

The Sliotar

The sliotar has been in use since pre GAA times. Over the years sliotars have been made using such materials as animal hair, wood, rope, leather, and even hollowed metal before todays moulded synthetic versions. Hair hurling balls found (see top image to right) have been carbon dated to almost 1000 years old and consist of a core of felted hair covered by matted cord made from animal hair. Materials used over the years for the core included bone, timber, stone and of course cork. Prior to GAA rules there was little by way of standardisation until 1886 when a stitched leather ball made by a hurler named Ned Treston from Co Galway was adopted as a prototype and used extensively.

In 1904, the official GAA rules set the minimum weight for the sliotar at seven ounces (200 grams). At that time most games were characterised by the scoring of relatively few points, largely attributed to the heavy weight of the ball.

In 1919 a retired hurler from Co Limerick named Johnny McAuliffe went from mending out of shape and damaged sliotars to designing and manufacturing his own. His leather sliotar had a cork core and was better constructed, lighter, more resistant to wear than earlier sliotars and the McAuliffe ball kept its shape.

By the 1930s sliotars had been reduced in size, closer to today's dimensions of sliotars and with a covering of white tanned leather for improved visibility.

In the early 2000's, the GAA initiated a series of steps to provide for more exacting regulations and specifications governing the manufacture of an Improved and official GAA Sliotar. Sliotars with rubber cores were trialled but were proven to be faster moving and less predictable than cork so the cork core ball was reintroduced. With balls from different manufacturers performing very differently, the GAA set about ensuring greater consistency and "playability".













The mechanical characteristics and design of sliotars was examined in detail by a team in DCU using a specially designed testing rig in conjunction with a high-speed cameras. Tests measured how fast (and far) the sliotar would travel when struck for distance and the coefficient of restitution (how bouncy the sliotar was) were also assessed by researchers. with 'ideal values' determined to serve as a prerequisites to the granting of an official stamp of approval.

Steps taken to prevent counterfeiting of sliotars include the introduction of readable tagging technology with an associated mobile phone app and data handling infrastructure.

The white sliotar often 'scored' low on the visibility stakes and often hard to see and track when it passed in front of other white or pale colours (for example clouds, stands, floodlights and goal posts). To improve visibility of the sliotar the GAA consulted with an optometrist and a colour partway between yellow and green was determined as most suitable. A shade referred to as florescent or "optic yellow' has been adopted by the GAA.

The optic yellow sliotar introduced for the 2020 championship has been retained for use in 2021, further developments under the stewardship of Ned and his advisory group are eagerly awaited.

If you could meet any person, past or present, which one would it be? Lyndon B Johnson


If you could change something in the world, what would it be?
