

But Galway had another comeback in them and Cian Salmon got a crucial flick on the ball to send it to the Kilkenny net. A 10th free from Andy Gaffney meant the game ended Kilkenny 0-26 Galway 2-20.

The teams lined out against each other only seven days later in what proved to be an equally remarkable encounter.

Two goals in the last five minutes would ultimately give Jeffrey Lynskey's Galway side a thrilling two point victory.

Kilkenny were the better side for long periods of the game and despite the fact that they never looked capable of killing off Galway, they held a lead of four points going into the final minutes. Substitute Jack Kenny was sprung from the Galway bench and less than a minute after taking the field, he shot brilliantly to the bottom corner of the net to leave just one in it.

Kilkenny pegged on another point, but an Evan Niland free and a second Galway goal, this time scored by Cian Salmon, meant despair for Pat Hoban and his wards.

Kilkenny had started slowly but recovered to lead by two points at the break, recovering well from that slow start to largely dominate the opening 30 minutes.

Gaffney pointed a '65' after half time to edge Kilkenny three clear but a quick Galway response from Ian O'Brien and Thomas Monaghan cut the gap to the minimum.

The third quarter was dominated by Galway, but Kilkenny however, clung on to their lead with two from Gaffney, one from play. When Kilkenny edged the difference out to four points, it looked like it might be too late for Galway.

Unfortunately, the introduction of Kenny and Salmon saw the All Ireland title slip from Black and Amber hands.

"We had our chances but were probably guilty of not taking them on both days" says Hoban.

"Which was an awful pity because this group of players had shown such resilience and character to get this far. The first day against Wexford we had to dig very deep to get the win. The Leinster final too was a tough game. The final few minutes and the points we scored showed tremendous resolve."

"On both days against Galway, we put ourselves in a position to win but just couldn't get over the line."

"And at this level, you simply have to take your chances when they come along."

For the third year in a row Kilkenny's involvement in the Bord Gais Energy under 21 hurling championship ended in a huge disappointment at the hands of Wexford. In hindsight, a somewhat fortunate win over Dublin in the quarter-final followed up by a very nervy win over neighbours Carlow should have had supporters travelling to Wexford more in hope rather than confidence for the Leinster Final. But the manner of the defeat to undoubtedly a fine Wexford side was difficult to understand.

The campaign started brightly enough in early June in Parnell Park.

Bord Gais Energy Leinster Quarter-Final Parnell Park June 2nd Kilkenny 4-12 Dublin 2-16

Kilkenny defeated Dublin after midfielder Mark Mansfield scored a dramatic late winning goal at Parnell Park to secure Kilkenny's Bord Gais Energy Leinster U21 HC semi-final place. The Cats hadn't led in the entire game until Mansfield's 60th minute point effort dropped short and somehow evaded Dublin goalkeeper Sean Brennan. It was tough on Dublin who had led for the majority of the game and who were six clear with 16 minutes to go. But they couldn't hold on as Kilkenny rallied with three goals in the final quarter to ultimately set up a June 24 clash with

Carlow. Kilkenny played second fiddle to Dublin for long spells and shot 15 frustrating wides overall. Dublin raced from the traps early on and were 1-3 to 0-1 up after just 11 minutes. Sean Treacy, brother of county senior star David, grabbed 1-1 of that tally and helped himself to 1-3 in the opening half. But a dozen wides hurt Dublin who led by just 1-8 to 1-6 at the break when it should have been more. Kilkenny points from Mansfield and Conor Martin after the restart tied it up for the first time at 1-8 apiece. Dublin steadied themselves and firstly moved three clear again before doubling that gap with a 44th minute Cian Boland goal. But within seconds Kilkenny had cancelled the goal out thanks to James Maher's goal. And though Dublin led by one approaching full-time, Mansfield's speculative effort would break the hosts' hearts and secure Kilkenny's passage.

Kilkenny 2-14 Carlow 1-12

Carlow produced a magnificent display against the odds but, ultimately, the concession of two-first half goals cost them as Kilkenny sealed their place in the decider. Early goals from Ciaran Ryan and Liam Hickey propelled the Cats into a 2-9 to 0-8 interval advantage and, despite a spirited effort which yielded second-half majors from Peter Shaw and Jack Kavanagh, Carlow couldn't quite get back on terms. Bennettsbridge clubman Jason Cleere raided forward to open the scoring and Conor Martin's free quickly doubled the gap. Full forward Ryan had the ball in

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the back of the Carlow net in the fourth minute and midfielder Paddy Deegan's point ensured the Black & Amber of a 1-3 to 0-2 advantage after eight minutes, with Ted Joyce – with the first of his two first-half scores – and Chris Nolan supplying those early points for the Barrowsiders. A Kevin McDonald free kept the underdogs in touch but the Cats responded with a point from Ryan before bagging their second goal in the twelfth minute through corner forward Hickey. Even though the underdogs replied with another McDonald score, they still trailed by those two goals at the end of the opening quarter, 2-4 to 0-4. Nolan reduced the arrears to five but the visitors hit back immediately through Mullinavat's Mark Mansfield. Martin and James Maher added further Cats points while McDonald helped himself to another brace to leave the two majors still separating the teams with six minutes left in the first half, 2-7 to 0-7. The Cats notched two of the next three points courtesy of Ryan and Martin to lead by seven at the short whistle. Hickey pointed to make it double scores straight after the resumption but Carlow rallied with a goal and a point from Peter Shaw to reduce the arrears to just four points with three minutes played in the second half, 2-10 to 1-9. A Martin free offered the favourites some respite but the resilient hosts replied from a Marty Kavanagh free to remain very much in contention approaching the three-quarters stage. Liam Blanchfield stretched the gap out to five again but – with an appreciative home crowd roaring them on – the hosts replied through Nolan and Kavanagh to trail by just a goal with ten minutes left. Alas, a Martin free provided the insurance point on 55 minutes and Blanchfield made it a five-point match 60 seconds later. Final – Innovate Wexford Park July 8th

WEXFORD 4-17 KILKENNY 1-9

A golden display from Man-of-the-Match Conor McDonald, who landed a haul of 1-10 (0-7 frees), led the hosts to a third Bord Gáis Energy Under-21 Leinster hurling title in a row at the expense of old rivals Kilkenny at Innovate Wexford Park.

Wexford's first-half performance was a feat of brilliance. In spite of conceding 1-1 inside the first 30 seconds, they completed a remarkable recovery to lead by ten points just over 20 minutes later. The hosts repaired their defensive blunders in a stunning fashion.

Chris Bolger and Liam Hickey wriggled their way through on a number of occasions but Eoin Conroy, Pádraig Foley and Jack O'Connor were quick to fight back and launch some splendid counter-attacks.

Kilkenny opened with a classic onslaught. Paddy Deegan broke from the throw-in, jinked his way through to find Liam Hickey.

With the Wexford defence in disarray, Hickey fired a low drive to Oliver O'Leary's net after just 13 seconds. Midfielder Willie Brennan added the visitors' first point seconds later.

Although the Cats dominated from the off, flooding Wexford players in pairs, the home side soon got to grips with their physicality and began to outwit them.

All of the visitors' hopes were dashed within between the 17th and 24th minute when Wexford delivered a sucker-punch to their opponents in the form of a trio of goals.

First Pádraig Foley cast a perfect ball to Naomh Éanna attacker McDonald who fired a shot to the Clonard-end net, then McDonald and Andrew Kenny combined with flicks to set up James Cash for a goal and county senior squad member Kenny followed suit with a sweet goal.

Those three fatal strikes contributed to Wexford's halftime lead of 3-8 to 1-4. Cathal Dunbar made his mark on the scoresheet as he raised a green-flag within three minutes of the restart. At the other end, Conor Martin and Seán Morrissey tested Oliver O'Leary on the goal-line, but the Buffers Alley clubman repelled their shots.

Conor McDonald tagged on points to seize the spoils for Wexford as JJ Doyle's men exhibited a vibrant style of hurling. Captain Eoin Conroy was euphoric as he accepted the trophy, which marks a three-in-a-row of provincial titles for the Model county, the first since the three won from 1969 to 1971.

On the 1st October 2014 at a Leinster Council meeting in Portlaoise it was agreed to accommodate Galway's Intermediate Team in the 2015 Leinster Intermediate Hurling Championship. The draw took place after the meeting, Galway Intermediates were drawn to play Kilkenny in the Leinster Semi-Final and the winners of this game to play Wexford in the Leinster Final. Kilkenny, after the disappointment of the previous four years, were gunning to win their fourth title. However, with the introduction of Galway into the Leinster championship, winning the Leinster title would become ever so difficult.

Galway 3-22 Kilkenny 1-17

On 1st July 2015 Galway beat Kilkenny 3-22 to 1-17 at O'Connor Park to set up a Leinster decider with Wexford. Two-time All Star Michael Rice would make a return to the Kilkenny colours. However, his efforts would be in vain as the cats lost out to a smart Galway outfit at O'Connor Park in Tullamore. Rice had been out of action for best part of two years with a career shattering cruciate knee injury, but not even the most ardent of Galway supporters could deny his resilience in getting back to full fitness. And he showed a lot of his old skill in the No 11 shirt which

was reminiscent of the late 2000s and early 2010s, but his side had no answer to the power of the Galway team – who featured a number of Anthony Cunningham's senior squad members – as they booked a Leinster final date with Wexford.

Points from Michael Rice, Johnny Hayes and Rory Hickey, gave Kilkenny 0-3 to 0-2 lead after six minutes. Hayes was on target again in the ninth minute to make it double scores. Ger Malone tagged on the fifth Kilkenny point but Galway responded well and the sides were level after 13 minutes. Despite a point from Liam Blanchfield, the westerners kicked on to lead by 0-8 to 0-6 eighteen minutes in. Defensive lapses cost Kilkenny dearly as the Galway full-forward line helped themselves to three goals in the first half. Conor Whelan's 19th-minute goal put some daylight between the sides for the first time; the Noresiders replied with a second Rice point; but Shane Maloney (a man who would become the deciding factor in the All Ireland Semi Final v Tipperary) added the second Galway three-pointer almost immediately to leave seven between them: 2-8 to 0-7, double scores! Hayes, Hickey ('65') and Rice all pointed as the Black & Amber rallied but all the good work was undone when Whelan

got in for Galway's third major three minutes from the break, 3-10 to 0-10. There was an exchange of points before the short whistle, with Blanchfield hitting his second for the losers. Half Time Galway 3-11 Kilkenny 0-11

All the Cats could do by the midway stage in the second half was pare the nine-point deficit to eight: three points from Hickey and one from Hayes made it 3-14 to 0-15. Niall Doherty added another Kilkenny point but Galway kept the scoreboard ticking over too and the three goals still separated the teams with 13 minutes to go. The Tribesmen never looked troubled from here to the end and Ger Malone's 59th-minute goal for Kilkenny only helped to lessen the margin before the final whistle. Sadly the event failed to inspire the supporters of either side, with an official and paltry attendance of 466 telling its own story.

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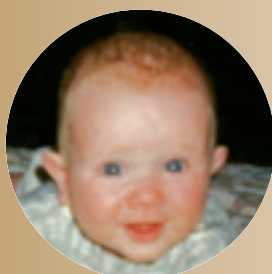

Two titles in three years and three consecutive county final appearances is a fair return for this Clara side that has been earmarked for success since they blitzed their way through Cumann na mBunscoileanna and Bord na nÓg competitions since the turn of the millennium.

It is reasonable to suggest they will not be going away any time soon, given their youthful profile. This is the greatest generation of Clara hurlers, though the backbone comes from the old established hurling families. A team devoid of stars, they all display an admirable work ethic and discipline. They play an expansive game, relying on natural speed and excellent long range point shooting. Their only seeming weaknesses this year were a relative scarcity of goals scored, though that is improving, and a propensity to fall back in defence when under pressure. If they harbour hopes of All Ireland club glory, this must change. It had almost calamitous results in the county final as O'Loughlin's were allowed to monopolise possession in their own half in the latter stages.

The county final itself promised much, was well contested throughout, but never roused the collective spirit or ire of a subdued crowd of 7,200 spectators. Clara raced into a six point lead before being hauled back on pointed frees. However the country side was always in control and a second scrambled goal gave them lots of breathing space before the inevitable O'Loughlin's late charge.

Three items of note from the day. It was unusual, though not unique, to see brother marking brother, Keith v. Brian Hogan and the contest could justifiably be declared a draw. Martin Comerford lit up the game with a great performance and led his team from the front, but the warrior of old simply could not put out enough fires.

Poignant, too, the photograph of three strapping Ryans and their mother at the final whistle. A touching moment, remembering Johnny, the powerhouse of an earlier generation and his untimely passing in January.

Earlier in the year the draws for the St. Canice's Credit Union senior hurling league could not have been much more lopsided. The three city teams plus Clara were destined to give considerable grief to Erin's Own and Carrickshock.

On the other side, reigning All Ireland club champions Ballyhale Shamrocks were expected to saunter through a group of potential strugglers. Newly promoted Mullinavat were not expected to set the world on fire and everybody continued to wonder if perennial relegation candidates Fenians could survive another senior season. Nobody was sure how Rower-

Inistioge's second season at senior level would pan out, while Danesfort and St. Martin's were generally seen to be hovering in an uncertain territory near the plughole for Intermediate hurling.

There continues to be admiration for the structure. It is truly competitive. There are no dead rubbers as the league comes to a close since every team has some incentive in winning each game. It keeps the competition truly honest. It would be wonderful if our All Ireland senior championships was organised on the same basis.

In Group A Clara came out on top, despite close calls from Erin's Own and O'Loughlin's. The latter earned a Shield final place with a last game win over the Village. James Stephens were fortunate to defeat Carrickshock and Erin's Own in the early rounds as their form suffered thereafter, a cause of much concern in the Larchfield camp. The Rower topped Group B after draws with Ballyhale and Fenians and good form against Danesfort and St. Martins. They were followed by eager Fenians who posted the surprise of the season in defeating Ballyhale by a single point on the 24th May. They went on to win the Shield against O'Loughlin's who fielded a skeleton selection in the final. The score was 1-18 to 0-17 as Fenians gained some reward for a hard-working early season. Clara gave Rower-Inistioge a lesson in the league final and it was clear they were on a mission to exorcise the poor showing in the 2014 county final.

The surprise packet of the season was Mullinavat who reached the semi-finals thanks to a merited win over Rower-Inistioge. However they were easily disposed of by Clara, but the 'Vat men will be happy with their first year back in senior ranks in over a decade.

Ballyhale Shamrocks failed to measure up against a dogged O'Loughlin's in the other semi-final. One might ask have the years become too much of a burden on their most influential players? The warning sides were there when they were lucky to get past a Village team in the first round, a Village team short the services of Jackie Tyrrell and Eoin Larkin.

The relegation scrap was, as always, morbidly entertaining. Carrickshock had a miserable year, losing Michael Rice and Richie Power through injury and their meagre resources could not withstand the more youthful vigour of St. Martin's. The Muckalee men must improve substantially next year in order to survive because charging into the fray are the Intermediate champions Bennettsbridge who are certain to make a significant impression in 2016. Roll on the Spring.

They bookended the intermediate season of 2015 with the first and last matches of an intriguing league and a fascinating championship, but the outcome, eventually, was similar. Bennettsbridge and St. Patrick's were the top performers in the grade throughout the season, and it is fair to say that little separated the sides on every occasion. But when it mattered most, the reigning county junior and All-Ireland junior champions proved that their future shines brighter than all others in capturing another title and a potential return to further days of glory not seen in Bennettsbridge since the 1960's. The players and supporters will surely be brimming with optimism at the prospect of this, such is the momentum they have now built up.

And what of their final opponents, who suffered a third final loss in four years. There will surely be a sombre period of reflection in Ballyragget over the remaining months before the 2016 season comes around, but one feels that despite the loss, they can overcome the frustration of falling at the final hurdle with the quality of the players at their disposal. It won't be easy, however, with so many teams of such an even standard potentially in their wake. One could make a case for the prospects of at least half a dozen teams next year, which all in all could make for an unpredictable outcome. It will be interesting, of that there is no doubt!

The league games saw a shield final between St. Lachtain's and Young Irelands and a league final involving Tullaroan and Bennettsbridge. The shield was ultimately won by the Freshford men on a 1-14 to 0-14 score line while Bennettsbridge continued on their winning ways by defeated Tullaroan by 2-20 to 2-15. Meanwhile, the opening round of the championship threw together Tullogher-Rosbercon and Emeralds, Lisdowney and Conahy Shamrocks, Thomastown and Dunnamaggin, and St. Patrick's and Graigue-Ballycallan.

Tullogher-Rosbercon and Emeralds have

enjoyed high moments in previous years, but disappointing results in the league meant the loser of this game would face into a relegation final. Though the Urlingford men tried manfully to turn the tide in their favour, mainly through the leadership of Aidan Fogarty, a second goal from Tullogher's Cian O'Donoghue was the killer blow. In the end, the Tullogher men won out by 2-17 to 0-15. Conahy Shamrocks had enjoyed a great start to their league campaign with three victories, but then lost their final two games against Young Irelands and Thomastown to miss of quarter-final qualification. Lisdowney enjoyed mixed results in the league, though had drawn with Bennettsbridge, the eventual winners. Goals proved to be the difference between the teams on this occasion. Lisdowney held the ascendancy in this regard, with Ciaran Mackey and Vinny Fitzpatrick scoring opportunist goals to ensure their side led by 2-4 to 0-7 at the interval. Conahy did fight back through a James Bergin goal, but further Lisdowney goals from Mackey and Michael Kenny meant Lisdowney continued to stay in front. Though Conahy attempted to salvage something from the game, the second goal they needed didn't come, as Lisdowney held on to win by 4-8 to 1-15.

Thomastown secured their place in the quarter-finals with their victory over Dunnamaggin. In what was a high-scoring

game, Thomastown led by 1-11 to 0-13 at the interval. The scoring rate continued throughout the second half but it was Thomastown who scored a crucial second goal immediately at the start of the second half to keep their noses further ahead. Bennettsbridge and Tullogher-Rosbercon faced off in Ballyhale and though the Bridge started well, it was Tullogher who finished the opening half the stronger with a great goal from Edmund Cullinane to leave the score 0-9 to 1-5 in Bennettsbridge's favour. A goal immediately at the start of the second half from Liam Blanchfield gave the Bridge a tonic start but the Southerners once again proved their mettle by reducing the lead to a point later in the half thanks to a Cian O'Donoghue goal. But when Liam

Blanchfield scored his second goal in the final minutes, it was the Bridge who advanced by winning 2-16 to 2-10.

Tullaroan, having dropped down to the intermediate ranks, had slowly but surely found some consistent form throughout the league, and though defeated in the league final, were optimistic for their championship prospects. However, Thomastown clearly did not read from this script, as they produced a fine performance to qualify for the county semi-finals. Tullaroan seemingly had no answer to the swift interplay of the Thomastown men, who had a dream start with an early

goal from Dylan Waugh. It saw Thomastown towards a 1-7 to 0-5 half-time lead. Tullaroan did fight back, however, and managed to leave the deficit to the minimum by the midway point of the half (1-8 to 1-7). However, that was as good as it got for them, as Thomastown showed a real sense of calm to score consecutive points during the final quarter to win in the end by 1-14 to 1-8.

Neighbours Lisdowney and St. Lachtain's faced off in the final quarter-final in Ballyragget. The Freshford men made a bright start to lead by 1-4 to 0-1 after ten minutes. Though Lisdowney did respond

With both sides naturally nervous and edgy in their play, the experience that Dunnamaggin could call on through the likes of Canice & Noel Hickey, Seaghan O'Neill and Kenny Moore was enough to see off the challenge of the Urlingford men. Though Emeralds will be disappointed with a return to the junior grade, they can look to the return of Glenmore, this year's junior champions, as incentive to repeat that feat in 2016.

The opening championship semi-final paired together Bennettsbridge and St. Lachtain's. The early exchanges were

Kenny, which brought Ballyragget through to the county final.

St. Patrick's and Bennettsbridge, based on their previous matches in the lead-up to the final, promised a high scoring affair, and it did not disappoint. It was the frees of Nickey Cleere and Kevin Kelly that both sides depended on mainly for scores and it was the Bennettsbridge man who got the majority of chances, which he unerringly scored to ensure his team a famous victory. In the end, only two points separated the sides, with the Bridge winning by 1-16 to 1-14. Having remained unbeaten throughout 2015 (save one draw during the league), one could not argue that it was not what they duly deserved. To also make the journey from junior to senior ranks into two years is something all associated with Bennettsbridge GAA should surely rank at the greatest achievement in a storied club history.

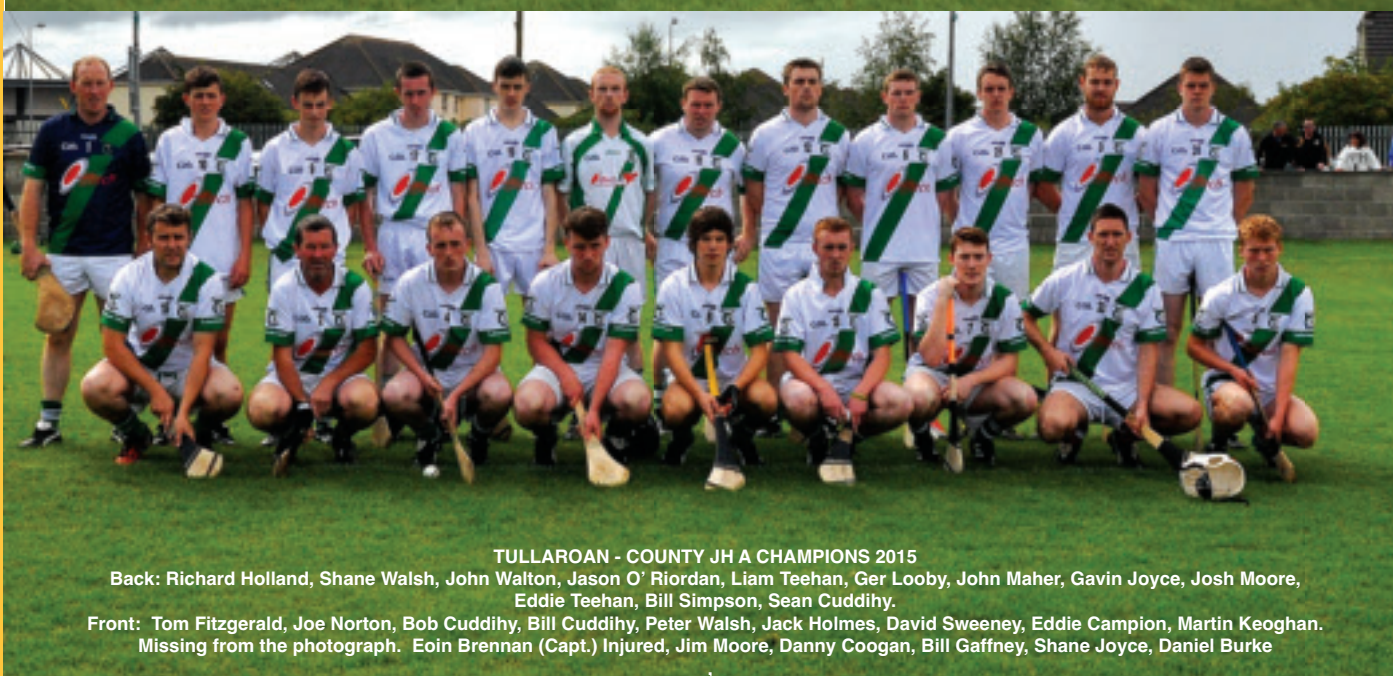

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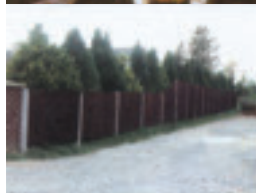

Under-21 Roinn A Championship

For the 2nd time in 3 years, the Under-21 County Championships were delayed as a result of Kilkenny's All-Ireland Final replay against Tipperary, and the B competition was finished just a few days before Christmas. However, the Roinn A Championship was behind schedule, and it wasn't finished till mid-January when Dicksboro easily defeated Thomastown after a replay.

The Boro were worthy winners of the Under-21 Championship, and indeed they had to require another replay earlier in the competition when defeating Clara in the semi-final of the Northern section.

The Northern Final against Bennettsbridge played the first weekend in January was a titanic struggle.

In the last minute of normal time, the sides were level at 2-8 to 0-14, but the Boro dug deep and points from Andrew Gaffney and Eoin Fennelly sealed victory, but not before goalkeeper Aaron Duggan pulled off a critical save in the dying seconds to deny Kevin Brennan.

In the Southern section, Thomastown secured the title defeating Glenmore 0-19 to 2-8 just 4 days before Christmas Day last year.

Despite playing into a strong breeze during the opening-half, Thomastown led 0-7 to 0-3 coming towards half-time, before Glenmore grabbed a goal to leave a solitary point between the teams at the interval.

Thomastown started to slowly exert an influ-

ence during the 3rd quarter, and they opened up a 6 point lead with the Donnelly's Robbie and Michael scoring at will.

That scoring burst proved decisive as Thomastown would wait to see who would eventually come through from the North.

The County Final between Dicksboro and Thomastown was played in Nowlan Park on the 11th of January, and it produced an epic and dramatic finish with Thomastown snatching an unlikely draw with two late last gasp goals.

Thomastown made a flying start aided by the wind, and a John Donnelly goal gave them a 1-7 to 0-4 coming towards half-time.

However, the Boro responded and a well worked goal from Kevin Kenny halved the deficit by the interval. 1-8 to 1-5.

Barring the dying stages, the Boro men totally dominated the re-start, and up until injury-time, they outscored their opponents by 0-10 to just a concession of a solitary point to lead 1-14 to 1-9.

The Boro had victory within sight, but no one could write the script of the closing stages.

A Danny Monks goal in the 59th minute gave Thomastown hope, before Monks struck again 4 minutes into injury-time to prove an unlikely saviour for the South Kilkenny men.

The replay took place a week late, and Dicksboro made no mistake as they easily dismantled Thomastown 5-9 to 0-10.

However, the Boro appeared up against it from an early stage when Andrew Gaffney was dismissed.

In a mostly low scoring first-half, Dicksboro led 0-5 to 0-4 by the 25th minute, before going on a crazy goalscoring blitz late in the half which crucified Thomastown's hopes.

All of a sudden, goals from Daragh Holohan, Robbie Murphy and Kevin Kenny opened up a decisive and commanding advantage, and there was no way back for their opponents. Holohan and Conor Fitzpatrick added further goals during the second-half to kill off any hopes of a Thomastown revival as the Boro strolled to victory.

The big shock of the first round was the defeat of St Martin's who many had expected to challenge the top two but they had no answer for a Conor Hennessy led Tullogher Rosbercon. Erin's Own, Lisdowney, Bennettsbridge, Galmoy/Windgap, Kilmacow and Conahy Shamrocks all made their exits in the first round of the championship. Dunamaggin signalled their intentions for the year with a huge margin of victory over Emeralds, while John Lockes had a similar margin of victory the following evening over Clara. Tullogher Rosbercon and Rower Inistioge completed the semi-final pairings with victories over Fenians and Glenmore. Fireworks ensued in both semi finals as they were tight affairs until the later stages but in the end the two fancied sides came through in the shape of Dunamaggin and John Lockes.

In the final both teams gave it their all with a noticeable nervousness in the early exchanges and a title at stake between two

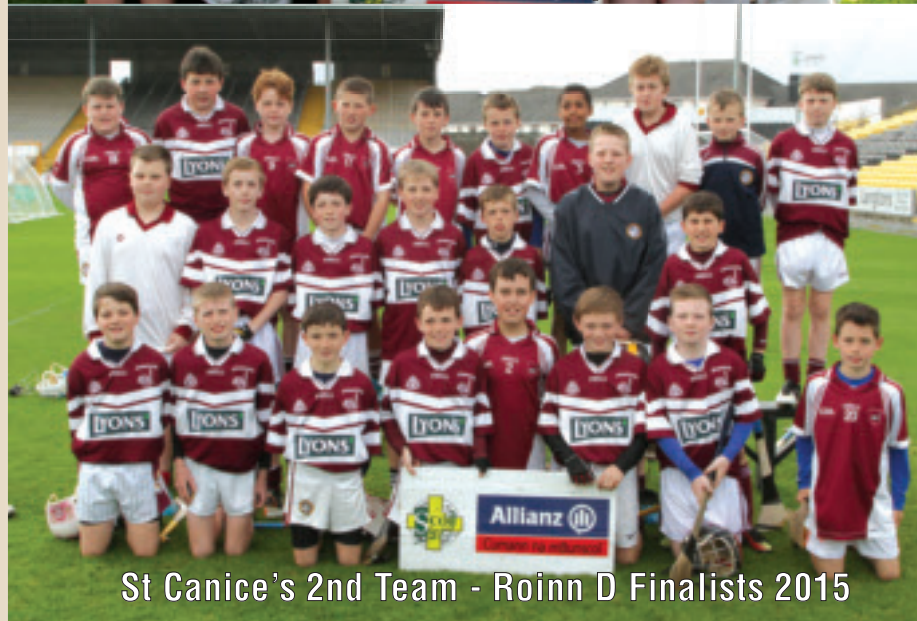

SEAN TYRRELL R.I.P.

Sean Tyrrell, President CLG Sheamuis Stiopháin

The GAA community in Kilkenny was particularly saddened to hear of the passing of Sean Tyrrell on 15 January 2015. Aged 83, Sean had lived a full life, a great family man, a great community man and a great GAA man. He was predeceased by his wife May, from whose loss two years previously, he had never recovered. Sean and May reared a family of twelve children, nine boys and three girls, many of whom have gone on to make major contributions to Gaelic life.

At his graveside, Liam Tyrrell, Vice President of James Stephens GAA club paid a glowing tribute to Sean's huge influence on his beloved club James Stephens and Kilkenny County Board.

Sean was born in Barrack St. in 1931 and attended The Lake School and St. John's De La Salle. His first hurling title was the schools u14 championship in 1943. Having finished school, he worked for a time in the Kilkenny Journal newspaper and in Green Vale Woollen Mills on the Bleach Road, both long gone. In 1950 he was approached by his cousin Mick 'Weeks' Tyrrell to take up an apprenticeship as a painter/decorator. Around that time St. John's club folded and he joined the Village, who were also in the doldrums. Mick Tyrrell, father of current club Vice President Liam, was an All Ireland senior (1935) and minor (1931) medal winner and was an outstanding club hurler.

Sean played with the club throughout the decade until his retirement in 1959. In the days when full back lines were the preserves of hardy men, Sean was a powerful corner back and team captain when James Stephens won the county junior title in 1955. He went on to captain Kilkenny to the All Ireland junior title in 1956, leading a team that included later All Ireland senior winners Jim Link Walsh, Tom Walsh and Denis Heaslip. The final was played in New Eltham, London, with Kilkenny defeating London by 5-2 to 2-8. The journey and brief experience in the world's largest city at the time was a truly

remarkable one for a group of young men who had never been outside their own province!

Following his retirement from playing, he became involved on the club committee as an officer and team selector. Along with Bill Cody and Sean Georgie Leahy, Sean was a major influence in guiding the resurgence of the Village in the late 1960s and '70s. He was a senior selector throughout the glorious decade of the 1970s when James Stephens won three Kilkenny senior titles and were first Leinster club team to be crowned All Ireland club hurling champions in 1976. He was a Kilkenny senior hurling selector in 1970/71.

Sean served as County Board and Northern Board delegate from 1971 to 1980 and 1986 to 2008, promoting and defending the cause of James Stephens with common-sense, fairness and integrity, hallmarks of the man. But Sean contributed far more than that. His interest was in helping the Board promote hurling at every level. Sean did not seek officerships but acted as a sounding board and support to a host of outstanding GAA officials, Mick O'Neill, Paddy Grace, Ted Carroll, Tommy Murphy and, in particular Ned Quinn. His house opposite Nowlan Park was the scene for many animated discussions on the development of Kilkenny GAA. Sean served on a host of county board committees and was highly respected for his sound advice and support.

He was universal choice succeeded Bill Cody as President of James Stephens in 2002, a mark of the esteem in which he was held by the membership and an honour of which he was immensely proud.

He was a warm and sunny personality with a great sense of humour. Sean possessed a great turn of phrase and had a terrific memory, which qualities made him a wonderful raconteur.

Sean's family continues to have an extraordinary involvement in the GAA with

several members of his family working actively in each of the three city clubs and grandchildren playing with all three clubs. His final guard of honour, one of the largest seen in Kilkenny for many years, comprised members of James Stephens, O'Loughlins, Dicksboro and the County Board as the GAA community paid well merited tribute to a man of honour, passion and great integrity.

Rome J Hartman Producer, '60 Minutes Sports'



As a producer at 60 Minutes Sports, a key part of my job is to find out as much as I can about whatever subject we're preparing a segment on. Usually I'm starting from a pretty solid base of knowledge. After all, I'm a life-long sports fan, and I've produced dozens of stories somehow connected to sports. For example, we're currently working on a profile of a top golfer. I know golf. I've played it for years. I'm surrounded by people who love the game, and my brother-in-law is a golf writer who has a wealth of knowledge he's willing to share.

information. Hurling is a game played mostly in Ireland, where its roots are deep and broad. It has been called both the oldest field game on earth and the fastest game on earth. Fifteen men to a side, a hurley and a sliotar, three points in the goal and one point over. A single Google search gave me the basics, and led me to more than a few eye-opening YouTube videos.

Then the REAL work started. 60 Minutes Sports is not the kind of place where you can do a few internet searches and declare yourself an expert. I began a research project that lasted months, beginning with scores of phone calls, Skype conversations and e-mail exchanges. Those were followed by a research trip to Ireland in June, and the project culminated in a 'shooting' trip with camera crews in early September. During that September shoot, we filmed interviews with Irish President Michael D. Higgins, journalist Damian Lawlor, and former players Henry Shefflin and Donal Og Cusack. We visited St. Kierans College in Kilkenny, attended the All Ireland Hurling Final in Croke Park, and then followed the Liam MacCarthy cup through the streets of Kilkenny and into Ballyhale.

But when correspondent Jack Ford came to me in the spring of 2015 and said "Let's do a story about hurling," the only response I could muster up was "what's hurling?" That conversation has been repeated many times in the months since. "What are you working on, Rome?" "I'm doing a story about hurling." "Hurling? Is that the game where they slide a smooth stone down a lane of ice?" "No, that's curling." "OK, so what's hurling?"

These days, of course, you're only a few keystrokes away from the answer to any question, so it didn't take me long to get the basic

Two of my first conversations in the early stages of research set the stage for and shaped the final story in important ways. I contacted journalist Damian Lawlor, then read his Book Fields of Fire, which tells (as its subtitle puts it) "the inside story of hurling's great renaissance." It documents Kilkenny's 21st century hurling dynasty, as well as attempts by other Irish counties to challenge that domi-

nance. I also reached out to Seamus Reade, the public relations officer for Kilkenny's county GAA organization. Both Seamus and Damian displayed a generosity of time and spirit that set the tone for nearly everyone I encountered along the way in Ireland, whether on the phone or in person. People simply put aside what they were doing to share their expertise and help make our story as good as it could be. This was true at the Kilkenny GAA, at Croke Park, at RTE Sport...everywhere and everyone. During my research trip, Henry Shefflin gave up his lunch hour while working at the Bank of Ireland to sit down and meet with me, then met me again on Saturday morning at his home pitch in Ballyhale. When I visited Cork, Donal Og Cusack picked me up after his workday at Johnson & Johnson ended, and drove me to his home village of Cloyne to give me an in-person illustration of the role the local

GAA plays in that community. When I went to St. Kieran's College in Kilkenny, Adrian Finan devoted most of a day to 'educating' me about the school and the game.

Near the end of that same research trip, I was finally able to attend my first-ever hurling match at Nowlan Park on June 21. Kilkenny vs. Wexford. Seamus arranged for Barrie Henriques to meet me in the press box, sit next to me during the game, and 'interpret' for my un-trained eyes the fast-paced action I was seeing on the field. Needless to say (but I will), seeing a match in person far surpasses any YouTube video, and having someone with Barrie's expertise to guide me through the match was the best learning experience I could have asked for. Barrie told me lots of stories that day as well...some of them may even have been true.

The Irish people have a very special sport in hurling. The men who play it at the highest level display skill, stamina and courage on the pitch that puts athletes in most other sports to shame. Off the pitch, they display humility, grace, and a 'grounded-ness' that is very rare in modern sport. They are connected to their communities, and committed to their clubs, in a way that is refreshing for any true American sports fan.

I'm not sure the sport will ever really be 'exported' much beyond Ireland and Irishmen. But it deserves to be. I'm not sure that a grassroots organization like the GAA can or will ever be replicated elsewhere. But the world would be a better place if it could. And for a journalist trying to learn as much about the sport as he could as quickly as he could, the phrase "you're very welcome" was, well, very welcome.

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20th All-Ireland Secured for Kierans

St. Kierans College defended the All-Ireland Colleges title for the 5th time in their history as they secured their 20th All-Ireland title defeating Thurles CBS in a thrilling final on the Easter weekend in Semple Stadium, Thurles. Having defeat Borris Vocational School to win the Leinster League Final just before Christmas last year, attention turned to the championship once the new year beckoned, and Kierans began the campaign against their city rivals Kilkenny CBS in a repeat of last years Leinster and All-Ireland Finals.

Kierans prevailed 1-14 to 2-3, but it was all square at the interval 0-6 to 1-3.

Victory over their city rivals set-up a Provincial Semi-Final clash with Good Counsel of New Ross, and it was much more straightforward for Kierans from the word go.

Having led 0-8 to 0-0 after 15 minutes, and 0-14 to 0-2 at half-time, Kierans ran out resounding 1-18 to 0-5 winners with Tadhg O'Dwyer scoring a superb individual solo goal early in the second-half.

St. Peter College of Wexford provided the opposition in the Leinster Final, and despite Kierans shooting several wides, they

eventually won 1-14 to 1-6.

In a low scoring first-half, Kierans led 0-5 to 0-4, but they were setback early in the second-half when John Lee Meyler grabbed a St. Peters goal.

However, Kierans responded and they added three points in quick succession to regain the lead, before establishing control with a 34th minute goal from Richie Leahy. 1-8 to 1-4.

There was no way back for the Wexford school afterwards, and Kierans were in control afterwards as they claimed their 53rd Leinster Colleges Title.

Next up was an All-Ireland Quarter-Final clash on St. Patricks weekend against St. Francis College Rochestown of Cork with Kierans prevailing 2-11 to 0-10.

Kierans trailed 0-5 to 0-2 after 17 minutes, but by half-time, they had turned it around and a Tadhg O'Dwyer goal in the 28th minute gave them a 1-5 to 0-5 lead at the interval.

The All-Ireland Champions stretched the advantage to five points by the midway point of the second-half, but the Harty Cup Finalists fought back to trail by just two points with 5 minutes remaining.

However, Kierans dug deep and Jason Byrne pointed from a superbly executed sideline cut, before substitute Niall Walsh ensured their semi-final place when slamming home having been set up by Billy Ryan.

A week later, Kierans played Presentation Athenry, and after a long struggle, they qualified for another All-Ireland Final winning 0-19 to 0-17.

In a superb contest, the sides were level at 0-9 each at the interval, and with Evan Niland performing superbly for the Athenry school, the sides remained level until the 55th minute. 0-15 each.

Joe Connolly and Richie Leahy pointed as Kierans grabbed the game by the scruff of the neck, but Athenry to their fought back and they drew level with points from a Niland free and Brian Burke as the match appeared to be heading for extra-time.

Kierans though displayed the grittiest of determination and they grinded out victory when late points from Sean Morrissey and Connolly sealed the deal to set-up an All-Ireland Final showdown with Harty Cup Champions Thurles CBS on Easter weekend.

The stern test that Kierans received in their semi-final clash stood to them, and it also proved that they could win when their backs were against the wall.

Kierans made a bright start, and they built up a 0-4 to 0-1 lead after 10 minutes with points from Billy Ryan, Ray Lahart(free), Liam Blanchfield and Sean Morrissey.

Thurles CBS responded and a Michael Connors goal drew them level before edging ahead from a Niall Heffernan free. 1-2 to 0-4.

Kierans replied, and a Ray Lahart goal in the 17th minute regained the lead. 1-4 to 1-2.

Buoyed on by that goal, Kierans stretched the lead to five points 1-9 to 1-4 with points been added from Billy Ryan(2), Lahart(Free) and

Tadhg O'Dwyer, before Thurles CBS narrowed the gap by the interval. 1-10 to 1-7.

Scoring weren't as frequent throughout the second-half as Kierans continue to keep the Tipp school at bay.

Jack Skehan and Niall Heffernan pointed early after the restart to leave the minimum between the sides, before Kierans replied and exerted control with points from Richie Leahy, Niall Lahart(2) and Jason Byrne to restore their 5 point lead entering the closing quarter. 1-14 to 1-9.

Thurles CBS tried manfully, but Kierans still led by 4 points as injury-time beckoned. 1-15 to 1-11.

Robbie Long pointed to narrow the deficit to three points, and that ensured a tense last few seconds.

The Tipp school were awarded a free inside the Kierans half well into injury-time.

However, the Kierans defence held firm with Tommy Walsh, Jack Keogh and Jason Cleere leading the way as they recorded their 20th All-Ireland Colleges title.

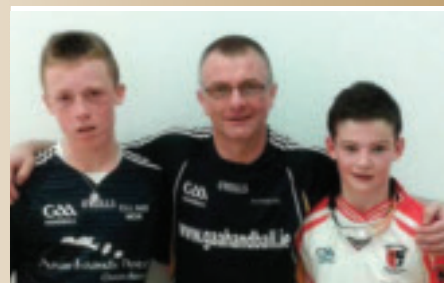

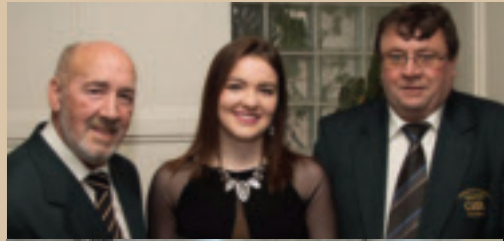

The Great Matty Power

of Dicksboro, Garda, Kilkenny, Dublin, Leinster and Ireland fame.

Matty Power may be dead for 50 years, but he is still considered to be one of the all-time greats of hurling. He won 5 All-Ireland SHC, 4 with Kilkenny in 1922, 1932, 1933 and 1935, and 1 with Dublin in 1927. He lost an All-Ireland SHC final with Dublin in 1930 and 3 with Kilkenny in 1931, 1936 and 1937. He won 12 Leinster SHC medals- 9 with Kilkenny in 1922, 1923, 1925, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1935, 1936 and 1937 and 3 with Dublin in 1927, 1928 and 1930. Matty played with Leinster from the inception of the Railway Cup competition in 1927 to 1936 inclusive and was on the winning side in 1927, 1932, 1933 and 1936. He also played for Ireland in the Tailteann games of 1928 and 1932, winning both matches. He won a NHL medal with Dublin in 1929 and another with Kilkenny in 1933. Together with another former Kilkenny CBS stalwart, Eddie Byrne, they created an all-time record by playing in 6 All-Ireland hurling finals in 4 years, 1930 with Dublin, 1931 in the 3 game saga for Kilkenny against Cork, and again with Kilkenny in 1932 and 1933.

Matty(or Mattie as he preferred to spell his name) was born at the turn of the Twentieth Century in Graiguenamanagh. At a very early age he moved with his family to live in St. Rioch's Street, Kilkenny. He played his first hurling with Kilkenny CBS. The late Christian

Brother P.P. O'Farrell discovered Matty's ability as a hurler and one of his most treasured possessions was a hurley that Matty tused.

Matty was a star of the Dicksboro team, which won the Kilkenny senior hurling final in 1923. On moving to Dublin in 1925, he won 6 SH county medals with the Garda club, 1925, 1926, 1927, 1928, 1929 and 1931. As a member of the Garda Siochana, Matty was tied to playing with the Garda club until the end of his career. In 1931, he availed of the non-resident rule, and declared for his native county. He played with Kilkenny for the rest of his hurling



career, until 1937, when he played his last inter-county game in the All-Ireland final of that year.

Matty scored 34-28 in 41 championship games for Kilkenny. He also played 13 championship matches for Dublin. He made his reputation as a corner-forward, one of the greats in that position. He had an innate penchant for scoring goals. Just 2 examples will suffice; for their opening tie in the Leinster championship of 1935, thanks to 3 second half goals by Matty, Kilkenny beat Offaly by 7-7 to 2-6. In the 1931 Dublin county SH final, when Garda beat Faughs, Matty scored 3-2 in the second half to give his team their 6th Dublin senior championship. He also made many scores for colleagues. His key attributes were speed, quick thinking and a great sense of position. For almost 17 years his name dominated hurling in Kilkenny, Dublin, Leinster and Ireland. He was beloved by his contemporaries for his gentleness, kindness, humility and sportsmanship. His memory is perpetuated in the Matty Power Cup which is presented to the winners of the senior hurling league finals in Kilkenny.

DREAMS POSTPONED ONE YEAR

Kilkenny Senior Team Leinster Champions 2015

INTER-COUNTY SCENE

Senior

The Kilkenny senior teams dream of claiming back the O'Duffy cup for the first time since 1994 will go into another year as Cork dashed their All Ireland title bid when they defeated them in All Ireland semi-final in Walsh park in Waterford in August.

Kilkenny began the year under the stewardship of new manager Fintan Deegan with an away trip to the aforementioned Cork in the opening round of the league. In a close tough encounter in the Mardyke Sports Grounds in Cork it was the home team that claimed the points on a 0-09 points to 0-05 score line, a game that could be classed as one that got away from the Cats. In the second round, Kilkenny entertained Derry in Canon Kearns Park, in Castlecomer. Kilkenny made no mistake in easily defeating the Mourne side 4-17 to 0-09 points to get their campaign back on track with a bang. In the third round Kilkenny entertained a high-flying Dublin side in Danesfort. In a tough encounter Kilkenny came out on top by 1-12 to 1-05. In their final game Kilkenny travelled to Clonlara in Clare to take on the home side. In a one-sided contest Kilkenny emerged easy 4-15 to 0-10 point winners. This victory set up a league semi-final against 2013 All Ireland Champions Galway in Tullamore. In the semi-final Kilkenny came up against a goal-hungry Galway side and came up short 5-07 to 2-09.

With Galway ending Kilkenny's league campaign, their attention had to be focused on the Leinster championship that began in May. Kilkenny began the campaign with a trip to Newbridge to take on Kildare, managed by Kilkenny's Stephen Dormer, in the Leinster semi-final. Kilkenny emerged winners 3-18 to 1-18, but the game was tougher than the score line reflects as Kildare led after forty five minutes. This victory over the Lilywhites set up a Leinster Final berth against Offaly in Nowlan Park. In a tough close-fought encounter it was Kilkenny who emerged victorious on a 2-11 to 1-09 score line to claim back the Leinster crown for the first time since 2013. This victory set Kilkenny up nicely for the All Ireland Championship campaign that began in June.

Kilkenny began their All Ireland championship campaign with an away trip to Parnell Park to take on Dublin. Kilkenny began the game brightly and easily accounted for the Dubs 3-13 to 1-10. In the second round Kilkenny entertained Clare and ran out easy 2-22 to 0-06 point winners. In the third round Kilkenny made the long trek to Swatragh in Derry. The home side went toe to toe with the Cats but then Kilkenny let loose and ran out easy winners by 8-22 to 2-10. In their final game Kilkenny entertained Tipperary in Freshford where a win would secure an All Ireland semi-final spot. Kilkenny continued their

goal-hungry run and ran out easy victors 8-15 to 0-04.

In the semi-final Kilkenny faced Cork in Walsh Park in Waterford. Kilkenny made a great start to the game and led by 1-04 to 0-02 points after twelve minutes. Cork stormed back into the game and led 1-07 to 1-06 at half time. In the second half Cork hit a devastating spell and scored three goals that killed off Kilkenny and ran out 4-10 to 1-10 victors ending Kilkenny's interest in the championship for 2015.

Intermediate

The Intermediate side must wait another year for their chance to get back to the All Ireland Final as they failed to qualify for the later stages of the All Ireland championship but only just, as a strong finish by Waterford in their final group game ended their All Ireland Championship bid.

They began their league campaign with a home game against Meath in Thomastown. The Kilkenny side made no mistake and defeated the Royals on a 1-07 to 0-03 point score line. In their second group game they travelled to The Ragg to take on Tipperary. In a one-sided contest Kilkenny emerged victorious 3-14 to 0-04. In their third match they entertained the previous year's Junior All Ireland Champion, Down in Danesfort. In an impressive display Kilkenny emerged victorious by 3-10 to 0-10. In the fourth round of the league Kilkenny travelled

to Carrigrohore to take on a highly fancied Waterford side. Kilkenny came up short as the home side emerged victorious 2-13 to 1-06. To qualify for the later stages of the league they needed to record a win in their final group game against Cork in Mooncoin. Trailing by a point deep in to injury time, it looked like the Rebelettes would claim the victory but a Therese Muldowney goal with the last puck of the game secured a 1-12 to 0-13 victory. This win secured a semi-final spot against Laois.

In the semi-final Laois edged out Kilkenny in extra time with Laois minor Aoife Burke getting in for a goal in the dying moments to record a 1-10 to 0-09 victory. This ended Kilkenny's league title hopes for the second year in succession. Kilkenny then had to turn their attention to the Leinster championship campaign.

In the Preliminary Round of the Leinster Championship Kilkenny travelled to Artane to take on Dublin. Boosted by the addition of players from the victorious All Ireland winning side, a goal-hungry Kilkenny dismantled Dublin 6-09 to 0-13. In the semi-final Kilkenny entertained Wexford in Thomastown. Trailing going in to the final moments a late point by Emma Comerford secured the draw with a late point on the stroke of full time and a replay was needed. In the replay played in New Ross, Kilkenny made no mistake and ran out easy 4-08 to 2-07 victors to set up a final showdown with Meath.

The final was a tough tense battle with the royals pushing Kilkenny

to their limits but Kilkenny held firm and recorded a 1-13 to 1-09 victory to claim the Leinster crown. This set Kilkenny up nicely ahead of their All Ireland campaign.

In the opening game of the All Ireland series Kilkenny played a very strong Kildare side in Thomastown. Kildare proved too strong for the hosts and ran out 3-07 to 1-06 victors. In their second game they travelled to Ahoghill in Antrim and made no mistake as they ran out 2-15 to 1-09 winners. A victory over Waterford in their final game would secure a semi-final spot. In a tough game in Walsh Park, goals were the key as Waterford ran out 3-05 to 0-12 point winners in a game that got away from Kilkenny. This loss ended Kilkenny's All Ireland bid. The future is bright for the side and they will be the ones to watch in 2016.

Minor

Having been very unlucky in 2014, the Kilkenny minor side were determined to redeem themselves in 2015, and that is what they did, finishing the year as Leinster and All Ireland champions.

They began the year with the All Ireland series in February. In their first game they entertained Clare in Thomastown. A goal-hungry Kilkenny side showed no mercy and ran out 4-08 to 0-06 victors. In their second group game Kilkenny met Wexford in Thomastown. In a determined display Kilkenny ran out 1-13 to 1-07 victors. In their third match Kilkenny travelled to The Ragg to take on Tipperary. Kilkenny put in a strong performance and ran out 2-05 to 1-06 winners. In their final game they entertained Cork in Thomastown, where a victory would definitely secure a semi-final spot. Kilkenny made no mistake and ran out 5-11 to 2-08 victors. In the semi-final Kilkenny took on Limerick in Birr. Kilkenny made no mistake and recorded a 3-11 to 0-06 victory to set up a final berth against Tipperary. In classic rip-roaring final in Birr, goals were the difference as Kilkenny ran out 3-09 to 1-12 winners to claim the title.

The side had a long wait for the Leinster championship that didn't begin till July. In their opening game Kilkenny travelled to New Ross to take on Wexford. In a tough contest Kilkenny emerged victorious on 2-10 to 0-12 point score line. In their second game Kilkenny travelled to Birr to take on Offaly. Offaly put in an impressive second half display and ran out 2-18 to 2-11 winners to end Kilkenny's unbeaten run. In their third game Kilkenny entertained Dublin and bounced back brilliantly by recording a convincing 7-14 to 0-11 point victory. This victory ensured Kilkenny qualified for the final in September where they took on Offaly in Rathdowney. Kilkenny made sure lightning didn't strike twice and put in a determined display and ran out 3-06 to 1-05 victors to claim the Leinster title.

This was a terrific year for the side. Having suffered the heartache of some narrow losses in both championships last season, to bounce back this year by claiming both the All Ireland and Leinster crown, just shows the character within the squad and great credit must go to the players but also the management team of Mike Wall and Ger Walsh.

The greatest day in Piltown Camogie Club arrived on a wintry and blustery day in Croke Park on Sunday March 1st, as they held off a strong finish from defending All-Ireland Champions Lismore to win by a solitary point in the All-Ireland Intermediate Club Final. Piltown were driven on by the hurt of almost 18 months previously, when they lost out by a solitary point to Ballyhale Shamrocks in the County Intermediate decider after extra-time in October 2013, with the Shamrocks girls going all the way to the All-Ireland decider before losing to Lismore after a replay.

However, Piltown responded and with a young squad that enjoyed under-age success from Under-12 right through to Minor, it was inevitable that their day would come

Those young girls who all enjoyed success at underage level formed the backbone of their squad with twice Inter-County Senior All-Star Katie Power and Republic of Ireland Soccer International Karen Duggan leading the experience.

The South Kilkenny girls turned their attention to the Leinster Championship, and having safely negotiated Birr 1-11 to 0-4 in their opening game, they were given a far sterner test of their credentials by the twice previous All-Ireland Junior Club Champions, Myshall of Carlow.

In a tough close dogged encounter, Katie Power was the supreme difference as Piltown emerged victorious 1-12 to 1-9 to set up a Leinster Final showdown with Camross of Laois.

A seven goal thriller emerged as Piltown edged out their Laois opponents 3-10 to 4-5 to secure a first provincial title.

Clane was once again the venue for their semi-final showdown, and Piltown eventually emerged victorious 3-5 to 0-6 but not after an almighty struggle.

Piltown marched onto Croke Park and the biggest day in their history to face an experienced Lismore outfit who were the defending All-Ireland Champions having defeated Ballyhale Shamrocks last year

The Piltown girls ran out onto the Croke Park surface to be greeted by conditions more suited to Siberia as snow descended upon GAA headquarters.

Regardless of conditions, Piltown were not going to be distracted from the ultimate goal and the ultimate prize.

Having trailed to an early Aoife Hannon free, Piltown replied with



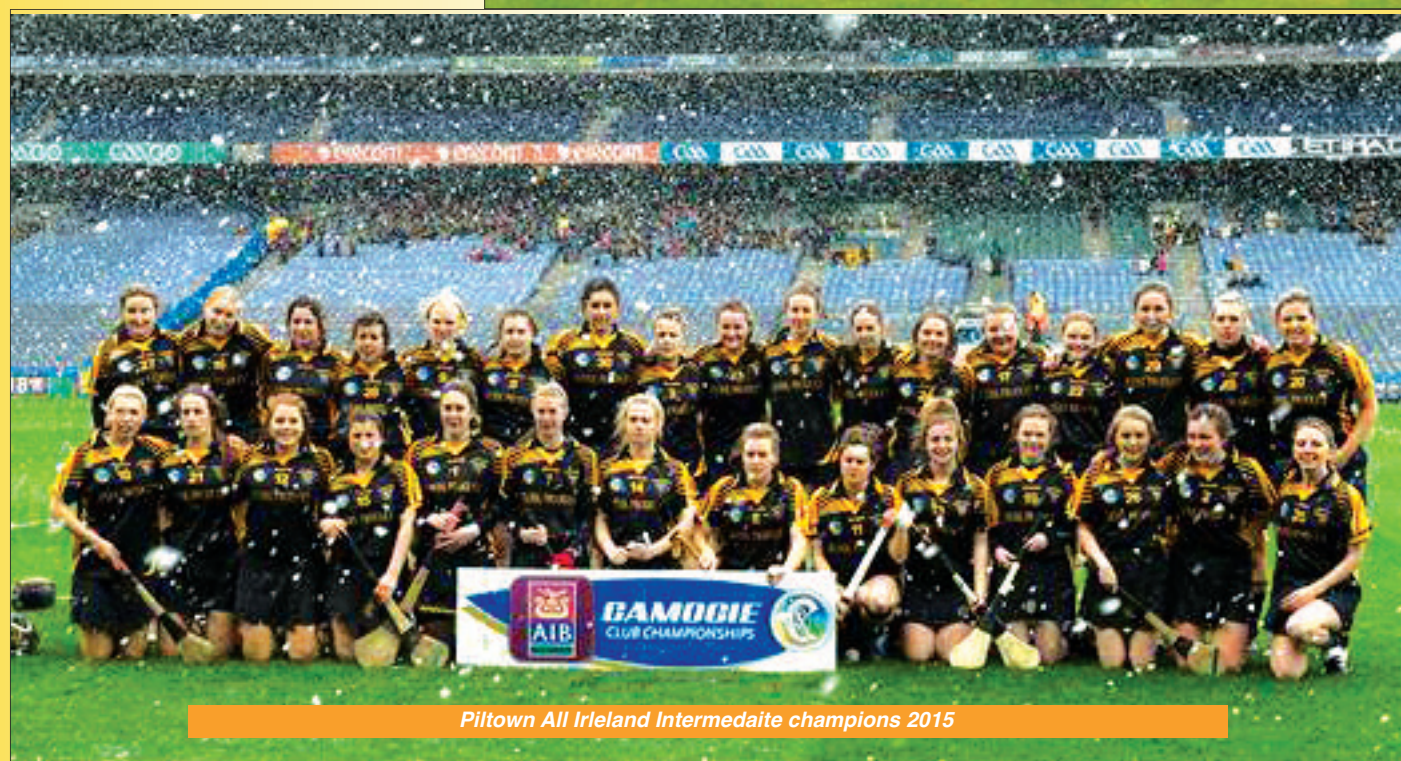

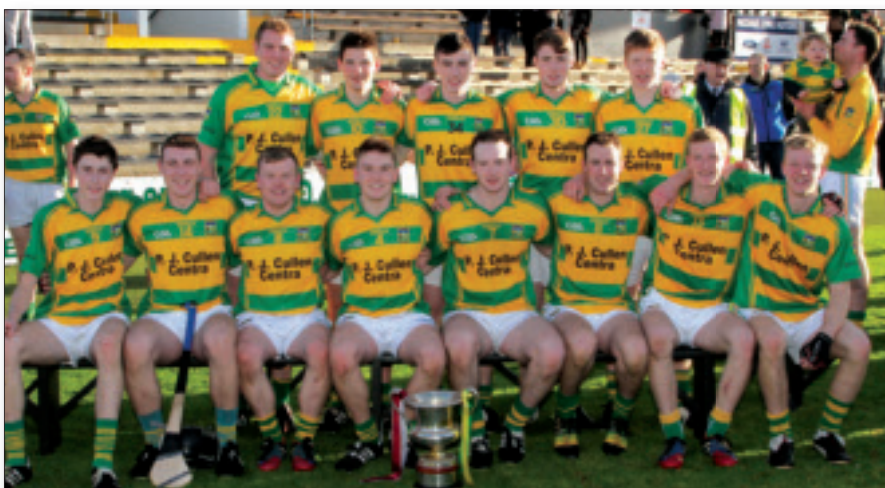

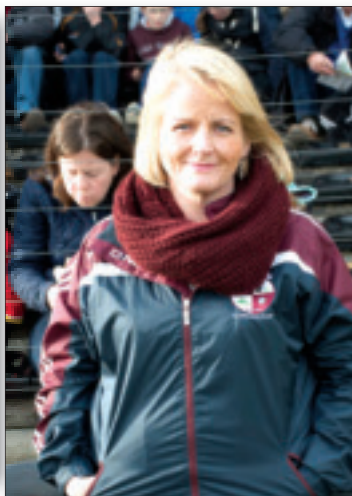

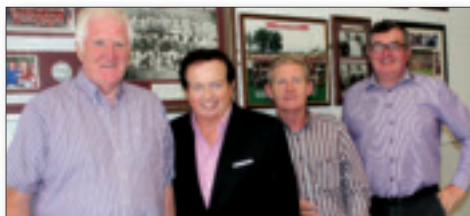

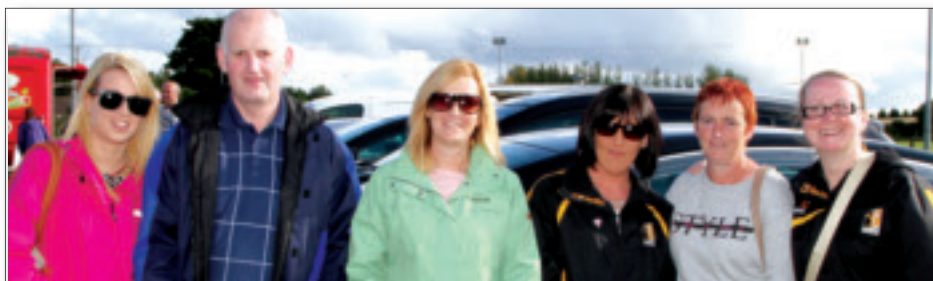

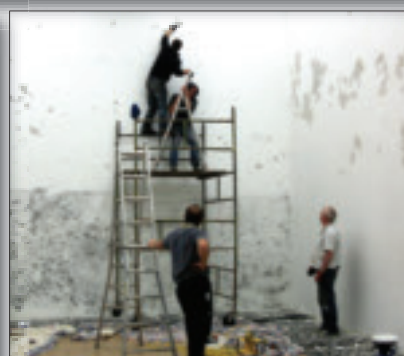

Obituaries



Johnny Ryan

The word legend is all too casually used. But Johnny Ryan truly was a legend in every sense of the word. He was an incredible family man, a man who was immensely proud of his family, club and parish, a man who worked hard on the farm and in the community for the betterment of everyone. Johnny never sought the limelight, never looked for reward.

Indeed such was his influence that senior hurling side captain Keith Hogan said Johnny Ryan was their 16th man on the field as he lifted the county cup high just weeks ago at Nowlan Park. His sons Lester, Liam and Tom hurled out of their skins in that very county final and it was clear from their post match emotion as they hugged their mother, Lilly, that they too wanted to do Johnny and the parish proud on such an incredibly happy yet sad day.

Everyone who knew Johnny Ryan and indeed the many more who never met him but knew of the impact he had on others were utterly stunned by his death in a freak farm accident at the start of the year.

The GAA was at the core of Johnny's DNA. His father Liam was a founding member of Clara GAA club and it was Johnny who started juvenile training for young players on Saturday mornings. He was an outstanding hurler with Clara and, along with his brothers Harry, Lester, and Kevin, was a member of Clara's Senior Championship winning team of 1986.

He captained Kilkenny to win the All Ireland Masters title in 1995 and was also a member of the winning teams in 1997, 1998 and 1999. He was also a winner off the pitch and the only time anyone didn't like to see Johnny and the rest of the Ryans arrive en masse was at a table quiz. They were quiz masters and won on virtually every occasion.

Johnny wanted to play the game at any level. If the Junior or Junior B team needed a player, Johnny, even in his 40s, was willing to tog out. If the club needed a steward, a linesman or umpire, someone to help in development works or fundraisers, Johnny was always willing help out for the love of the game and the club/county.

Johnny and Lilly were overjoyed when Lester, Liam and Tom togged out with the Clara side which were crowned County Champions yet again in 2013. The entire Ryan family, club

members and the entire parish and county were again celebrating in September 2014 when Lester captained the Kilkenny Senior Hurling team to victory in the All Ireland Final. Everyone in the parish stood together and ten foot tall when Lester brought the Liam McCarthy cup home to Clara the night after the homecoming celebrations.

Club officials had a job convincing Johnny that same night that it wouldn't be appropriate for him to steward in a car park as they awaited the victorious Kilkenny team – such was his humble nature and his eagerness to play his part.

Who would have thought that just days into 2015 that all of our elation would turn to unimaginable shock and utter devastation when Johnny was taken from us in a farm accident.

Johnny will be fondly remembered as a true and giving gentleman and a committed hurler. He left everything on the pitch. He was passionate about family, club and community and exceptionally highly regarded among his farming colleagues throughout Kilkenny IFA and further afield.

All of the big names in the GAA and the IFA descended on the Ryan home in the hours and days after his untimely death. And a parish, a county and the entire GAA community stood together with Johnny's IFA colleagues in stunned silence for his funeral. Johnny Ryan was and will always be an irreplaceable part of Clara and of Kilkenny.

And as Clara march on this year with hopes of being in Croke Park on March 17, we know that Johnny and other great Clara men and women will be watching down on us from heaven, wishing they were with us in the stands and on the sideline. Johnny Ryan will always be in our hearts and they will never, ever be forgotten.

On the 27th of May 2015, the parish of Tullaroan were saddened to learn of the death of Bill Hennessy (Snr). Only a short few months later, on the 5th of October, the parish was saddened once again to hear that Joe Hennessy, Bill's twin brother had also passed away. Joe, formally of Tullaroan lived with his wife and family on the Dunmore Rd. Kilkenny for many years and he was a true Tullaroan man at heart. On the 14th of July 1936, twins Bill and Joe were born into a family of 13 children. Bill and

Joe had a love for hurling all their lives. They first learned the skill of hurling in Tullaroan national school. The five Hennessy brothers played alongside each other for many years and one of the highlights for them was winning the County final with Tullaroan in 1958. It was probably a rare and unique occasion where five brothers lined out together that day.

The twins were very talented carpenters, starting their apprenticeships at the age of fourteen with Dick Brennan of Graine. In later years they worked together on the Lory Meagher heritage project (Bród Tullaroan) which once housed the Kilkenny G.A.A. Museum.

Both Bill and Joe had great interest in the Tullaroan hurling club. They followed all the hurling from underage matches, all the way up to the senior ranks. Bill enjoyed nothing more than watching his grandchildren play both hurling and camogie for Tullaroan. Bill (Jnr) son of Bill had the honour of captaining Kilkenny when they won the National League in 1995. He became the first Tullaroan man since Lory Meagher in 1935, to lead Kilkenny to a National senior title.

Both Bill and Joe will be sadly missed by a wide circle of family, friends and all who knew them. Bill is survived by his children Breda, Tom, Majella, Cindy, Bill, and Paul, son in laws, daughter and in laws, and grandchildren.

Joe is survived by his wife Alice, children Pauline, Marie Ned and Sue, son in law, daughter in law, his grandchildren and great grandchild.

1942 – 2014**

Bill was a retired C.A.O. of Teagasc, Kilkenny, and given his expertise in this area, he helped many G.A.A. clubs and other organisations with field developments etc.

Such was Bill's contribution to Piltown GAA that the inaugural Bill Costello Hurling School of Excellence Summer Camp took place last August and was so well received by the children and parents of the club and parish that it will now be an annual fixture in the club's calendar of activities.

Bill was a true gentleman, loving husband, devoted father and grandfather. He is sadly missed by his family and friends together with the local & wider G.A.A. family as well the broader agricultural community.

Paddy Ryan

The Good Lord blew the full-time whistle on the life and times of Paddy Ryan, Green Street in Callan on Wednesday 22 July. He had passed into his 96th year. The many facets of his life during its transitional stages from boyhood in Clonoulty in Tipperary to his final abode in Callan were memorable, different, rewarding. His youth was fired with a Republican ethos; his life's journey never deviated from that ethos. His morals and ethics were dictated by his unabridged belief in his Catholic upbringing, his political affiliations, and Cumann Lúthchleas Gael. To the best of my knowledge he was never compromised on any of those three ideals.

Around the middle of the '60s, when his sons, Tom, and EJ, were starting to come on stream with hurling in Callan CBS, Paddy Ryan immersed himself in the GAA World. It was not always easy for a Tipp man in volatile Callan, but through pure cussedness, and an iron will Paddy Ryan devoted much of his time to the

John Lockes Club, together with Harry Bryan, John Roughan, Ben McCormack, Richie Condon (Snr), Br. Shreenan and others. That band of solid men was stoically interested in the promotion of our games among a burgeoning Callan youth. Many youngsters in the town responded with great interest and determination to improve. Paddy was a selector, later graduating to the adult John Lockes scene, where he acted again as a selector. In the '70s with the progress of the club, Paddy became Treasurer of the John Lockes, a position he vacated many years later when he felt that his son, EJ might be "up to the job". The 70s was a time which witnessed a major transformation in the life of the John Lockes Club. They needed a new home, someplace that they could call their own exclusive base. The idea fermented in the minds of people like Paddy Ryan, Paddy Meagher, John Roughan, Jack Lyons, Fr. Liam Dunne, and the list expanded as those men hatched a plan that eventually saw President of the GAA, Mr. Con Murphy open John Locke Park in 1978. Paddy Ryan was one of the proudest men in the entire Universe the evening when Kilkenny played Tipperary on the evening Con Murphy was thrilled to open what has become the hallowed centre of GAA life in Callan. Paddy did enormous work during the development of the John Locke Park—nobody did more. He was Treasurer for a very long time, eventually ending up as President of the club he built. Paddy Ryan gave his life to the John Lockes Club. No man could possibly have given more. The present newly developed John Locke Park is a legacy to the great work done initially by people like Paddy Ryan, and those mentioned. Our sympathies are extended to his wife Kitty, his only daughter, Nora Keogh, his sons Tom, EJ, Gerard, Dermot, his daughters-in-law, son-in-law, his fifteen grandchildren, his only living sister, Bidna, and extended family.

James (Seamus) Skehan

James (Seamus) Skehan of Ballinacurragh, Kilmacow, Co. Kilkenny

It is with great sadness that the club acknowledges the passing in September 2015 of Seamus Skehan. Seamus loved both Kilmacow GAA, Kilkenny GAA, and the wider GAA family but was a true sports fan. Seamus was born in 1957. He played underage

hurling and football for St Senan's and adult football with St Patrick's from the mid-1970s until the late 1990s.

He attended St Patricks NS Strangemills and after trying Slieveue VS for a few weeks, parted ways and he went on to become a boarder in the Salesian College in Ballinakill Co Laois. He spent 6 years there and completed his Leaving Cert, which included Latin. He very much enjoyed his school days, and was very strong on Irish history. The brothers up in Laois may have had one eye on the priesthood as a career for Seamus, but thankfully for us in Kilmacow that didn't work out for them. Seamus was a huge supporter and admirer of Michael Collins, and would never be afraid to make his views on Irish history and politics know. He was a supporter of many many charities, and if he had any one failing it was that he couldn't say no to someone asking for support. But that was the man.

He began his working life by laboring with local farmers and in the Royal Oak in Rathkieran before taking employment in the Water Maintenance Section of Waterford Corporation, which he joined in 1979 and remained until 2001. It was around this time that his underlying illness first became obvious. He loved Manchester United and Crew Alexander F.C. and Kerry football. He loved all sports and loved an odd bet on the horses.

He was a founder member of St Patricks and administrated in that club for many years. He was also a player and administrator with the newly formed Kilmacow H&F club and managed the minor and U21 teams within the new club. He was a gentle giant but would support and defend Kilkenny and Kilmacow to the last. One of our favorite stories was when he the late Hugué Smith (RIP) were discussing in the late 80s about who held the most All Ireland medals, and Seamus handed Hugué his coat in the Sean Ti and proposed that they both walk to Cloyne to count Ring's 8 medals and then to Holycross to count John Doyle's 8 medals and that after that, they would walk to Bennettsbridge to count Noels Skehan's 9 medals.

St Patricks finest hour came in 1987 and it was fitting that Seamus captained that championship winning team. His speech before that match has gone down in folklore, and it was without doubt the highlight and happiest sporting moment of his sporting life and career. He was also a player on the Junior B winning team 1981, which means he played on the two only 2 adult titles that we have won since the double of 1956.

He was member of St Senans Athletics' club and was very strong at the longer distances and completed the Dubin City marathon once. His time was circa 3 hours, and let's just say that his lifestyle was not one of 'pasta and chicken' in the run up to the event, but that's Seamus all over. Once he set his mind to something, that was it, he was going to be the best. He loved playing soccer and kicked ball for Slieverue FC, Kilmacow FC and Kilbarry Rangers. His soccer position was that of

sweeper or Centre back.

We know that Kilkenny hurling's great recent run of success gave him great satisfaction and comfort during his illness. He watched the 2015 final about 2 if not 3 times a day from the day after the match until his passing soon afterwards. He was and remained to his last days a staunch Kilmacow and Kilkenny supporter and he carried himself with great dignity and grace in difficult circumstance right to the end this autumn past.

They don't make them like Seamus any more, that's for sure. He made friends everywhere he went, either in work or sport. That's the mark of a great man. We in Kilmacow H&F Club would like to pass our sincere sympathy to his family and friends.

The death occurred on 31st December of Jimmy Bennett, Raheny, Dublin. A native of Stroan, Thomastown, he was one of six children born to Michael and Elizabeth Bennett. Jim had been ill for a long number of years. He died in the care of the staff at St Gabriel's Nursing Home, Edenmore. Jim was predeceased by his sister Barbara and brother Liam.

Always a competitive sportsman, he was involved in many sporting activities. He was a member of Thomastown Athletic Club, and played under 16 and Minor hurling with Bennettsbridge. He later graduated to senior

status at club and county level. Being such an accomplished athlete, he was a terrific handballer, winning many Tournaments and titles.

Jim played at right corner forward on the Kilkenny team that had that never to be forgotten victory against Tipperary in 1967. That team was captained by his Bennettsbridge friend and colleague, Jim Treacy. He won Oireachtas medals in 1966/67, and of course Leinster Championship medals in the same years. He captained Kilkenny in 1968, but unfortunately they were defeated by Wexford in the Leinster Final. He is also a holder of National Hurling League Medal 1965/66 and Railway Cup honours 1967. Holder of three senior titles with Bennettsbridge in 1964/66/67, he was also on the teams beaten in 1965, '68, '72.

Following Bennettsbridge's defeat to Rower Inistioge in 1968, he emigrated to England and was a member of the London team in 1969, defeated by Kilkenny in All-Ireland senior hurling semi-final. Jim hailed from a notable GAA family. His brother Tony assisted Bennettsbridge in the early sixties collecting senior honours. His late brother, Liam manned the full back line also collected senior honours. Jim's son, Greg, featured with the Dublin team at minor, U21 and Senior level, and is presently playing senior hurling and football with Raheny Club.

Jim attended Bennettsbridge's "20 Golden Years" celebrations on St Patrick's night in 2000.

A number of his Bennettsbridge teammates attended the funeral services at St Gabriel's Care Home Edenmore. Bennettsbridge GAA Club was also represented at his Requiem Mass in St Monica's Church, Edenmore and his remains were cremated in Glasnevin.

A minutes silence was observed prior to the North U-21 Final in James Stephen's grounds.

Jim is survived by his wife, Collette, daughters, Susan, Michelle, Sally-Anne, Dawn and Greg. He is also mourned by his loving family, grandchildren, brothers, Tony and Johnny, sister Mary, relatives neighbours and friends.



Dan McEvoy

Dan McEvoy, or Danny Mac, as he was affectionately known, grew up in the shadow of Nowlan Park. His family home features in the earliest photographs of the Park. One of his earliest memories was of assisting Fr Willie Brennan, Curate in St Mary's, and a hurling fanatic, to plant the cypress saplings which were to grow up and surround Nowlan Park for so many years. Fr Brennan charged the young Dan with looking after the trees when he grew up. And look after them he did as the last of them were only removed a few years ago.

Dan McEvoy loved the GAA and hurling lore, and over the years, made several contributions to this publication. He attended every All Ireland involving Kilkenny from 1945 to 2015, with the exception of last year's replay - a span of seventy years' attendance.

He grew up at a time when Kilkenny was a much smaller place, and people knew each other. Danny knew them all, the characters, the hurlers, the farmers, the lame dogs and the high and mighty. His formidable memory made him a most eloquent source of stories and yarns about them all. His son Enda's article in this Yearbook has a sad irony about it in regard to people like Danny who had so much to tell.

He was a familiar sight to all, patrolling the Continent with his pilgrim's staff, and, for many years before that, on his bike. He had a word for everyone and loved to have what he called a "gallery" with anyone who crossed his path. Danny was an extremely Christian man, whose many good deeds, like so many of his stories, are not recorded. He was a devoted visitor to St Luke's hospital and to the various Nursing Homes to chat with patients and bring to them his unique good cheer. His many, many acts of kindness are unrecorded and unsung.

Dan McEvoy's sudden death on November 19th came as a great shock to all who knew him. It is hard to envisage Kilkenny without him. The phrase "Ni bheidh a leithéid ann arís" could not be more apt in his case, for he was unique. He will be sadly missed by his wife and lifelong companion, Breda, and his children Enda, Mary and Liz, by his brother Jim, his sisters Olive and Rose, all his relations, connections, friends, and by the people of his beloved Kilkenny.
